

From The Pastor's Desk...

Also Known as Chardonnay W(h)ines!



There are many popular fishing shows on television and cable – "Deadliest Catch" and "Wicked Tuna" just to name a couple.

Many people enjoy fishing as a recreational hobby. Just ask Fr. James to show you a picture of himself and the fish he caught

while on vacation in Florida. While fishing isn't as widespread a career as it once was, "catching people" is a well-defined science. Otherwise known as advertising, this art form is designed to hook consumers and take their money, their time and their energy. Once caught, the consumers serve the advertisers' goal. Everyone is together in one net. How many can't resist the urge to get the latest upgrade of their wireless phone!

In today's readings, Isiah, Peter and Paul demonstrate the moral character necessary to become "fishers of men (people)." These wise men of God are brought to their knees by an encounter with the Divine. Isaiah, Peter and Paul fish for people because God has first caught them. Divine light reveals their unworthiness, and they respond appropriately. "Woe is me," exclaims Isaiah. "I am a man of unclean lips." In the longer version of today's second reading, Paul says that he is "the least of the apostles" and "unfit." Peter tells Jesus to leave him, "for I am a sinful man." But if you wish to be caught by God or to go fishing on God's behalf, acknowledging your unworthiness is key. Once Isaiah has announced his unworthiness, his unclean lips are cleansed; his guilt and sin are blotted out. Once Peter is on his knees, he is ready to fish for people. St. Paul says it best: "By the grace of God I am what I am."

Today's readings invite us to become an advertisement for God. Unlike our glossy counterparts in the secular world, we shine from within. Hallowed out by unworthiness, we stand worthy. Our brightness has nothing to do with color or design, money or power. Our salvation history, our journey with the Divine attracts others. This is our calling.

Peter left everything and followed Jesus. We are to do the same. Having a relationship with the Divine is not reserved for prophets and saints. God wishes to connect with each of us. Our stories may not be as dramatic as the biblical ones recounted today, but each of us has a unique salvation history. Are we attentive to the way God moves in our lives? Do we recognize our unworthiness and thereby become worthy? Once caught and in communication with the Divine, we are each called to be a witness — an advertisement. Our response needs to be clear concise and certain. Five words suffice: "Here I am. Send me."

Hay muchos programas populares de pescar en la televisión - "Deadliest Catch" y "Wicked Tuna" para nombrar algunos. Muchas personas disfrutan pescar como un pasatiempo recreacional. Solo pídale a P. James que le muestre una foto de él y el pescado que atrapó mientras estaba de vacaciones en Florida. Aunque pescar ya

no es una carrera tan expandida como alguna vez fue, "pescar personas" es una ciencia bien definida. También conocido como publicidad, esta forma de arte está diseñada para enganchar a consumidores y tomar su dinero, su tiempo y su energía. Una vez atrapados, los consumidores sirven al objetivo de los anunciantes. Todos están juntos en una red. ¡Cuántos no pueden resistir la tentación de actualizar y tener el último modelo de teléfono!

En las lecturas de hoy, Isaías, Pedro y Pablo demuestran el carácter moral necesario para convertirse en "pescadores de hombres (personas)". Estos hombres sabios de Dios se ponen de rodillas por un encuentro con el Divino. Isaías, Pedro y Pablo pescan a personas porque Dios primero los pescó. Luz divina les revela su indignidad, y ellos responden apropiadamente. "¡Ay de mí,", exclama Isaías. "Soy un hombre de labios impuros". En la versión larga de la segunda lectura de hoy, Pablo dice que él es "el último de los apóstoles" e "indigno". Pedro le dice a Jesús que se aleje, "que soy un hombre pecador". Pero si quieres ser pescado por Dios o ir a pescar en su nombre, reconocer tu indignidad es clave. Una vez que Isaías anunció su indignidad, sus labios impuros fueron limpiados; su culpa y pecado fueron borrados. Una vez que Pedro se pone de rodillas, él está listo para pescar a personas. San Pablo lo dice mejor: "Por la gracia de Dios yo soy quien soy".

Las lecturas de hoy nos invitan a convertirnos en un anuncio para Dios. A diferencia de nuestros homólogos brillantes en el mundo secular, nosotros brillamos desde adentro. Aun huecos por nuestra indignidad, permanecemos dignos. Nuestro brillo no tiene nada que ver con color o diseño, dinero o poder. Nuestra historia de salvación, nuestro viaje con el Divino atrae a otros. Esta es nuestra llamada. Pedro dejó todo y siguió a Jesús. Nosotros debemos hacer lo mismo. Tener una relación con el Divino no está reservada nada más para profetas y santos. Dios desea conectar con cada uno de nosotros. Nuestras historias a lo mejor no son tan dramáticas como las de la biblia que fueron contadas hoy, pero cada uno de nosotros tenemos una historia de salvación única. ¿Somos atentos a la manera que Dios se mueve en nuestras vidas? ¿Reconocemos nuestra indignidad y de esa manera nos volvemos dignos? Una vez que somos pescados y en comunicación con el Divino, somos llamados a ser un testigo – un anuncio. Nuestra respuesta necesita ser clara, concisa y cierta. Cinco palabras son suficientes: "Aqui estoy. Envíame."

Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Is 6:1-2a, 3-8 | 1 Cor 15:1-11 or 1 Cor 15:3-8, 11 | Lk 5:1-11

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

We put off all kinds of things for all kinds of reasons. I'll take that trip with my family once my schedule clears up. Someday I'll read that book collecting dust on my shelf. I'll volunteer at church once I get my own act together. Today's readings remind us that God will take us as we are: We need only say "yes." In each of the readings, the protagonists - Isaiah, Paul, and Peter - initially resist God's call, fearing their sinfulness disqualifies them. We may feel that way, too. However, in each case, God forgives their sins and gives them the grace to say, like Isaiah, "Here I am. Send me!" Their assent can be a challenge to those of us who hold back from becoming more involved in our parish or sharing our faith with others, fearing we aren't good enough or aren't an expert in theology. Jesus reminds us that it is ultimately not about us, but him. We don't have to be perfect, just willing to push past our fears and trust him to make disciples of us.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

In today's readings, we hear descriptions of Isaiah's lips touched by a burning ember, Paul being transformed from persecutor to preacher, and the fishermen dropping their nets to follow Jesus. In each case, that turning point led to a life of witness. We may not have such a dramatic story to share, but most of us can look back and see turning points: That influential teacher, the aunt who saw the best in us, a priest, sister, or retreat leader who spoke to our hearts. Today's readings can encourage us to be that person for others – the one who shows them the love of Christ and what a difference it can make. Buoyed by God's grace, we can share the Good News with others and accompany one another as we seek to follow Jesus in our day-to-day lives.

ACT Carve out time to do something spiritual you've been putting off - whether it's a retreat, morning prayer, or perhaps volunteering in a parish ministry or other organization.

February is Heart Health Month

Since the month of February is Heart Health Month, it is an opportunity to evaluate how well you are taking care of your heart — physically, emotionally and spiritually. Heart disease is still a leading cause of death for men, women, and people of most racial and ethnic groups in the United States according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The most common heart condition is coronary artery disease that affects blood flow to the heart.

Heart disease may be "silent" and not diagnosed until a person experiences signs or symptoms of a heart attack, heart failure or an arrhythmia. A person experiencing a heart attack may have chest pain or discomfort, upper back pain or neck pain, indigestion, heartburn, nausea

or vomiting, extreme fatigue, upper body discomfort, dizziness or shortness of breath. A sign of an arrhythmia may be fluttering feelings (palpitations) in the chest. Heart failure may cause shortness of breath, fatigue, and swelling of the feet, ankles, legs, abdomen and neck veins.

Choosing to live a healthy lifestyle will help to keep blood pressure, cholesterol and blood sugar levels normal and lower the risk for heart disease and heart attack. Healthy habits include eating healthy foods, keeping a healthy weight, getting regular physical activity and not smoking. Eat plenty of fresh fruits and vegetables and fewer processed foods. Eat foods high in fiber and low in saturated fat and trans fat and cholesterol to prevent high cholesterol. Limit salt intake to help lower blood pressure.

It is important to take charge of and manage any medical conditions that may increase the risk for heart disease. Take the month of February to make lifelong changes that will improve your heart health and your overall health!



Several steps you can take if you think you have received a scam email.

Double-check the sender's email address. A spoofed email address often has an extension similar to the legitimate email address. You can outsmart them by looking beyond the name and checking the "from" email address to see if it matches what you know the alleged sender's email to be.

Always verify in person/telephone before sending money or sensitive data. Be suspicious! Make it standard operating procedure to confirm email requests for wire transfer, debit cards, account information or confidential information.
