From The Pastor's Desk...

Also Known as Chardonnay W(h)ines!



Being a doctor and a deacon, Fr. Don has asked me to write to update you on the latest information concerning the prevention of COVID-19.

The only ways to help decrease the spread of COVID-19 is with distancing yourself by six feet from other people, wearing a face mask, adhering to hand washing hygiene, and receiving one of the approved COVID-19 vaccines. Vaccination seems to be the part that

is causing the most controversy, understandably, given the rapid rate at which it was introduced to the public. The pandemic nature of the disease and how quickly it spread across the globe necessitated the need for an accelerated release timetable. Pfizer, Moderna and Johnson and Johnson are the only three vaccines approved/allowed to be used within the United States. This is since they are the only ones that have <u>not</u> been manufactured using fetal stem cells. This is extremely important to understand, especially as Christians and Catholics. When the claim is made that no genetic material is used in the production that means just that. The vaccine is completely free of any genetic material from, or fetal stem cell tissue of, a previously aborted fetus. It is important to understand that in the United States, it is completely illegal to use aborted fetal stem cells in the development of any vaccine.

Another ethical and scientific point to clarify is that the Pfizer and Moderna mRNA vaccines do not interact with a person's DNA. When the vaccine is introduced into the human body, our white blood cells see the foreign material and will attack and engulf the mRNA particles. Once inside the cell, it transforms only that individual cell to mimic the COVID-19 virus. Once all the vaccine particles are engulfed, another set of white blood cells sees these transformed white blood cells as foreign and attacks them. This how we form antibodies and develop immunity to the COVID-19 virus. At no time does the mRNA interact with our core DNA. Additionally, while the mRNA technology is new to vaccine production, the science has been present for approximately the last ten years in the development of cancer medications.

I have spoken to the scientific aspects concerning vaccine to help bring clarity. For the religious and ethics, I will leave that to our Holy Father, Pope Frances. In short, he also recognizes the enormity of the decision to be vaccinated and calls upon all Catholics to consider the ethics and impact your decision to be, or not to be, vaccinated will have on society. He asks all Catholics to consider our fellow brothers and sisters health when making our decisions. He even goes as far as to call it a *Corporal Work of Mercy* to be vaccinated. Meaning we are performing this act not for ourselves, but for the potential health and wellbeing of our neighbor. When we perform corporal works of mercy, we are placing our desires aside for the sake of others. Las únicas formas de ayudar a disminuir la propagación del COVID-19 es distanciarse seis pies de otras personas, usar una mascarilla, cumplir con la higiene de lavarse las manos y recibir una de las vacunas del COVID-19 aprobadas. La vacunación parece ser la parte que está causando más controversia, comprensiblemente, dada la rapidez con la que se presentó al público. La naturaleza pandémica de la enfermedad y la rapidez con que se propagó por todo el mundo hizo necesario un

calendario de lanzamiento acelerado. Pfizer, Moderna y Johnson and Johnson son las únicas tres vacunas aprobadas/permitidas para su uso en los Estados Unidos. Esto se debe a que son las únicas que <u>no</u> se han fabricado con células madre fetales. Esto es extremadamente importante entender, especialmente como Cristianos y Católicos. Cuando se afirma que no se utiliza material genético en la producción, esto significa precisamente eso. La vacuna está completamente libre de cualquier material genético o tejido de células madre fetales de un feto previamente abortado. Es importante comprender que en los Estados Unidos es completamente ilegal usar células madre fetales abortadas en el desarrollo de cualquier vacuna.

Otro punto ético y científico a aclarar es que las vacunas de ARNm de Pfizer y Moderna no interactúan con el ADN de una persona. Cuando la vacuna se introduce en el cuerpo humano, nuestros glóbulos blancos ven el material extraño y atacarán y engullirán las partículas de ARNm. Una vez dentro de la célula, transforma solo esa célula individual para imitar el virus del COVID-19. Una vez que todas las partículas de la vacuna están engullidas, otro grupo de glóbulos blancos ve estos glóbulos blancos transformados como extraños y los ataca. Así formamos anticuerpos y desarrollamos inmunidad al virus COVID-19. En ningún momento el ARNm interactúa con nuestro ADN central. Además, si bien la tecnología de ARNm es nueva para la producción de vacunas, la ciencia ha estado presente por aproximadamente los últimos diez años en el desarrollo de medicamentos contra el cáncer.

He hablado de los aspectos científicos relacionados con las vacunas para ayudar a dar claridad. Para los religiosos y la ética, se lo dejo a nuestro Santo Padre, el Papa Francisco. En resumen, él también reconoce la magnitud de la decisión de vacunarse y hace un llamado a todos los Católicos a considerar la ética y el impacto que tendrá en la sociedad la decisión de ustedes de vacunarse o no vacunarse. El pide a todos los Católicos que consideren la salud de nuestros hermanos y hermanas al tomar nuestras decisiones. Incluso llega a llamar *Obra de Misericordia Corporal* el estar vacunado. Lo que significa que estamos realizando este acto no para nosotros mismos, sino por la salud potencial y el bienestar de nuestro prójimo. Cuando realizamos obras corporales de misericordia, estamos dejando nuestros deseos a un lado por el bien de los demás. 

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

What do we do best? Some of us might be math whizzes, others can send a golf ball exactly where we intend. How do we get there? Practice, natural talent, and a good coach or teacher. Following Jesus, though, is another matter entirely. As today's readings remind us, we grow as Christians not by building ourselves up but by giving ourselves away. In Isaiah, we hear about the suffering servant who "did not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many." That suffering servant is Jesus, who admonishes the Apostles as they jostle for position as his right-hand man. Ultimately, the greatest among them will be "a slave of all," Jesus reminds them. His words challenge us to put as much energy and prayer into finding ways to better serve others as we do other areas of our lives. We can look to Jesus, Mary, St. Joseph, and all the saints as role models.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I bet most of us can think of a friend who seems like a natural "giver." He shovels the neighbor's walk without being asked. She sends flowers or a meal during a difficult time. Serving others can take so many forms, from a simple hug or phone call to volunteering at a soup kitchen. In today's readings, Jesus invites us to bear witness to his sacrifice through humble service. It may not come naturally for all of us all the time, but that's where God's grace and the Holy Spirit come in. We can ask for the strength, creativity, flexibility – whatever we may lack – to recognize the needs around us and respond. Before we know it, our generosity will overflow and encourage others as they, too, seek to grow in Christian service.

ACTION Watching the news or even scrolling through your social-media feed can be overwhelming at times. Instead of tuning out, find a small way to help - through prayer, a donation to a Catholic organization, or a phone call or card to a friend going through a difficult time.

Awareness Topic for October

October is *Domestic Violence Awareness Month*. It was launched nationwide in October 1987 as a way to connect and unite individuals and organizations working on domestic violence issues. Progress has been made over the past years to support domestic violence victims and survivors, to hold abusers accountable, and to create and update legislation.

Statistics show that ten million women and men a year are victims of domestic violence. One in four women and one in nine men experience severe domestic violence abuse from intimate partners. Domestic violence most often happens behind closed doors. Only about 34% of victims receive medical treatment for their injuries.

Domestic violence affects women, men and children of all races, status, religions and culture. No one is immune to it. There are different forms of domestic violence such as physical, emotional, and verbal abuse. Domestic violence is never okay – if you or someone you know is in need of help contact the National Domestic Hotline at 1-800-799-7233.

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) affirmed their stance against domestic violence and their support for victims in their 2002 statement, "When I Call for Help: A Pastoral Response to Domestic Violence Against Women" that can be found at www.usccb.org.

A local organization to assist domestic violence victims is Mutual Ground at mutualground.org. They offer legal advocacy, medical advocacy, residential services, and counseling services and provide support for individuals and families impacted by domestic and sexual violence. 
Open HEARTS Ministry

We decided daylight would be safer for young people to walk among our parked, "Saint-Mobiles" while our friends and guests park on the opposite side of the lot. Also, this fun-filled event ends in time for our Saturday, 4 PM Massan opportunity sure to be helpful to some of our families.

If it should rain, our volunteer efforts will not be in vain as we have our gym and a our PLC meeting rooms reserved in case of poor weather. **No cancelation needed**- just our usual hand sanitizers, masks, and 3 foot social distancing guidelines all in place as we proceed. Our Saintly props and decorations can easily be taken indoors and set up to be viewed and appreciated, especially with the prepackaged online or store bought treats in close proximity to our displays for our young ones... and young at heart to enjoy!

Directions to Volunteer for Trunk & Treat with the Saints...

- 1. Arrive by 1:00 PM to set up our Saint Displays in our parking lot or gym
- 2. Decorate in a manner where the objects, signs, pictures, or famous quotes represent the life & legacy of your chosen Saint.
- 3. Aim to creatively select treats to share (125 in number) that hint or relate to some special aspect of the life of your Saint. It could be an edible treat or something else that's fun and safe for kids.

Adults, teens, tweens, and kids helping to host a trunk "Saint Mobile" may dress as their favorite Saints but this isn't required, although certainly fitting with the spirit of this event. Children participating in the Trunk and Treating my dress as their "new found favorite Saint" or wear their Halloween costume.

Examples:

- Mary, Mother of Jesus and of the Church- Dress as our lovely lady dressed in blue (and white), suggested handout, decade of rosary kit or a Hail Mary card.
- Saint Francis of Assisi- Patron Saint of Animals; Fill trunk with stuffed animals, suggested treat, package of animal crackers
- St. Paul-Patron Saint of writers, Decorate your trunk with map(s) of St. Paul's journey to preach and teach the Good News to the Gentiles, pass out a pencil from oriental trading with a Bible verse on it.
- Saint Luke and Saint Catherine of Bologna are Patron Saints of the arts/sculptors; Decorate trunk with different art easel/ supplies, dress as an artist/ painter, treat suggestions, mini playdough canisters, or small boxes of crayons from the dollar store.
- Saint John the Baptist- dressed in camel's hair; one could leather belt around fake fur coat. He was known to eat creepy crawly things- treat suggestion, package of gummy worms.
- Saint Martha- Patron Saint of **Cook**ing, Decorate trunk with part of a siblings kitchen play set, etc., treat suggestion, prepackaged **cook**ie
- St. Joseph- Patron Saint of carpenters, Decorate with toy carpenter's bench, paper string of tools from one side of trunk to the other, wear tool belt, etc.; treat suggestion, Small St. Joseph medal (online bulk pricing available)
