

From The Pastor's Desk...

Also Known as Chardonnay W(h)ines!



If a survey were to be done about the most beloved or most used passages from Paul's writing, the selection we heard today would win hands down. A frequent choice for weddings, people often refer to it as Paul's hymn to love. Despite the way many interpret it today, Paul probably wrote this passage to critique

the Corinthians and their cherished spiritual gifts. He was elaborating on the idea that they had turned genuine religiosity inside out and made it a charade by doing what they did without love. Paul is not criticizing the various gifts people in the community have received. Gifts come from the Spirit – they are good in origin. But unless the gifts are expressions and extensions of love, they are being perverted, and the people who exercise them are making themselves irrelevant at best or even enemies of the Christian cause at worst.

Pope Francis has called the whole church – the people of God – to use their gifts in loving service. To this end, Pope Francis has convoked the Church of God in Synod. Pope Francis has called the global Church to an extensive connection and intentional "listen tour" on the parish level and beyond, to get direct feedback and hear from the people who make up the church communities.

The aim of the Synod is to discern how we are "living the faith" and how, we as a Church, are achieving this together. Synod is an ancient word in the Tradition of the Church whose meaning indicates the path along which the People of God walk together. A fundamental aspect of the Synodal Process is to listen to what the Holy Spirit is saying to the Church and by answering one fundamental question: "How does this 'journeying together' take place today on different levels, allowing the Church to proclaim the Gospel and what steps is the Spirit inviting us to take in order to grow as a synodal Church. The Synod is not about problem solving, but about listening to each other and to the Holy Spirit.

We seek your input through an online questionnaire or by attending one of three in-person listening sessions. These sessions are on: Saturday, February 5th from 1:30pm – 3:30pm; Monday, February 7th from 9:00am to 11:00am; Tuesday, February 8th from 7:00pm – 9:00pm. Please register online to attend one of these sessions.

It is important to remember that the point of this process is the dialogue itself, rather than any consensus or written conclusions. Perhaps discussion will inspire the formation of a new ministry or a new approach to existing ministries. These conversations may inspire a new way of thinking, act as an opportunity to hear new voices, or invite further discussion that extends far beyond the synod. Come, voice your gift!

Desde el Excritorio Del Pastor

Si se hiciera una encuesta sobre los pasajes más queridos o más usados de los escritos de Pablo, la selección que escuchamos hoy ganaría sin duda. Una elección frecuente para las bodas, la gente a menudo se refiere a ella como el himno al amor de Pablo. A pesar de la forma en que muchos lo interpretan hoy, Pablo probablemente escribió

este pasaje para criticar a los Corintios y sus preciados dones espirituales. Estaba elaborando la idea de que habían dado la vuelta a la religiosidad genuina y la habían convertido en una farsa al hacer lo que hacían sin amor. Pablo no está criticando los diversos dones que ha recibido la gente de la comunidad. Los dones vienen del Espíritu, son buenos en origen. Pero a menos que los dones sean expresiones y extensiones del amor, se están pervirtiendo, y las personas que los ejercen se están volviendo irrelevantes en el mejor de los casos o incluso enemigos de la causa Cristiana en el peor de los casos.

El Papa Francisco ha llamado a toda la iglesia, el pueblo de Dios, a usar sus dones en un servicio amoroso. Con este fin, el Papa Francisco ha convocado a la Iglesia de Dios a un Sínodo. El Papa Francisco ha llamado a la Iglesia global a una extensa conexión y a un "recorrido de escucha" intencional a nivel parroquial y más allá, para obtener comentarios directos y escuchar a las personas que conforman las comunidades de la iglesia.

El objetivo del Sínodo es discernir cómo estamos "viviendo la fe" y cómo, nosotros como Iglesia, lo estamos logrando juntos. Sínodo es una palabra antigua en la Tradición de la Iglesia cuyo significado indica el sendero por el que camina el Pueblo de Dios. El aspecto fundamental del Proceso Sinodal es escuchar lo que el Espíritu Santo está diciendo a la Iglesia y responder a una pregunta fundamental: "¿Cómo se realiza hoy este 'caminar juntos' en diferentes niveles, que permite a la Iglesia anunciar el Evangelio y qué pasos nos invita el Espíritu a dar para crecer como Iglesia sinodal. El Sínodo no trata de resolver problemas, sino de escucharse unos a otros y al Espíritu Santo.

Buscamos su opinión a través de un cuestionario en línea o asistiendo a una de las tres sesiones de escucha en persona. Estas sesiones son el sábado 5 de febrero de 1:30 p.m. a 3:30 p.m.; lunes 7 de febrero de 9:00 a.m. a 11:0 a.m.; martes 8 de febrero de 7:00 p.m. a 9:00 p.m. Regístrense en línea para asistir a una de estas sesiones.

Es importante recordar que el objetivo de este proceso es el diálogo en sí mismo, más que cualquier consenso o conclusiones escritas. Tal vez la discusión inspire la formación de un nuevo ministerio o un nuevo enfoque para los ministerios existentes. Estas conversaciones pueden inspirar una nueva forma de pensar, actuar como una oportunidad para escuchar nuevas voces o invitar a más discusiones que se extiendan mucho más allá del sínodo. ¡Ven, expresa tu don!

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Wait, what? One moment the people of Nazareth embrace Jesus, but as soon as he challenges them the crowd turns on a dime, and moves toward throwing him off a cliff. The Son of God, also the son of a carpenter, goes from hometown hero to persona non grata just like that, prefiguring his death on the cross and giving credence to his admonition that "no prophet is accepted in his own native place." From the earliest moments of his public ministry as recorded in Luke, Jesus' love for us is prominent. He never faltered. He never wavered. He moved forward to continue his mission of fulfilling God's will for him, and be a sacrifice once and for all for our sins. Perhaps we have had a similar experience of being the "hero" for someone, only to somehow end up the goat. It is not easy to remain steadfast in our daily mission to love as Jesus loved. Today's readings assure us that God will give us the grace to do so.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

It can be challenging to square Paul's eulogy of love with the reality of day-to-day living with a spouse, family members, and friends. Love is patient ... except when I'm late getting out to the car for church again. Love is kind ... except between crabby siblings who want to watch different shows on Netflix. It is not quick-tempered ... unless you thoughtlessly back into my car in the driveway. It occurs to me that perhaps Paul's words aren't entirely about us, but about the perfect love of God. It's pretty amazing to think that God loves us in all the ways Paul describes. As we open our hearts to God's love and deepen our relationship with Jesus through prayer, we may find that love spilling over into our daily interactions. For when we are kind, we love; when we are patient, we love; when we are not quick-tempered, we love.

PRAY Although our love for one another is imperfect, we must strive to love as Jesus loved each day, and there is no better place to start than prayer. Ask a friend or family member this week if they have any concerns you can include in your prayers. Or request a Mass for someone who is going through a tough time or who has recently died.

Synodal Process - Summary of Collaboration by sub-committee, Updates and Sharing Tasks/Responsibilities:

- The sub-committee met 5 times since being constituted in November 2021.
- The following dates were scheduled for the Synodal listening sessions: Saturday, 2/5 from 1:30pm-3:30pm, Monday, 2/7 from 9am-11am and Tuesday, 2/8 from 7pm-9pm.
 (* Saturday 2/12 from 1:30pm-3:30pm, if necessary). A zoom option is available on Tuesday 2/8.
- Blurb on the Synod process appeared in the church bulletin on 12/26 weekend.
- A sign-up genius was created for participants to register in advance for the listening sessions
- Online and printed feedback forms are available for easy access.
- A large poster was created with QR codes in English and Spanish to be displayed in Narthex.
- DeaconTony Martini has confirmed availability and will serve as main facilitator at listening sessions. A list of names of potentially viable table-facilitators was created, and invitations were sent out on 1/12 to them and Parish Council members, to participate as facilitators/note-takers for the listening session.
- Father Don's Homily on the weekend of 1/8 and 1/9 was a great way to make parishioners aware
 of the Synodal Process.
- A bi-lingual informational video was recorded on 1/5 featuring Fr. Don and Claudia Molina, with help from seminarian Andrew Bogusz. Video was edited on 1/11, and is to be played in the Narthex before and after Masses to promote participation in the Synodal process. Also looking to promote on all digital platforms.
- Weekend of 1/15 and 1/16 is the official launch of synodal consultation sessions facilitated by PPC. Announcement and intercession at Mass on the synod to be included. All PPC members are asked to help.
- Completed printed feedback forms can be returned to the designated drop-box in the Narthex starting 1/22 until the deadline on 1/30.
- The online submission form is due 2/3 (Ash Wednesday).

Seniors Invited to Defer Property Taxes

Qualified senior citizens, aged 65 years and older are invited to apply for the Senior Citizen Real Estate Tax Deferral Program. The program allows participants to defer property tax payment until the property is sold. The deferral is treated as a loan and accrues 6 percent simple interest until paid. To qualify, the applicant's household income cannot exceed \$55,000. Additionally, the property must be used exclusively for residential purposes.
