But was it really too late? Jesus commanded them to take away the stone from the cave. He prayed to his Father, and then raised Lazarus from the dead! There are many times when things seem hopeless. We still face suffering and death in this world. The story of Lazarus shows us that Jesus' love is greater than any of our problems, stronger even than death! During Lent, we have been battling our sinfulness and renewing our trust in God's love. Today's Gospel strengthens our hope in eternal life. As Jesus raised Lazarus, he wants to raise us from our failures and sins, to give us a share in the victory of the cross. Lent isn't over yet! It's not too late for us to draw even closer to the Lord. With God, it's never too late.

through it." Now Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus. So when he heard that he was ill, he remained for two days in the place where he was. Then after this he said to his disciples, "Let us go back to Judea."

When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb for four days. When Martha heard that lesus was coming, she went to meet him; but Mary sat at home. Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. But even now I know that whatever you ask of God, God will give you." lesus said to her, "Your brother will rise." Martha said. "I know he will rise, in the resurrection on the last day." Jesus told her. "I am the resurrection and the life: whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" She said to him, "Yes, Lord, I have come to believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who is coming into the world."

He became **perturbed** (13) and deeply troubled, and said, "Where have you laid him?" They said to him, "Sir, come and see." And Jesus wept. So the Jews said, "See how he loved him." 

Bringing It All Together

Today you will begin the last step in the rediscovery of your baptism. During the baptism ceremony, you wore a white garment. White is the color that symbolizes the presence of the risen Christ. A baptized person who is wearing white is a new person who has been reborn to life and who has become a child of God.



- Ask your parents if you can look in a photo album and choose a picture of yourself dressed in white on the day of your baptism. Glue it onto page 6 of your Lenten notebook. Above it, write this sentence: "I have been baptized and am on the path toward Easter."
- On page 7, write down a few sentences about the different things you would like to change in your life.
- On the cover of your Lenten notebook, in the sections of the lantern, draw the four steps that have helped you rediscover your baptism: the book of the Word of God, water, the Easter candle, and the white garment.

Saint Patrick's Feast Day is March 17.

Saint Patrick

Patrick was born and raised in England. Around the year 400, at the age of sixteen, he was captured by Irish pirates and taken to Ireland as a slave. Patrick was forced to work there many years before he was able to escape. Once he got home, he had a dream: God asked him to return to Ireland to spread Christianity there! Even though the Irish had hurt him, Patrick became a Priest and returned to the Emerald Isle to teach them about Jesus and help them believe in him.

One day, the clan chief stood confused before Patrick. "You say that there is only one God, but you say that he is three Persons: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit!" the chief said. "That's silly! How can a single God be three Persons?" The clan chief was willing to become a Christian, but this God was truly mysterious! Patrick smiled and bent down to pick a shamrock, a plant that clothes the meadows of Ireland with green leaves. "Look at this shamrock," he said to the clan chief. "It has three leaves. And yet, it's the same plant with just one stem. Well, in the Trinity, there are three Persons, but it's the same God. He is One."

The clan chief smiled broadly. "I would like to be baptized, along with my family and clan," he said. Patrick was happy. The Irish clans became Christian one after the other. When Patrick first arrived in Ireland, no one had ever even heard of Jesus Christ! Now, within just a few years, all of Ireland was Christian! This was no easy task!

When Patrick landed on the island, the Druids fought against him. Druids were the "priests" of an Irish religion based on the worship of nature. The Druids believed that everything in nature (trees, rocks, the sea, and thunder) were gods. The Druids were also skillful magicians, and they tried all their witchcraft against Patrick. They fought the Christian religion with all their might, but they lost the battle! What could Druids do against the one true God? Patrick never doubted that he would win. He always trusted in God.

Through Patrick, all of Ireland became Christian. Patrick brought peace to this troubled, war-torn land. He explained to the newly baptized that they could not be both Christians and violent at the same time. The Trinity is a God of love. Saint Patrick is the patron saint of Ireland. The shamrock is Ireland's national emblem!

Dear parents,

Remind your children to do the activities suggested in the Lenten notebook provided by MagnifiKid! Lent is a time of prayer and conversion. Each year the Church gives us this season of grace to look at our lives and make the changes we know we should be making. We are Catholics, and we want to live as Catholics, not just on Sundays, but every day in every way. Make Lent special by choosing some practices as a family. For example, you could do away with desserts, say the family prayer (see further) each night, cut back on TV and other media, or spend time together helping an elderly person. Don't focus merely on the external practices, but on choosing to put God first in your family life. May this Lent bring new joy and love to your family!

Pray as a family

During March, MagnifiKid! suggests that you pray for the grace to trust in God's will for your family. We cling to all sorts of things hoping for some sense of security and self-confidence. Lent invites us to let go of our worries and to trust in God alone. Fasting (in whatever form that takes) helps us to let go and to feel our hunger for the Lord. Almsgiving reminds us that what we have is a gift to be shared. Prayer turns us toward God in trust. Use the Lenten notebook (found in the Ash Wednesday issue) and the prayer below to help you pray as a family.

■ Thy will be done

The parent who is leading the prayer says: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

All make the sign of the cross. The parent continues with:

Father, this month, we enter the holy season of Lent. During these holy days, we want to grow in our trust and love of you. May your will be done in our family.

All continue with the Lord's Prayer:

Our Father, who art in heaven,
hallowed be thy name;
thy kingdom come,
thy will be done
on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread,
and forgive us our trespasses
as we forgive those who trespass against us;
and lead us not into temptation,
but deliver us from evil. Amen.

Next, the parent invites each family member to mention some worry that he or she wants to entrust to the Lord, or some event that strengthened his or her faith that God never forgets us. After each person finishes speaking, all respond with:

Father, not my will but yours be done.

(Luke 22:42)

Or: Jesus, I trust in you.

The parent who is leading the prayer concludes with:

Lord our God, you know what makes us worry, and you know all our needs. We

entrust our lives to you, and the concerns of those we love. Take care of us, and help us to trust in your loving care. Amen.

All make the sign of the cross.
