### From The Pastor's Desk...

#### Also Known as Chardonnay W(h)ines!



It's finally here! I've waited all year for this!! My favorite time of the liturgical calendar! Advent is here!!! Today is the First Sunday of Advent. Why is it my favorite time of the liturgical calendar? It's not because it means only four weeks until Christmas, but because

Advent is the season of promise *par excellence*. The scripture readings we hear today reassure that though we are living in times of crisis and even apocalypse, we can interpret events with hope. Whether for the first or 21<sup>st</sup> century, the message is the same....Be watchful and alert, prayerful and humble, trusting in God and awaiting redemption from the world's crises that only God can bring, and will bring.

The Hebrew Testament, commonly called the Old Testament is a reservoir for the promises of God. From the beginning, when all created things were called "very good" to the promise after the flood that the earth would continue; to the promise of a future to Abram and the rest of the patriarchs and matriarchs of Israel, right down to the promise that the struggling exilic remnant of the nation would still be a light to the nations. From beginning to end, the Hebrew scriptures make promises for all the creation. Jeremiah in today's first reading reminds us that we are reshaped again and again, even after being broken, and in that patient reshaping is a promise that gives us hope.

This theme appears in our Gospel reading from Luke today. It's tone and message are as jarring as the first two readings – together they are a real downer! The First Sunday of Advent seems an odd time to reflect on the cosmological end times, even if Christmas is linked to the Second Coming. The joining of these themes of the crisis of birth and rebirth shows how hope flourishes in difficult times. Apocalyptic style expresses the idea that rebirth occurs in crisis. Luke wrote his Gospel during a time of particular turbulence for Israel and the early Church.

So the promise from the Old Testament of a Savior has been fulfilled. The promise we wait for today is the Savior's second coming. And while the promise may not be fully realized yet – it is on the way. To live reverently, deliberately and fully awake – that is what it means to live in the promise, where the wait itself is as rich as its end. All it takes are some regular reminders, because as long as the promise is renewed, the promise is alive, as vivid as the rainbow, as real as the million stars overhead. We live in times of peril AND promise!

### Desde el Excritorio Del Pastor

#### ¡También conocido como Chardonnay W(h)ines!



¡Finalmente está aquí! ¡¡He esperado todo el año por esto! ¡Mi tiempo favorito del calendario litúrgico! ¡¡¡El Adviento ya está aquí!!! Hoy es el Primer Domingo de Adviento. ¿Por qué es mi tiempo favorito del calendario litúrgico? No es porque signifique solo cuatro semanas hasta Navidad, sino porque el Adviento es la temporada de promesas

por excelencia. Las lecturas de las Escrituras que escuchamos hoy nos aseguran que, aunque vivimos en tiempos de crisis e incluso apocalipsis, podemos interpretar los eventos con esperanza. Ya sea para el primer siglo o para el siglo XXI, el mensaje es el mismo... Estén atentos y alertas, orantes y humildes, confiando en Dios y esperando la redención de las crisis del mundo que solo Dios puede traer y traerá.

El Testamento Hebreo, comúnmente llamado Antiguo Testamento, es un depósito de las promesas de Dios. Desde el principio, cuando todas las cosas creadas fueron llamadas "muy buenas" hasta la promesa después del diluvio de que la tierra continuaría; hasta la promesa de un futuro para Abram y el resto de los patriarcas y matriarcas de Israel, hasta la promesa de que el remanente exiliado de la nación que luchaba todavía sería una luz para las naciones. De principio a fin, las escrituras Hebreas hacen promesas para toda la creación. Jeremías en la primera lectura de hoy nos recuerda que somos remodelados una y otra vez, incluso después de estar destrozados, y en esa remodelación paciente hay una promesa que nos da esperanza.

Este tema aparece hoy en nuestra lectura del Evangelio de Lucas. Su tono y mensaje son tan discordantes como las dos primeras lecturas: ijuntas son una verdadera decepción! El Primer Domingo de Adviento parece un tiempo extraño para reflexionar sobre los últimos tiempos cosmológicos, incluso si la Navidad está relacionada con la Segunda Venida. La unión de estos temas de la crisis del nacimiento y el renacimiento muestra cómo la esperanza florece en tiempos difíciles. El estilo apocalíptico expresa la idea de que el renacimiento ocurre en crisis. Lucas escribió su Evangelio durante un tiempo de particular turbulencia para Israel y la Iglesia primitiva.

De modo que se ha cumplido la promesa del Antiguo Testamento de un Salvador. La promesa que esperamos hoy es la segunda venida del Salvador. Y aunque es posible que la promesa aún no se haya cumplido por completo, está en camino. Vivir con reverencia, deliberadamente y completamente despierto: eso es lo que significa vivir en la promesa, donde la espera en sí es tan rica como su fin. Todo lo que se necesita son algunos recordatorios regulares, porque mientras se renueve la promesa, la promesa está viva, tan vívida como el arco iris, tan real como el millón de estrellas en lo alto. ¡Vivimos en tiempos de peligro Y promesa!

¡Que tengan un bendecido Adviento!

# First Sunday of Advent

Jer 33:14-16 | 1 Thes 3:12-4:2 | Lk 21:25-28,34-36

#### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

As the days grow shorter and darker, I am especially ready for Advent wreaths and nativity sets; sparkling lights and singing angels. More than ever, I eagerly anticipate the joyful celebration of Christ's birth. But today's readings for the first Sunday of Advent point us to the end of time, when Jesus returns in glory. Wait a minute, what? I don't want to think about the dismay and fright that Jesus foretells in the Gospel, I want to think about shepherds and holy nights. We really can't do one without the other, however, and the underlying message of the readings is one of hope and reassurance: Our God keeps his promises. He is faithful to the covenants he makes. He loves us so much; he offers us new beginnings. Our God became one of us, died to save us, and will give us the strength to be ready to greet him when he comes again. "Stand erect and raise your heads because your redemption is at hand," Jesus says. Pray that our preparation for Christ's birth will make us all the more ready for his return.

#### **GO EVANGELIZE**

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

We are a society and culture that focuses a lot on the outward signs of preparation, and there is a lot of pressure to make it all perfect. Pinterest boards, social media groups, magazine photos, clothing catalogs: all show perfectly dressed people with perfectly adorable dogs standing in front of exquisitely perfect Christmas trees, on perfectly unblemished snow. But perfection on the exterior is not the Christian goal. Our interior preparation – how we make ourselves ready for Christ now, and at the end of time – is the focus of Advent. It is an opportunity for repentance, and a joyful new beginning in our relationship with God. It is a time to recommit ourselves to the covenant he made with us, and the psalm and the second reading offer assistance in doing so. Make time each day to dive in and explore what Scripture reveals about "conducting yourselves to please God."

PRAY Pray the psalm from the first Sunday of Advent each morning. Ask God to open your heart to ways you can be more just. He will teach you, guide you, and strengthen your heart so that you can stand upright to face whatever challenges come your way.

Your ways, O LORD, make known to me; teach me your paths, Guide me in your truth and teach me, for you are God my savior, and for you I wait all the day.

#### First Sunday of Advent

Consider having an Advent wreath on the kitchen table or in the family room and use it daily during Advent to prepare the hearts and minds of those living in the house for Christmas. For the First Sunday of Advent, the purple candle is lit that represents hope. It is called the "Prophecy Candle" in remembrance of the prophets who foretold the birth of Christ.

The theological virtue of hope is described as an unshakeable trust and assurance that the promises of God will be fulfilled. Pope Francis reminds us that true hope is not built on human words or assurances but on God's Word and His promise of salvation and eternal life.

Two scripture passages that encourage us to be hopeful are: "For I know well the plans I have in mind for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare, not for woe! Plans to give you a future full of hope." (Jeremiah 29:11) and "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope

by the power of the Holy Spirit." (Romans 15:13) Wishing you a Blessed First Sunday and Week of Advent – focus on Hope!

Always verify in person/telephone before sending money or sensitive data. Be suspicious! Make it standard operating procedure to confirm email requests for wire transfer, debit cards, account information or confidential information.
