From The Pastor's Desk...

With retirement 136 days away, I have to start thinking about moving – again! This will be the 8th move in forty one years! I am often frustrated by the amount of possessions I have accumulated over the years. It is not only the things I have col-

lected over the forty years of my priesthood, but also the things I brought with me each move. When going through boxes, I find things that were once important and now have no meaning, or at least I have forgotten the meaning. I must wonder why it was so special and why I felt the need to save it. Once I have determined that I no longer want or need the object, I struggle with what to do next. Were there times when those possessions came between me and God. Now, over the years, I have received many religious nick-knacks as gifts from well-intentioned parishioners. However, with a collection of 40 years I could easily open a religious good store! Of course, these religious items have enhanced my devotional and prayer life. Psychologist Carl Jung said, "What is a normal goal to a young person becomes a neurotic hindrance in old age."

In Luke's gospel of the "beatitudes" today, we are reminded of our moral obligation to care for the marginalized. We are taught that sin is when we make choices that separate us from God. Hoarding wealth and ignoring the needs of those less fortunate also separates us from God. Jesus makes it quite clear that it may keep us out of the kingdom. He calls out the rich and preaches that they have received their kingdom on earth. In their world, that have no need for God's mercy because their needs are already being met by the "good life."

But the psalmist reminds us that we can prosper if we chose to live a just life. The rich are not locked out but must let their roots spread to others in kindness and generosity. They can make a choice to hoard their wealth as the poor struggle to survive, or they can bear fruit and share with others.

So what shall I do with the over-abundance of possession that can hinder my relationship with God? I must share them, donate them, or give them away freely so that others may use them. The comfort we seek is found in the kingdom of God, not in wealth or possessions! So, watch for our youth ministry garage sale this summer – several of my treasures just might end up there!

Con la jubilación a 136 días, tengo que empezar a pensar en mudarme, jotra vez! ¡Esta será la octava mudanza en cuarenta y un años! A menudo me siento frustrado por la cantidad de posesiones que he acumulado a lo largo de los años. No son solo las cosas que he coleccionado durante los cuarenta años de mi sacerdocio, sino tam-

bién las cosas que traje conmigo en cada mudanza. Al revisar las cajas, encuentro cosas que alguna vez fueron importantes y ahora no tienen significado, o al menos se me ha olvidado el significado. Debo preguntarme por qué fue tan especial y por qué sentí la necesidad de guardarlo. Una vez que he determinado que ya no quiero ni necesito el objeto, lucho por saber qué hacer a continuación. Hubo momentos en que esas posesiones se interpusieron entre Dios y yo. Ahora, a lo largo de los años, he recibido muchos adornos religiosos como obsequios de feligreses bien intencionados. Sin embargo, con una colección de 40 años, i podría abrir fácilmente una tienda de artículos religiosos! Por supuesto, estos artículos religiosos han mejorado mi vida devocional y de oración. El psicólogo Carl Jung dijo: "Lo que es un objetivo normal para una persona joven se convierte en un obstáculo neurótico en la vejez".

En el evangelio de Lucas de las "bienaventuranzas" de hoy, se nos recuerda nuestra obligación moral de cuidar a los marginados. Se nos enseña que el pecado es cuando tomamos decisiones que nos separan de Dios. Acumular riquezas e ignorar las necesidades de los menos afortunados también nos separa de Dios. Jesús deja bastante claro que esto puede mantenernos fuera del reino. Llama a los ricos y predica que han recibido su reino en la tierra. En su mundo, que no tienen necesidad de la misericordia de Dios porque sus necesidades ya están siendo satisfechas por la "buena vida".

Pero el salmista nos recuerda que podemos prosperar si elegimos vivir una vida justa. Los ricos no están excluidos, sino que deben dejar que sus raíces se extiendan a otros con bondad y generosidad. Pueden tomar la decisión de atesorar su riqueza mientras los pobres luchan por sobrevivir, o pueden dar frutos y compartirlos con los demás.

Entonces, ¿qué debo hacer con la sobreabundancia de posesiones que pueden obstaculizar mi relación con Dios? Debo compartirlos, donarlos o regalarlos libremente para que otros puedan usarlos. ¡El consuelo que buscamos se encuentra en el reino de Dios, no en riquezas o posesiones! Por lo tanto, estén atentos a nuestra venta de garaje del ministerio juvenil este verano, ¡varios de mis tesoros podrían terminar allí!

Jer 17:5-8 | 1 Cor 15:12, 16-20 | Lk 6:17, 20-26

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Luke's account of the Beatitudes pulls no punches. Blessed are you ... who are poor, hungry, weeping, when people hate you. These admonitions bear little resemblance to the pursuit of happiness as most of us know it: Striving for wealth (or at least stability), enjoying a good meal, sharing a laugh with friends, and being well-liked. These are things of this world, and Jesus tells us that pursuing them alone will not make us truly happy. I don't think that means we need to wear sack-cloth and ashes, or refuse to enjoy the great gifts with which God has endowed his Creation. However, Jesus' words remind us that we won't find lasting happiness even in the finest meal or the most lavish vacation, but rather in placing our lives in God's hands. For the desire for happiness "is of divine origin: God has placed it in the human heart in order to draw us to the One who alone can fulfill it." (ccc 1718)

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

It's a little ironic that I am writing a reflection entitled "GROW and GO." Few plants have survived my black thumb. That's why I love the image of the tree in the reading from Jeremiah. One who trusts in the Lord "is like a tree planted beside the waters that stretches out its roots to the stream; it fears not the heat when it comes; its leaves stay green; in the year of drought it shows no distress, but still bears fruit." These words from Jeremiah are a prophecy of hope, and hope allows us to accompany one another through the hills and valleys (and occasional dead plants) of our lives. We can become a source of hope to others by praying for and with one another and encouraging them on their own journeys of faith. In doing so, we help one another tap into the ultimate source of hope – the God who loves us.

STUDY Read the Beatitudes and the Sermon on the Mount and reflect on how Jesus' teachings draw us ever more to himself and highlight our baptismal vocation: holiness. What one thing can you bring to prayer and the sacrament of reconciliation this week to purify your heart?


Important Notice

Double-check the sender's email address. A spoofed email address often has an extension similar to the legitimate email address. You can outsmart them by looking beyond the name and checking the "from" email address to see if it matches what you know the alleged sender's email to be.

Always verify in person/telephone before sending money or sensitive data. Be suspicious! Make it standard operating procedure to confirm email requests for wire transfer, debit cards, account information or confidential information.
