#### From The Pastor's Desk...

#### Also Known as Chardonnay W(h)ines!



I bet many of you have had a travel nightmare! Flights delayed then canceled requiring an unexpected overnight stay in a city not your destination. Frustrated and hungry you end up in accommodations miles from the airport, and by the time you got to the hotel you discover

the restaurant is closed. This happened to me on a flight from California to Chicago via Dallas. Storms in Chicago forced the cancellation of my flight home and there were no other flights that evening. Others and I ended up at a hotel in Fort Worth, starving, and the restaurant is closed. The hotel staff, recognizing the need of the many stranded travelers, surprised us by ordering several extra-large pizzas for us to share. It was like a miracle! It surely was manna in the desert to us that night! We all fell asleep grateful instead of grumpy!

In today's first reading, the Israelites are hungry. They are truly in need of physical nourishment and God provides for them by sending them food in the form of manna. In the Gospel, however, the people searching for Jesus are no longer physically hungry. The passage follows immediately on the heels of the miracle of the loaves and the fishes. As the crowds return in search of last night's miracle worker, Jesus knows that their stomachs are full and that they likely had eaten breakfast before getting into their boats to travel across the sea. Jesus knew that the people, having had their physical needs met, were now able to accept the *true* bread from heaven. They were now free to hear and receive the good news that Jesus had to offer them, the bread of life, a relationship with him.

In our efforts to be missionary disciples, we often get it backward. How many times do we harshly judge those not in our pews before meeting their very real needs for food, clothing, shelter or health care? St. Mother Theresa often described the loneliness and emptiness of people in the West as a hunger more difficult to satisfy than physical hunger. How often do we not recognize that hunger and fail to nourish those who are lonely or hurting? In spite of our best intentions, do we sometimes find ourselves quoting the Catechism rather than first seek to understand their situations or their pain? Pope Francis often speaks of the church as a field hospital.

Today's readings show us that God truly does start from the ground up. God met the Israelites need for food in the desert. Jesus met the crowds' need for food in Galilee. Only then did Jesus offer them the true food, the bread from heaven that was his very self. God uses us, the body of Christ, the church, to do as Jesus did!

#### Desde el Excritorio Del Pastor

#### ¡También conocido como Chardonnay W(h)ines!



¡Apuesto a que muchos de ustedes han tenido una pesadilla de viaje! Vuelos retrasados y cancelados que requieren una noche de estadía inesperada en una ciudad que no es tu destino. Frustrado y hambriento, terminas en un alojamiento a

millas del aeropuerto, y cuando llegas al hotel, descubres que el restaurante está cerrado. Esto me sucedió en un vuelo de California a Chicago vía Dallas. Las tormentas en Chicago forzaron la cancelación de mi vuelo a casa y no había otros vuelos esa noche. Otros y yo terminamos en un hotel en Fort Worth, hambrientos, y el restaurante estaba cerrado. El personal del hotel, reconociendo la necesidad de los muchos viajeros varados, nos sorprendió al pedir varias pizzas extra grandes para compartir. ¡Fue como un milagro! ¡Con seguridad fue maná en el desierto para nosotros esa noche! ¡Todos nos quedamos dormidos y agradecidos en lugar de gruñones!

En la primera lectura de hoy, los israelitas tienen hambre. Realmente necesitan alimento físico y Dios les provee enviándoles comida en forma de maná. En el Evangelio, sin embargo, las personas que buscan a Jesús ya no tienen hambre física. El pasaje sigue inmediatamente después del milagro de los panes y los peces. Mientras la multitud regresa en busca del hacedor de milagros de la noche anterior, Jesús sabe que sus estómagos están llenos y que probablemente habían desayunado antes de subir a sus botes para cruzar el mar. Jesús sabía que la gente, una vez satisfechas sus necesidades físicas, ahora podía aceptar el *verdadero* pan del cielo. Ellos no tenían la libertad de escuchar y recibir las buenas nuevas que Jesús tenía para ofrecerles, el pan de vida, una relación con él.

En nuestros esfuerzos por ser discípulos misioneros, a menudo lo hacemos al revés. ¿Cuántas veces juzgamos con dureza a quienes no están en nuestros bancos antes de satisfacer sus necesidades reales de comida, ropa, refugio o atención médica? La santa Madre Teresa a menudo describió la soledad y el vacío de las personas en Occidente como un hambre más difícil de satisfacer que el hambre físico. ¿Con qué frecuencia no reconocemos esa hambre y no nutrimos a quienes se sienten solos o sufriendo? A pesar de nuestras mejores intenciones, ¿nos encontramos a veces citando el Catecismo en lugar de buscar primero comprender sus situaciones o su dolor? El Papa Francisco a menudo habla de la iglesia como un hospital de campaña.

Las lecturas de hoy nos muestran que Dios realmente comienza desde cero. Dios satisfizo la necesidad de comida de los israelitas en el desierto. Jesús satisfizo la necesidad de comida de la multitud en Galilea. Solo así Jesús les ofreció la verdadera comida, el pan del cielo que era él mismo. ¡Dios nos usa a nosotros, el cuerpo de Cristo, la iglesia, para hacer lo que hizo Jesús!

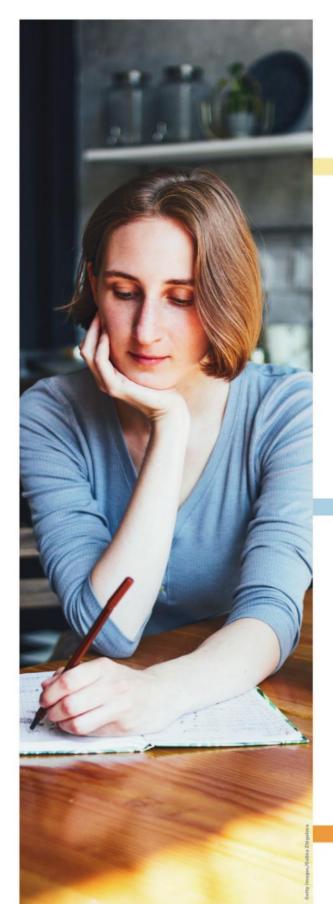

## Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jer 23:1-6 | Eph 2:13-18 | Mk 6:30-34

#### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Portrayals of Jesus as a shepherd who cares for sheep often depict him carrying a sheep on his shoulders or holding a lamb in his arms. Those images are a source of great comfort, as is today's psalm: "The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want." But they don't quite capture just what hard work being a shepherd involves: tending to the flock in all kinds of weather, when the pastures are anything but verdant; waking in the wee hours to care for ewes and newborn lambs; watching some thrive and others die; not to mention being the poster child for the oft-quoted "smell of sheep." The crowd in today's Gospel lacked such a shepherd to tend and care for them, and thus "[Jesus'] heart was moved with pity for them." There are times when circumstances and events can trick us into thinking that an earthly power or perfectly-principled worldview will save us. That is when we need the Lord as our shepherd the most. Only he can save us; only he has saved us. So, in those times when we may feel lost, we can bring it all to Jesus in prayer. He is the Shepherd who knows what we need.

#### GO EVANGELIZE

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I don't know about you, but I rarely miss a meal. When I do, I get cranky. And I don't like crowds of any kind outside of Wrigley Field. So imagine how exhausted Jesus and the disciples must have felt when, because crowds followed them day and night, they had "no opportunity even to eat." Even when they tried to get away and rest awhile, a vast crowd appeared. Rather than turn away, however, Jesus began to teach them – for they were hurting and in need of his care. Today's Gospel encourages us to be shepherds to one another, keeping others close. Pope Francis said it well during Holy Week 2013: "Following Jesus means learning to come out of ourselves ... to be the first to take a step toward our brothers and our sisters, especially those who are the most distant, those who are forgotten, those who are most in need of understanding, comfort and help." As we ourselves have been led by the Shepherd, we reach out to others who are in need of care.

**ACCOMPANY** Find ways, large or small, to "tend the flock" of your family, parish, workplace or community: Write a note to a person who is grieving, invite a quiet co-worker to lunch, provide a listening ear to children or aging parents, introduce yourself to a newcomer at your parish.

#### Pastoral Care

#### Be Aware of Heat-Related Illness

As we enjoy the warm weather it is important to be aware of heat-related illnesses and what to do to avoid permanent injury or even death. Most people know what to do to prevent sunburn or heat rash and how to treat it if it occurs. Do you know the symptoms of heat cramps, heat exhaustion or heat stroke and what to do if it happens? The information below is from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Heat cramp symptoms include severe cramps that typically begin suddenly in the hands, calves or feet and muscles may become hard or tense. It may occur after heavy sweating during intense exercise. The following suggestions are to stop physical activity and move to a cool place; drink water or a sports drink; wait for cramps to go away before you do any more physical activity. Get medical help right away if: cramps last longer than one hour; you are on a low-sodium diet and you have heart problems.

Heat exhaustion requires immediate attention when it occurs. Symptoms of heat exhaustion are heavy sweating; cold, pale, and clam-

my skin; fast, weak pulse; nausea or vomiting; muscle cramps; fatigue; confusion or anxiety; agitation; tiredness or weakness; dizziness; headache; and fainting. Actions to take in case of heat exhaustion are to move to a cool place; loosen clothes; put cool, wet cloths on the body or take a cool bath; sip water. Get medical help right away if: you are vomiting; your symptoms worsen or symptoms last longer than one hour.

Heat stroke can occur suddenly, without any symptoms of heat exhaustion. It is important to get immediate medical care for a person experiencing symptoms of heat exhaustion or heat stroke. Symptoms of heat stroke are high body temperature (103 degrees F. or higher); hot, red, dry or damp skin; headache; dizziness or vertigo; nausea and vomiting; confusion; losing consciousness; rapid heart rate; profound sweating; shortness of breath; decreased urination; fatigue; convulsions. If heat stroke is suspected, call 911 as heat stroke is a medical emergency; move the person to a cooler place; help lower the person's temperature with cool cloths or a cool bath; do not give the person anything to drink.

Tips for preventing heat-related illness are to stay cool, stay hydrated and stay informed. Limit your outdoor activity to when it is the coolest. Rest often in shady areas. Stay away from very sugary or alcoholic drinks as they cause loss of body fluid. Avoid very cold drinks as they may cause stomach cramps. Check on extreme heat alerts and safety tips given when temperatures are high. Have fun in the sun but take steps to prevent heat-related illness whether you are at home or on vacation.

#### Introduction & Invitations to Family Faith Formation, Age 4K – Grade 5, 2021-2022

#### Registration for Family Faith Formation, EDGE, and L.I.G.H.T. is now available online, olmercy.com!

Family Faith Formation will build upon the parent-led model used this past year, while also providing on-site options each month with the desire to reconnect as a faith community in small and large group settings with other parents and children.

#### **Pflaum Gospel Weeklies**

ALL FAMILIES are provided with the *Pflaum Gospel Weeklies* to share together at home prior to Sunday Mass and are utilized in conjunction with Options 1-3 outlined on the chart below. The time commitment can range from 30-60 minutes per week depending on the number of children and grade level(s)in your household. User-friendly parent guides are provided with each grade level grouping: **Seeds** (PreK), **Promise** (K-1), **Good News** (Grades 2 & 3), **Venture** (Grades 4 & 5). Although there are different titles for grade levels, they each focus on a similar theme and Sunday Gospel in preparation for each weekend Mass.

#### Which Type of Partnership is the best fit for your family?

#### In-Person, Option #1:

Option #1 is held the first two Wednesdays of the month, October – April. Parent/Child(ren) are placed in multi-age groups. Each small group is led by a family catechist, 6:00-7:00pm.

#### In-Person Option #2:

Option #2 is held on a Sunday, once a month, September – April. A Family Catechist will guide you during family table gatherings.

11am-12pm (following 10am Mass) **OR** 4:30-5:30pm (before 5:30pm Mass)

#### Virtual Option #3:

Option #3 gathers families twice a month with a Family Catechist over zoom for a faith activity, discussion, and prayer that relates to the upcoming Sunday Gospel.

#### Family Sacramental Preparation

Families who have a child preparing for the Sacraments of Reconciliation and the Eucharist, begin their sacramental faith journey together in January, using Family Kits. *MEND* is a seven-week family journey to encounter Jesus' mercy in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. *NOURISH* is a ten-week family journey to discover the Lord's real presence in the celebration of the Eucharist. An initial training in January at the parish with parents and their children will take place prior to the reception of the family kits.

Prior to January, we encourage your participation in one of the three *Pflaum* Gospel options described above and/or the Encounter Jesus in the Mass initiative outlined below.

#### **Encounter Jesus in the Mass**

Parents are led through Bishop Barron's film series on the Mass while students (grades 2-5) participate in a mini-course Mass series in church. Held on the third Wednesday of the month, Oct.-March 6:00–7:00 pm.

#### **Family Alpha**

Parents and their children are invited to encounter the Lord anew through Family Alpha! Held on Thursdays, once a week for 11 consecutive weeks, September – November and January – March

#### **Intergenerational Family Faith Events**

Every 4-6 weeks, families gather to share in a service activity, family prayer, educational and/ or social experience as a community, September - April.

Double-check the sender's email address. A spoofed email address often has an extension similar to the legitimate email address. You can outsmart them by looking beyond the name and checking the "from" email address to see if it matches what you know the alleged sender's email to be.

Always verify in person/telephone before sending money or sensitive data. Be suspicious! Make it standard operating procedure to confirm email requests for wire transfer, debit cards, account information or confidential information.
