Bishop Hicks has re-instated the obligation to attend Sunday Mass in person effective April 10 – Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion.



Fifth Sunday of Lent

Is 43:16-21 | Phil 3:8-14 | Jn 8:1-11

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

During Lent, we hear familiar stories: the event of Jesus' transfiguration, the prodigal son, and today the woman caught in adultery. Each reveals an aspect of God's perfect love for us and a glimpse of how we can reflect that love toward others. In today's Gospel, the Pharisees once again are testing Jesus, saying the law demands that the woman caught in adultery be stoned. Jesus responds, "Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." What a perfect response to the Pharisees, and to each one of us when we focus on the faults of another. Jesus' words teach and challenge us to look more closely at the ways we judge others - by appearance, a social media post, political party, for example - and ask ourselves whether we are truly doing so out of love. Closer to home, we may be quick to point out our spouse or children's perceived faults, without acknowledging our own. Jesus invites us to look at others - and ourselves - with the eyes of mercy.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Every time we go out to dinner, my son makes fun of me for agonizing over the menu: "You always regret what you pick!" Indeed, regret can be a powerful emotion. Fortunately, the dinner dilemma requires only that I mooch off of my son's entrée. However, deeper regrets can bog us down and prevent us from moving forward in faith. Today's readings challenge us not to wallow in past mistakes, preconceptions, or bad habits. As we hear in Isaiah, "The things of long ago consider not; see, I am doing something new!" We hear this idea again from St. Paul, who writes of "forgetting what lies behind" and straining forward toward "the prize of God's upward calling, in Christ Jesus." In the Gospel, Jesus doesn't dwell on the past sins of the adulterous woman other than to say, "Go, and from now on do not sin any more." Fortunately, our Church offers an antidote to regret and sin in the sacrament of reconciliation. Whether it's been a month or a decade, what better time than Lent to return to this sacrament and experience God's mercy and forgiveness?

Coping with Stress

Since 1992 the month of April has been recognized as *Stress Awareness Month*. If you want to live a healthy and positive life, it is important to learn to cope with stress in healthy ways. Everyone experiences stress in different ways. The most common explanation of stress is a physical, mental, or emotional strain

or tension where a person feels anxious or threatened.

Common reactions to a stressful event may include: disbelief, shock and numbness; feeling sad, frustrated and helpless; difficulty concentrating and making decisions; headaches, back pains and stomach problems; smoking or the use of alcohol or drugs.

Ways to feel less stressed are as follows. Guided meditation to provide centered relaxation can distract you from stress. Deep breathing can help activate the parasympathetic nervous system that helps reduce overall stress and anxiety. Physical exercise relieves stress. The body can be depleted of vitamins such as A, B complex, C, and E. Proper nutrition will help the body deal with stress. It is important to limit social media time as social media sites can be stressful and it takes time away from being with others, being in nature or reading a book. Connecting with others helps foster relationships that can be supportive in difficult and stressful times. It is important to recognize when you may need more help and would benefit from talking with a psychologist, social worker or counselor.

Blessing of Easter Baskets

You and your family are invited to bring your family Easter basket to church on Holy Saturday, April 16 at noon in the Church for a brief service.

The blessing of the Easter Basket, containing the food for the first meal of Easter, has been a beloved Catholic ritual for centuries among families of Eastern European origin. This tradition has since been adopted by people of all ethnic backgrounds, who enjoy its rich symbolism. On Holy Saturday families prepare their Easter Baskets and fill them with symbolic items. The baskets are later brought to church to be blessed during a short service.

The custom of blessing the Easter foods arose from the strict Lenten fasting of the past, when meat, eggs, fats and other foods where forbidden during Lent. Easter was thus greeted with great joy as the day when Christ arose and when fasts were ended. The Church's joy and thanksgiving were expressed in this custom of blessing the foods for the first meal of Easter.

The Christian significance of Easter is symbolized in the items used and foods chosen for this special Easter tradition. Baskets a frequently lined with a white cloth and decorated with ribbons, flowers, and greenery to symbolize spring, renewal, and, of course, the Resurrection of Jesus.

Traditionally, the baskets are filled with:

Decorated hard boiled eggs: Representing Christ's Resurrection.

Lamb-shaped butter or sugar: Representing Christ as the "Lamb of God."

Bread: Reminding us that Jesus is the "Bread of Life."

Meats: Ham is symbolic of great joy and abundance. Sausage is symbolic of God's favor and generosity. Smoked bacon is symbolic of God's mercy. Lamb represents Christ as the "Lamb of God."

Salt: Symbolic of prosperity and justice, and reminding us that we are "the salt of the earth."

Wine: Symbolic of the Blood of the Lord.

Horseradish, pepper, oil and vinegar: Symbolic of the Passion of Christ and the bitter herbs of the Passover.

The food and other items contained in the basket can be easily personalized, even including a sampling of any foods given up for Lent.

A white candle is often inserted in the basket to represent Christ as the "Light of the World."

Lastly, the basket is covered with white linen to symbolize the shroud in which Christ's body was wrapped.
