

From The Pastor's Desk...

Also Known as Chardonnay W(h)ines!



With this feast of Christ the King, we come to the end of another church year. The picture of Christ as King we are given is a powerful and majestic one. We honor the Lord Jesus today as a King whose Kingdom is eternal in time, universal in scope, and very personal in its power.

That is the teaching of our readings.

The first reading for today's Mass is from the Old Testament Book of Daniel. It is a book that speaks to us today as much as it spoke to the Jewish people when written around 164 B.C. The brutality of dictators, terrorist bombings, corruption in politics, cultural confusion and degradation all make us think that the world is out of control. The prophet Daniel found the same things in his time but looked to Gad as the place to find spiritual security and salvation. One night, Daniel had a vision of the whole of human history, a terrible vision of huge, gruesome beasts rising from the earth representing the world's kingdoms. The first was like a lion, another like a bear, a third like a leopard, and then a fourth beast that was so horrible as to be indescribable. Each of them in turn terrorized and ravaged the world and then, as the visions continued, Daniel finally saw not a kingdom but an individual, a man not a beast, coming from heaven. "As the visions continued during the night, I saw one like a Son of Man coming on the clouds of heaven, and He was given final authority, glory and power and, in the end, all the nations worshipped Him." We know His as Jesus Christ!

Empires have come and gone, Jesus Christ remains. His Kingdom is ETERNAL. The Roman Empire is gone. The Greek Empire is gone. The French Empire is gone. The Spanish Empire is gone. The Soviet Empire is gone. The Aztec Empire is gone. The British Empire is gone. The German Empire is gone. The Japanese Empire is gone. The Ottoman Empire is gone. The Austro-Hungarian Empire is gone. I suspect that someday our form of government will be gone too. But Jesus Christ remains!

This Solemnity of Christ the King was made a Church-wide feast in 1925. At that time, there was Bolshevism in Russia, and Fascism in Italy. Soon there would be Nazism in Germany. Now they are all gone and Jesus Christ's Kingdom remains. When human history is finished and after the collapse of every human kingdom, in the end there will be only Jesus Christ. Only the Kingdom of Christ is enduring and eternal. That's the teaching of the Book of Daniel.

Desde el Excritorio Del Pastor

Con esta fiesta de Cristo Rey, llegamos al final de otro año litúrgico. La imagen de Cristo como Rey que se nos da es poderosa y majestuosa. Honramos al Señor Jesús hoy como un Rey cuyo Reino es eterno en el tiempo, de alcance universal y muy personal en su poder. Esa es la enseñanza de nuestras lecturas.

La primera lectura de la Misa de hoy es del Libro de Daniel del Antiguo Testamento. Es un libro que nos habla hoy tanto como al pueblo Judío cuando se escribió alrededor del año 164 A.C. La brutalidad de los dictadores, los atentados terroristas con bombas, la corrupción en la política, la confusión cultural y la degradación nos hacen pensar que el mundo está fuera de control. El profeta Daniel encontró las mismas cosas en su tiempo, pero miró a Dios como el sitio para encontrar seguridad espiritual y salvación. Una noche, Daniel tuvo una visión de toda la historia de la humanidad, una visión terrible de enormes y horripilantes bestias que se elevaban de la tierra y representaban los reinos del mundo. El primero era como un león, otro como un oso, un tercero como un leopardo, y luego una cuarta bestia que era tan horrible que era indescriptible. Cada uno de ellos a su vez aterrorizó y devastó el mundo y luego, mientras las visiones continuaban, Daniel finalmente vio no un reino sino un individuo, un hombre no una bestia, viniendo del cielo. "Mientras las visiones continuaban durante la noche, vi a uno como un Hijo de Hombre que venía sobre las nubes del cielo, y se le dio la autoridad final, gloria y poder y, al final, todas las naciones lo adoraron a Él". ¡Lo conocemos como Jesucristo!

Los imperios han venido y se han ido, Jesucristo permanece. Su Reino es ETERNO. El Imperio Romano desapareció. El Imperio Griego desapareció. El Imperio Francés desapareció. El Imperio Español desapareció. El Imperio Soviético desapareció. El Imperio Azteca desapareció. El Imperio Británico desapareció. El Imperio Alemán desapareció. El Imperio Japonés desapareció. El Imperio Otomano desapareció. El Imperio Austro-Húngaro desapareció. Sospecho que algún día también desaparecerá nuestra forma de gobierno. ¡Pero Jesucristo permanece!

Esta solemnidad de Cristo Rey se convirtió en una fiesta para toda la Iglesia en 1925. En ese momento, había el Bolchevismo en Rusia y el Fascismo en Italia. Pronto habría Nazismo en Alemania. Ahora todos desaparecieron y el Reino de Jesucristo permanece. Cuando la historia humana termine y después del colapso de todos los reinos humanos, al final solo habrá Jesucristo. Solo el Reino de Cristo es duradero y eterno. Esa es la enseñanza del Libro de Daniel.

Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

Dn 7:13-14 | Rv 1:5-8 | Jn 18:33b-37

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Many Americans have a fascination with royalty. We love to follow the royal family in real life and via the bingeworthy Crown series on Netflix. As royal-watchers know, the crown isn't all it's cracked up to be! History and experience, too, show that earthly kingdoms include their share of divisiveness, betrayal and, at times, a total disregard for other people. Jesus gives us a different kind of kingdom and kingship to aspire to - one based on truth not fiction, and born of suffering and not succession. Jesus did not seek earthly glory but endured a crown of thorns and death on a cross to establish the kingdom of heaven - a kingdom that perfects us and unites us with the Holy Trinity. So it is fitting that as we end the liturgical year, we honor Jesus as King of the Universe - heaven, earth, and all creation. Jesus established his kingdom by sacrificing himself out of love for us. By our baptism we have a share in this holy identity, and therefore, with the help of the Holy Spirit, we have the authority and power to proclaim Christ's Kingship to all the world by our words and deeds. In this way we are able to serve the one true king, and participate in building God's kingdom on earth.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Some people aren't shy about saying where they stand: I'm especially fascinated by bumper stickers. We don't like to talk about politics or religion, but somehow it's OK to proclaim our most deeply held beliefs as we tool down the highway. As we celebrate Jesus as King of the Universe, it's a good time to ask ourselves: Is Jesus king of our universe? If so, how do we proclaim it? Bumper stickers can be fun, but sharing our belief in Jesus as our Savior requires human interaction. As members of the kingdom of God – present on earth but not yet fully realized – our baptismal vocation is to participate in Christ's priestly, prophetic, and kingly mission. The Importance of Gratitude

Thanksgiving celebrations this year will be different than those before the COVID-19 pandemic but in some ways better than what we experienced last year. No matter what is going on in the world around us, it is important to focus on the power of positivity, gratitude and prayer to uplift our spirits.

Positive thinking promotes healthy behaviors, reduces stress, and increases confidence. It is challenging to stay positive during times of illness and difficulties. Ask yourself, "Where have I found hope or joy in the past?" Go to those sources. If you are still unable to be with others in-person, connect by phone, emails,

video calls or a written note or card that you have positive and meaningful relationships with. Surround yourself with those who have your best interest at heart and be influenced by their strength. Make an intention to limit social media and news consumption that may have more negative than positive messages.

Gratitude is derived from the Latin word 'gratia' which means gratefulness or thankfulness. Gratitude has been linked to improved psychological and physical health. It is important to be thankful for the blessings in one's life and to express that gratitude often in life not only on Thanksgiving Day. Ways to cultivate gratitude are through a gratitude journal, write a thank you note to someone who has made a difference in your life or say thank you to others throughout the day who have helped you.

Prayer is a way of expressing gratitude. And if you think about it, gratitude is its own prayer. It is a time to be aware of God's presence in all that is around us and see how everything and everyone is connected. Gratitude becomes a prayer that helps us see God's presence in our life and draws us closer to God. Spend quiet time with God talking and listening to Him.

"May we give thanks always for everything in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ to God the Father. Amen. (Ephesians 5:20) Wishing you a Blessed and Happy Thanksgiving!!!

Bishop Hicks' Column

November 2021 | The Synod on Synodality: A worldwide listening tour



There is a difference between hearing and listening. Hearing is basically a physical function that involves the ears. On the other hand, listening is more of an internal process that uses the ears, but also involves the mind and heart. A couple of years ago, I was at a luncheon with a group of retired priests. For more than twenty minutes, the priests at my table discussed which hearing aid was the best. I sat there quietly as they discussed which ones felt more comfortable in the ear and which ones canceled out background noise. I thought to myself, "One day, I too will be addressing these same issues in my life." Towards the end of their discussion, one priest wisely added, "No matter how good these hearing aids are, they do very little to help us listen better ... that part is up to us!"

His point was well-taken. We can have the best hearing in the world, but it takes real attention and effort to be a good listener, too. Some people seem to have a natural gift to listen well. Nevertheless, you have probably encountered some people in our society who prefer to monologue instead of dialogue. To dialogue, one must embrace the humble position of not only speaking but listening, too.

Our Holy Father has asked that the Church begin a process of "listening." It is called the Synod on Synodality. "In creating the opportunity for listening and dialogue on the local level through this Synod, Pope Francis is calling the Church to rediscover its deeply synodal nature. This rediscovery of the synodal roots of the Church will involve a process of humbly learning together how God is calling us to be as the Church in the third millennium." (Vademecum for the Synod on Synodality, section 1.1)

In other words, the entire people of God, not just the Diocese of Joliet, will enter into a process of "listening" to what the Holy Spirit is saying to the Church. Obviously, we need to listen to the Word of God in Scripture and to the living tradition of the Church, and we also need to listen to each other as we discern the signs of the time.

Specifically, to foster a Church that is synodal, the Holy Father has asked us to focus on communion, participation and mission. Recently, Pope Francis wrote, "The Holy Spirit needs you. Listen to Him by listening to yourselves."

I have heard officials in the Church refer to this Synod on Synodality as a worldwide "listening tour" that begins at the local Church to discern what the Holy Spirit is saying to us as to what the Church should be. In the Diocese of Joliet, our "listening tour" began with an inaugural Mass at our Cathedral on October 17. People from all over the diocese gathered as we launched this desire to listen to one another. We will continue to offer listening sessions that include our many councils and boards - such as the presbyteral council, pastoral council, women's council, etc. - as well as leaders of Hispanic ministry, religious orders, Catholic schools and religious education. Their comments will be collected, and a report will be sent to the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops. After that, there are timelines in which further discussions, drafts and findings will be collected at continental/regional assemblies. This synod process will then conclude with bishops and lay Catholics gathering in Rome in 2023 to discuss the themes and findings from this worldwide listening tour.

There are many people who are already wondering if this Synod on Synodality will lead to any changes in the Church. That is yet to be seen. However, as our society continues to become more polarized with often a preference of monologue over dialogue, this process of listening with open minds and hearts will hopefully give us the opportunity to not only hear one another but also to learn from, empathize with and love one another more deeply. Veni, Sancte Spiritus!

It is very important that these pledges be paid so that our parish will reach our goal. Once we have reached our goal in paid pledges, 70% of the additional funds received will be returned to the parish for our use.

Always verify in person/telephone before sending money or sensitive data. Be suspicious! Make it standard operating procedure to confirm email requests for wire transfer, debit cards, account information or confidential information.
