

From The Pastor's Desk...

Also Known as Chardonnay W(h)ines!



Today we celebrate Epiphany and the most foundational truth of the Christian life can be found in today's gospel. But it is a lesson that we often miss. We miss it because we are not looking in the right place. In today's gospel, it is difficult to keep your eyes off of the wise men. They are foreign and mys-

terious. They come from the East in their exotic robes, riding their peculiar camels, following the star. But when we focus on the wise men, the theme of the gospel is about searching, finding, and the giving of gifts. These themes, however, are not the deepest truth of today's feast. To find that truth we must not look at what the wise men do, but at what Jesus does. And what does Jesus do? He receives the gifts that the wise men offer. This action is arguably the first action of Jesus ever recorded in the gospels: to accept the gifts that are given. It is an action of profound significance because it is an illustration of what is most fundamental about the Christian life – that being a Christian is not about what we do, but what we accept – it is not about giving but about receiving.

This is a difficult lesson for us to learn because we persist in the misconception that our faith is primarily about us, about what we do or what we fail to do. But our faith is not primarily about what we do, but rather about what God does. God has made us and saved us. God's actions are the actions that are at the heart of the gospel. Therefore, the stance of a Christian is primarily a stance of openness, a stance of receptivity. It is only when we can receive the gift that God offers that we know what salvation is truly about.

The gifts offered by the wise men – gold, frankincense, myrrh – symbolize what we are to receive. The gift of gold is a gift of great value and worth. It points to the value and worth of our own lives. We are persons of great worth. God has made us so. God has instilled in us a dignity that is a part of who we are. The gift of frankincense is a mysterious perfume, and it points to the mysterious action of God in our lives. God has a plan. God has a plan for us and for the world. God is working to unfold that plan through all the relationship and opportunities of our lives. It is a mystery we cannot control. We can only accept it and cooperate with it. Myrrh is the ointment of death, and it points to the unavoidable pain which is a part of all of our lives. None of us can avoid evil or pain, whether that come from hurt, rejection, failures, sickness, or grief. But in faith we believe that such pain, as real and as deep as it is, cannot negate our worth and dignity as people. Nor can it frustrate or derail the mysterious plan of God that somehow moves forward despite all that opposes it.

Being a faithful Christian is not about doing. It is about receiving. This is why the first action of Jesus in the gospels is to receive the gifts of the wise men. Jesus receives gold, frankincense, and myrrh to remind us that we need to receive the value of our own person, the mystery of God's action in our life, and the reality that pain and evil cannot stop the plan of God. Those are three gifts we need to receive, for it is only by accepting them that we can follow Christ and fulfill the promise of Christmas.

Hoy celebramos la Epifanía y la verdad más fundamental de la vida Cristiana se puede encontrar en el evangelio de hoy. Pero es una lección que a menudo la perdemos. La dejamos pasar porque no estamos buscando en el lugar correcto. En el evangelio de hoy, es difícil quitar la vista de los sabios. Ellos son extraños y misteriosos. Vienen de

Oriente con sus exóticas túnicas, montados en sus peculiares camellos, siguiendo la estrella. Pero cuando nos enfocamos en los sabios, el tema del evangelio se trata de buscar, encontrar y dar regalos. Sin embargo, estos temas no son la verdad más profunda de la fiesta de hoy. Para encontrar esa verdad no debemos mirar lo que hacen los sabios, sino lo que hace Jesús. ¿Y qué hace Jesús? El recibe los obsequios que le ofrecen los sabios. Esta acción es posiblemente la primera acción de Jesús jamás registrada en los evangelios: aceptar los regalos que se dan. Es una acción de profundo significado porque es una ilustración de lo más fundamental de la vida Cristiana: que ser Cristiano no se trata de lo que hacemos, sino de lo que aceptamos, no se trata de dar, sino de recibir.

Esta es una lección difícil de aprender para nosotros porque persistimos en la idea errónea de que nuestra fe se trata principalmente de nosotros, de lo que hacemos o de lo que dejamos de hacer. Pero nuestra fe no se trata principalmente de lo que hacemos, sino más bien de lo que hace Dios. Dios nos hizo y nos salvó. Las acciones de Dios son las acciones que están en el corazón del evangelio. Por lo tanto, la postura de un Cristiano es principalmente una postura de apertura, una postura de receptividad. Solo cuando podemos recibir el regalo que Dios ofrece, sabemos de qué se trata realmente la salvación.

Los regalos ofrecidos por los sabios - oro, incienso, mirra - simbolizan lo que vamos a recibir. El regalo del oro es un regalo de gran valor y vale la pena. Señala el valor y la dignidad de nuestras propias vidas. Somos personas de gran valor. Dios nos ha hecho así. Dios nos ha inculcado una dignidad que forma parte de quienes somos. El obsequio del incienso es un perfume misterioso y apunta a la acción misteriosa de Dios en nuestras vidas. Dios tiene un plan. Dios tiene un plan para nosotros y para el mundo. Dios está trabajando para desarrollar ese plan a través de todas las relaciones y oportunidades de nuestras vidas. Es un misterio que no podemos controlar. Solo podemos aceptarlo y cooperar con él. La mirra es el ungüento de la muerte y señala el dolor inevitable que forma parte de todas nuestras vidas. Ninguno de nosotros puede evitar el mal o el dolor, ya sea que provenga del dolor, el rechazo, los fracasos, la enfermedad o la pena. Pero en la fe creemos que ese dolor, por real y profundo que sea, no puede negar nuestro valor y dignidad como personas. Tampoco puede frustrar o descarrilar el misterioso plan de Dios que de alguna manera avanza a pesar de todo lo que se le opone.

Ser un Cristiano fiel no se trata de hacer. Se trata de recibir. Por eso la primera acción de Jesús en los evangelios es recibir los obsequios de los sabios. Jesús recibe oro, incienso y mirra para recordarnos que necesitamos recibir el valor de nuestra propia persona, el misterio de la acción de Dios en nuestra vida y la realidad de que el dolor y la maldad no pueden detener el plan de Dios. Esos son los tres regalos que necesitamos recibir, porque solo aceptándolos podemos seguir a Cristo y cumplir la promesa de la Navidad.

The Epiphany of the Lord

Is 60:1-6 | Eph 3:2-3a, 5-6 | Mt 2:1-12

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

My husband is a bird watcher by day and a stargazer by night. I confess it drives me a little bonkers on our evening dog walks. I tend to want to keep moving; between him and our dog (who seems to want to sniff every mailbox), it's the pedestrian equivalent of stop-and-go traffic. Hearing about the journey of the Magi, however, reminds me to pause and look, too. Just as they saw the star rising and followed it to Jesus, we, too, can seek God in our surroundings, our relationships, and the beauty of creation – the next step is to follow where God leads us. As Pope Benedict XVI wrote, the Magi represent "the journeying of humanity toward Christ." (Jesus of Nazareth: The Infancy Narratives) We may falter from the path from time to time, but Isaiah's prophesy reminds us of our destination: "You shall be radiant at what you see, your heart shall throb and overflow."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

The Epiphany is early this year, falling right on the heels of New Year's Day. If we haven't made our New Year's resolutions yet, now is a good time to do so. In addition to typical resolutions such as reducing clutter or getting fit, we can set some spiritual goals as well. The definition of epiphany (lower case) is "a moment in which you suddenly see or understand something in a new or very clear way." As we reflect on today's readings, let us ask the Holy Spirit to provide us an epiphany – into how we can grow closer to Jesus during this year ahead. Just as their encounter with the infant Jesus caused the Magi to be transformed from outsiders to faithful believers, and to take a different route home, our encounter with Jesus in the Eucharist is meant to transform all of us, and set us on a new path to light and life.

RESOLVE New Year's resolutions are great! Why not add a couple of spiritual resolutions to the list - perhaps to pray the rosary more often, spend time in eucharistic adoration, or go on that retreat you have been meaning to attend. Ask the Holy Spirit for inspiration and see where it leads.

Pastoral Care

Happy New Year! Be at Peace!

With the beginning of 2022, take some time to reflect on the meaning of peace in your life and in the world. We are living in a time when we may ask what does it mean to be at peace? We may be fearful as to what is going on around us and not have a sense of peace. How can a person experience peace during the pandemic when COVID-19 cases are on the rise? Peace may be defined as having no conflict. Peace of mind or inner peace is a state of being mentally, emotionally and spiritually at peace. It is keeping the mind at peace regardless of external circumstances.

Consider the following ways to help nurture peace within you. Take time to be quiet as it is in the silence that God speaks. Think about what you have done in the past few days to promote and practice peace. Renew what you must change in order to answer Jesus' call to be a peacemaker. Reflect on your relationships and think what you can do to improve or strengthen them. Be an active participant in your Catholic faith – grow closer in your relationship with God and serve others. Pray that peace may reign in everyone and everywhere in the world. Practice gratitude, be patient, forgive, care for others.

A Christian describes true peace as coming from being in the presence of God. It is knowing that our lives are in God's hands. If we trust God – he will take care of us even through the pandemic, illness, suffering, pain or loss. In scripture, Jesus says, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the

world gives do I give it to you. Do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid." (John 14:27)


