

The Baptism of the Lord

Is 42:1-4, 6-7 or Is 40:1-5, 9-11 | Acts 10:34-38 or Ti 2:11-14; 3:4-7 | Lk 3:15-16, 21-22

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

For cradle Catholics, baptism may be the most important step on the Christian journey that none of us actually remembers. Which is too bad! After all, the Catechism of the Catholic Church instructs us that baptism is "the basis of the whole Christian life, the gateway to life in the Spirit." (#1213) Yes, baptism cleanses us of original sin, but it's much more than that! We need only look to Jesus to see that. Though without sin, Jesus' baptism is a turning point in his life all the same. The Holy Spirit descends upon him and a voice from heaven cries out, "You are my beloved Son." So begins the public ministry, in which Jesus would carry out his Father's saving mission. Through our baptism, at any age, we, too, become God's beloved sons and daughters. Through word and sacrament, Jesus invites us to share in his mission by turning our lives over to our Father as we embrace our Christian journey.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Baptism is often referred to as "the doorway to the Church" because through this sacrament, our sins are forgiven and we are united to Christ and his Church. It is the door which gives access to all the other sacraments. (Cf., CCC 1213) At the conclusion, the celebrant asks God to continue to pour out his blessing upon those being baptized, and send his peace to all who are gathered. As baptized Christians, we are now adopted children of God; we are disciples who are empowered, through the wisdom and strength of the Holy Spirit, to share the Good News and help build the kingdom of God on earth. Sound intimidating? It shouldn't. Each day that we "put on Christ" and do his work, God is re-creating us and making us into something far better than we could ever be on our own. Embrace this faith you have been given and go out and share your gifts and talents with others, confident in the Spirit that guides you.

SERVE Think of something you have been told you are very good at by friends or coworkers – something for which you have been "anointed," in a sense. In what way can you do something specific to lead others with care in this area, or perhaps do a very particular good yourself?

Healthy Eating in 2022

According to the Mayo Clinic, the Mediterranean diet is a heart-healthy eating plan based on the traditional cuisines of Greece, Italy and other countries that border the Mediterranean Sea. The foundation of the diet is plant-based foods, such as whole grains, vegetables, legumes, fruits, nuts, seeds, herbs and spices. Olive oil is the main source of added fat. Fish, seafood, dairy and poultry are included in moderation. Red meat and sweets are eaten only occasionally.

If you would like to follow the Mediterranean diet, the following tips

may help to prepare you to make healthy lifestyle choices. As a plant-based diet, eating seven to ten servings of fruits and vegetables daily is an important part of it. Eating fiber-rich foods helps the body stabilize blood sugar and make you feel fuller. Eat fish twice a week - grilled or baked – not deep fried. Fatty fish such as mackerel, herring, sardines, albacore tuna and salmon are rich in omega-3 fatty acids. These polyunsaturated fats help fight inflammation in the body. Avoid red meat – use fish, poultry or beans instead. Incorporate whole grains. Use healthy fats. Skip the salt. Eat dairy in moderation.

The health benefits of the Mediterranean diet come together by adding aerobic exercise such as running, walking, hiking or swimming. Thirty minutes to an hour of exercise a day will help keep your heart healthy and strong and maintain a healthy weight. For more information about the Mediterranean diet and recipes, check out

www.mayoclinic.org or www.mediterraneanplan.com. As with any diet plan, consult with your health care provider to make sure it is appropriate for you in relation to your medical health status and conditions.

Be Kind and Take Care of Yourself

Self-care is important along with practicing kindness to avoid burnout. People in caregiving professions who continually take on the emotional stress of others may experience burnout more often. Burn out usually occurs when people do not have time or take the time for self-care practices that help them recharge and focus on their own mental well-being.

Consider the following self-care suggestions: take breaks, take a nap, schedule vacation days and truly get away or disconnect, spend time outside, or participate in wellness activities such as meditation, exercise or a hobby. Being kind

to others helps to build a caring community - remember to be kind to yourself so that you can continue to practice kindness every day.

Kindness triggers a neurochemical response in the body as the two feelgood hormones (oxytocin and dopamine) get released and cortisol (the hormone related to stress) decreases. Performing an act of kindness, being the receiver of an act of kindness or witnessing an act of kindness benefit the health of everyone involved. Let's continue to spread kindness and the love of God in what we do and say every day.

Themes of Catholic Social Teaching 1

LIFE AND DIGNITY OF THE HUMAN PERSON

We believe that God created man and woman in his image and thus all people have inherent dignity. There is nothing anyone can do to gain or take away their human dignity, since it is God given, not earned. Because of this, we believe that every life is sacred and that no life—born or unborn—is disposable. All of the principles of Catholic social teaching flow from the core belief that every person has inherent dignity that must be respected. In whom is it easy to see God's image?

Are there people who you struggle to believe are made in God's image? St. John Paul II wrote - "Every individual, precisely by reason of the mystery of the Word of God who was made flesh, is entrusted to the maternal care of the Church. Therefore every threat to human dignity and life must necessarily be felt in the Church's very heart; it cannot but affect her at the core of her faith in the Redemptive Incarnation of the Son of God, and engage her in her mission of proclaiming the Gospel of life in all the world and to every creature." - The Gospel of Life (Evangelium Vitae), no. 3

Pope Francis said - "When we speak of mankind, we must never forget the various attacks on the sacredness of human life. The plague of abortion is an attack on life. Allowing our brothers and sisters to die on boats in the Strait of Sicily is an attack on life. Dying on the job because the minimum safety standards are not respected is an attack on life. Death from malnutrition is an attack on life. Terrorism, war, violence; so is euthanasia. Loving life means always taking care of the other, wanting the best for him, cultivating and respecting her transcendent dignity." - Address to Meeting of the Science and Life Association.

Several steps you can take if you think you have received a scam email.

Double-check the sender's email address. A spoofed email address often has an extension similar to the legitimate email address. You can outsmart them by looking beyond the name and checking the "from" email address to see if it matches what you know the alleged sender's email to be.
