Today in parishes throughout the Diocese of Joliet the Catholic Ministries Annual Appeal (CMAA) is announced. The theme of this year's appeal is "Devoted to the works of the Lord." This appeal funds the many ministries

coordinated by the Diocese of Joliet that serve 545,000 Catholics through all our parishes in the seven county Diocese of Joliet as well as the administrative offices that are necessary to operate as a Diocese. The works of the Lord enabled by your support of the CMAA include the many services available to those in need through Catholic Charities – like the mobile food pantry that we host monthly at OLM as well as other sites throughout the Diocese. Over 19,000 nights of shelter and housing are provide to the homeless. The Appeal helps fund Young Adult and Youth Ministry programs that serve approximately 25,500 of our youth and young adults. The Diocesan Religious Education office provides oversight, guidance, support, training and services for our Directors of family evangelization and catechesis, Mary Jo and Dave. Funds from the CMAA also provide the funding to educate the future priests who will serve our parishes. Right now, there are 26 seminarians being educated for priestly service in our diocese. The CMAA also provide funding for our Diocesan Catholic Schools Office, which provides oversight, assistance and direction to the 51 elementary/high schools educating over 16,000 students in our Diocese. Most importantly, by supporting the annual CMAA, you support the local Church. We are all members of our parish and the Universal Church, which we support financially. The Diocese of Joliet is our Local Church, which also needs your financial support.

Once again this year, I ask your support for the CMAA. Our parish goal this year is \$152,000. Every year that I have been pastor of OLM, we have not only met our parish goal, but surpassed it and have received a rebate check from the Diocese. Our rebate for last year's appeal was \$12,500. This is my last time as a pastor to make an appeal for you to support the annual CMAA of the Diocese. Wouldn't it be nice to go over the goal again and provide the new pastor with some extra funds for ministry at OLM!

May I also ask for your prayerful support as I navigate my new cancer diagnosis. As I shared with you last weekend at Mass, the kidney cancer I had six years ago, has returned and spread to my lungs.

Hoy en las parroquias de la Diócesis de Joliet se anuncia la Colecta Anual de los Ministerios Católicos (CMAA). El tema de la campaña de este año es "Dedicados a las obras del Señor". Esta colecta financia los muchos ministerios coordinados por la Diócesis de Joliet que sirven a 545,000 Católicos a través de todas nuestras parroquias en los siete

condados de la Diócesis de Joliet, así como las oficinas administrativas que son necesarias para operar como Diócesis. Las obras del Señor habilitadas por su apoyo a la CMAA incluyen los muchos servicios disponibles para los necesitados a través de Caridades Católicas, como la despensa móvil de alimentos que organizamos mensualmente en OLM, así como en otros sitios en toda la Diócesis. Se brindan más de 19,000 noches de refugio y vivienda a personas sin hogar. La Campaña ayuda a financiar programas de Ministerio de Jóvenes y Adultos Jóvenes que sirven a aproximadamente 25,500 de nuestros jóvenes y adultos jóvenes. La oficina de Educación Religiosa Diocesana brinda supervisión, orientación, apoyo, capacitación y servicios para nuestros Directores de evangelización familiar y catequesis, Mary Jo y Dave. Los fondos de la CMAA también proporcionan los fondos para educar a los futuros sacerdotes que servirán en nuestras parroquias. En este momento, hay 26 seminaristas en formación para el servicio sacerdotal en nuestra diócesis. La CMAA también proporciona fondos para nuestra Oficina de Escuelas Católicas Diocesanas, que brinda supervisión, asistencia y dirección a las 51 escuelas primarias y secundarias que educan a más de 16,000 estudiantes en nuestra Diócesis. Lo más importante, al apoyar a la CMAA anual, ustedes apoyan a la Iglesia local. Todos somos miembros de nuestra parroquia y de la Iglesia Universal, a la que apoyamos financieramente. La Diócesis de Joliet es nuestra Iglesia Local, que también necesita su apoyo financiero.

Una vez más este año, les pido su apoyo para la CMAA. Nuestra meta parroquial este año es \$152,000. Cada año que he sido párroco de OLM, no solo hemos alcanzado nuestra meta parroquial, sino que la hemos superado y hemos recibido un cheque de reembolso de la Diócesis. Nuestro reembolso por la campaña del año pasado fue de \$12,500. Esta es la última vez que como párroco les hago un llamado para que apoyen la CMAA anual de la Diócesis. ¡No sería bueno pasar la meta nuevamente y proporcionarle al nuevo párroco algunos fondos adicionales para el ministerio en OLM!

También les pido su apoyo en oración mientras navego por mi nuevo diagnóstico de cáncer. Como compartí con ustedes el fin de semana pasado en la Misa, el cáncer de riñón que tuve hace seis años ha regresado y se ha extendido a mis pulmones.



GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Have you heard about the *Civilize It!* initiative? The U.S. bishops launched a campaign to encourage civil dialogue during the contentious 2020 election. Unfortunately, the divisiveness in our nation, and even within the Church, has shown no signs of subsiding, leading the bishops to reboot the campaign last fall. The bishops encourage every Catholic to pledge to be a force for charity, clarity, and creativity in our divided world. Today's Gospel shows us how to do that, starting with the Golden Rule. What strikes me – and challenges me – are the specific examples that remain relevant 2,000 years later: *Love your enemies and do good for them; stop judging; stop condemning; give*. Building on last Sunday's account of the beatitudes, Luke provides us a prescription for how to live a moral and happy life, one that reflects those who "bear the image of the heavenly one."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I am thankful to have people in my life who bring out the best in others, and certainly bring out the best in me. I would guess we can each point to others who have guided and encouraged us: A teacher, a dear friend, a favorite aunt, a neighbor or coach. Today's readings encourage us to be that person for others, even when it's hard. Nobody said being a witness to Christ would be a cake walk! Fortunately, we can turn to prayer and the Scriptures for encouragement. For me, it may begin with small steps, such as listening to those with whom I disagree, not getting drawn into social media debates, and being more generous with my time. As we reflect on today's readings, perhaps we can each choose one change we would like to make or challenge we want to accept as we move into the week and ask God to help us put it into practice.

ACT Praise God each day this coming week. And then challenge yourself to offer a compliment to one person every day as well. Praising God and others puts us in right relationship with God and with our brothers and sisters.

Bishop Hick's Column

Kindness:

The antidote to a cold heart.

February can be one of the coldest months of the year. While we may differ on our preference between cold or hot weather, I think we can all agree no one wants a cold heart. St. Catherine of Siena reminds us that, "Thehuman heart is always drawn by love." However, without attending to our relationship to Jesus, it is all too easy for our hearts to turn cold or even lukewarm. In a homily by Pope Francis given in 2016, the Holy Father exhorted, "A lukewarm heart becomes self- absorbed in lazy living and it stifles the fire of love."

So, how do we keep our hearts from turning cold or lukewarm until the spring comes? In other words, how do we keep our hearts on fire with our love for God and neighbor? While there are many possible ways to accomplish that, let me suggest one yet profound way: namely, the practice of kindness.

Recently in our Blanchette Catholic Center, one of our employees was asked what she wanted for her birthday. She replied with one word, "Kindness." Why did she ask for the gift of kindness? I think it is because she has been inundated with what so many of us have been experiencing, specifically a growing amount of rudeness, anger and unforgiving spirit in an increasinglypolarized world. Anyone who works specifically in customer service, or just with "people" in general, reports a rise in angry outbursts, both verbally and physically.

While we all want others to be more kind to us, we allalso need to work on how to be more kind to others. To do

this, a few years ago, someone introduced me to the "FIVE" rule. If you are ever provoked to respond to someone in an unkind way, ask yourself, "Before any nasty words leave my mouth, how will I feel about what I am about to say in the next five seconds? In five minutes? In five hours? In five days? And in five years? It is possible that we might feel better in the next five seconds, five minutes or even five hours. However, it is always good to take a wider perspective and ask, "Is what I am about to say something I will be proud of or regret in the next five days or five years?"

In the Gospels, Jesus gives us an example of what it looks like to be grounded in kindness. In the times that he is dismissed, criticized, opposed, jeered, mocked, and even tortured physically, he responds with a cumulative and resounding, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they do." As we lean into Jesus, our daily prayer lives help to connect to the Sacred Heart of Jesus as we appeal to his love and mercy.

We may be tempted to reject this movement toward kindness because it may be interpreted as a sign of weakness. We might think, "Fine, I am willing to be kinder to others. But that will not help change the rudeand angry behaviors of so many other people out there!" However, never forget that kindness is wonderfully infectious. As St. Augustine wrote, "One loving heart setsanother on fire." In other words, when we speak and act with kindness, it can spread and multiply in others.

At the Diocese of Joliet, we model and multiply the kindness that Jesus displayed in his life and his works in our ministries. Our Catholic schools teach kindness when students are instructed in Catholic social teaching as part of the regular curriculum. Our Catholic Charities teaches kindness when providing a room for the homeless at Daybreak Shelter or delivering food to the needy through its mobile food pantry. Our adult formation program teaches kindness when accompanying individuals through a study of the Gospels. And our vocations program teaches kindness when helping young men and women discover the fullness of a life devoted to the Lord.

The need for kindness is why the theme for our 2022 Catholic Ministries Annual Appeal (CMAA) is "Devoted to the Works of the Lord." It is through the kindness found woven throughout our works dedicated to God that we find peace and salvation. I hope you agree that none of us wants to have cold or lukewarm hearts. We long for hearts on fire with love of God and neighbor. As we wait for the spring, might we consider to be the change we want to see in the world by practicing kindness frequently. As St. Teresa of Kolkata said, "Let no one ever come to you without leaving better and happier. Be the living expression of God's kindness: kindness in your face, kindness in your eyes, kindness in your smile."



Several steps you can take if you think you have received a scam email.

Double-check the sender's email address. A spoofed email address often has an extension similar to the legitimate email address. You can outsmart them by looking beyond the name and checking the "from" email address to see if it matches what you know the alleged sender's email to be.

Always verify in person/telephone before sending money or sensitive data. Be suspicious! Make it standard operating procedure to confirm email requests for wire transfer, debit cards, account information or confidential information.
