From The Pastor's Desk...

Due to the COVID pandemic, there has been a dispensation in the Diocese of Joliet from the obligation to attend Mass in person. Today is the effective date in which Bishop Hicks has re-instated the obligation to attend Sunday Mass in person. Of course, those who are sick, homebound, have compromised immunity,

and other illness are not required to attend Mass in person. Easter Sunday will be the last Sunday that we offer communion in the parking lot during the 10:00am livestream Mass. We will continue to livestream the Sunday 10:00am Mass and weekday Masses for the homebound. Communion can be arranged to be brought to your home. Please contact our Pastoral Care Coordinator, Jolene LeRoy, RN who will schedule a trained Minister to the Homebound to bring you communion at your home.

Sometimes I have wondered why palms are so important to people. They show up in the unlikeliest of places: behind bedroom mirrors, tucked away in taxicab visors, woven into crosses, and placed behind crucifixes and other holy pictures. A rather sarcastic view about church being fuller than usual on Palm Sunday is to say it is because we are giving something away free. But let's think about the meaning of palms, as they do tell a story. These simple palm branches remind us of The Greatest Story ever told – a story so boundless that we Christians repeat it every year and revere it as the most significant spiritual event that ever took place. But more than that, these palm branches also tell our story, the story of our own faith life. Five weeks ago, we received ashes on our foreheads and were once again reminded of our sinfulness and our need for a radical change in our lives. But those ashes did not come from the bottom of someone's fireplace. They were the result of blessed burned palms. Today we are five weeks older. The palms we now hold in our hands are new green leaves, reminding us that we are a part of this great story: that it isn't just something that took place 2,000 years ago; that this drama is ongoing; and that we are each involved in our own way in being a part of the conspiracy and the betrayal that happened that night. These palms can remind us that we have played the role of Peter in our own life by lying and denying. They can remind us that we played the role of John when we abandon others in need. They can remind us that we have played the role of Judas in betraying our commitments. But here's the good news about palms: They can also remind us of the miracle of reconciliation that can be ours. Lent begins with palms and ends with palms. The guestion is: What will we do with their promise and the challenge?

A veces me he preguntado por qué las palmas son tan importantes para la gente. Aparecen en los lugares más improbables: detrás de los espejos de los dormitorios, escondidos en las viseras de los taxis, entretejidos en cruces y colocados detrás de crucifijos y otras imágenes sagradas. Una opinión bastante sarcástica acerca de que la iglesia está más llena de lo normal el Domingo de Ramos es decir que es porque estamos regalando algo gratis. Pero pensemos en el significado de las palmas, ya que cuentan una historia. Pero más que eso, estas ramas de palmera también cuentan nuestra historia, la historia de nuestra propia vida de fe. Hace cinco semanas, recibimos cenizas en nuestras frentes y recordamos una vez más nuestra pecaminosidad y nuestra necesidad de un cambio radical en nuestras vidas. Pero esas cenizas no vinieron del fondo de la chimenea de alguien. Fueron el resultado de palmas quemadas bendecidas. Hoy tenemos cinco semanas más. Las palmas que ahora tenemos en nuestras manos son hojas verdes nuevas, que nos recuerdan que somos parte de esta gran historia: que no es solo algo que sucedió hace 2000 años; que este drama continúa; y que cada uno de nosotros estamos involucrados a nuestra manera en ser parte de la conspiración y la traición que sucedió esa noche. Estas palmas pueden recordarnos que hemos jugado el papel de Pedro en nuestra propia vida mintiendo y negando. Pueden recordarnos que jugamos el papel de Juan cuando abandonamos a otros en necesidad. Pueden recordarnos que hemos jugado el papel de Judas al traicionar nuestros compromisos. Pero aquí están las buenas noticias sobre las palmas: también pueden recordarnos el milagro de la reconciliación que puede ser nuestro. La Cuaresma comienza con las palmas y termina con las palmas. La pregunta es: ¿Qué haremos con su promesa y el desafío?

Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion

Is 50:4-7 | Phil 2:6-11 | Lk 22:14-23:56 or Lk 23:1-49

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Palm Sunday can seem like a study in contrasts. We hear the jubilant account of Jesus riding triumphantly into Jerusalem. Then we listen to the Passion narrative, reminded that Jesus' kingship bears little resemblance to royalty as we perceive it. He will suffer and he will die. As Paul describes it, "He humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. Because of this, God greatly exalted him." Jesus tries to explain this to the disciples, who don't fully grasp the events about to take place, instead quarreling over who would be the greatest. Yet even in this chaos of misunderstanding, Jesus continues to teach them, promising that those who stand by him in his trials will join him in the kingdom of heaven. There are certainly times when we fail to fully perceive and understand all that the Lord is teaching us, or why we are undergoing certain trials and difficulties. As we enter into Holy Week, we can ask Jesus to help us understand the meaning of the cross in our own lives, using this time to reflect on the meaning of his sacrifice for each of us.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

As we listen to the Passion narrative, we hear Peter betray Jesus, the soldiers jeer at him, and a passer-by being told to carry Christ's cross. Only Luke's account describes the two criminals, one of whom demanded that Jesus "save yourself and us." The second criminal rebukes him, asking Jesus to "remember me when you come into your kingdom." After Jesus dies, the centurion glorifies God, a good man takes him down from the cross, the women prepare his body for burial. As we enter Holy Week, we will have time to reflect on Jesus' last days, but also on the individuals in the crowd the day he died. How did they react? How would we have reacted? What can we learn from the women who stayed beside Jesus, the criminal who looked beyond his own pain and sin to see Jesus as Messiah, and even Peter in his initial betrayal? During the week ahead, we can also make an effort to attend each liturgy of the Triduum, using this time to deepen our faith as we prepare for Easter.

PRAYER Take time to read the Passion narrative at home.

Invite Jesus into your heart. If you've fallen a little behind on your

Lenten commitments, Holy Week is a great time to hit refresh.

Health Awareness Topic for April

April is designated as Parkinson's Awareness Month. Parkinson's disease is a neurodegenerative disorder that affects predominately dopamine-producing neurons in a specific area of the brain called substantia nigra. Symptoms and their progress differ from one person to another. To live the best way possible with Parkinson's disease, it is important to understand the disease and its progression.

Symptoms may not appear until later in the course of the disease. Scien-

tists are exploring ways for earlier diagnosis so that tailored treatments can be provided to slow down the disease process. Ten early signs may signal that a person has Parkinson's disease. If you have more than one of these signs you should consider making an appointment to talk with a health care provider. The ten signs are: tremor, small handwriting, loss of smell, trouble sleeping, trouble moving or walking, constipation, a soft or low voice, masked face, dizziness or fainting, and stooping or hunching over. If a person has been diagnosed with Parkinson's disease, creating a plan to stay healthy is important. Be examined by a neurologist who specializes in the brain. Receive care from an occupational therapist, physical therapist or speech therapist. Meet with a medical social worker to talk about how the disease will affect their life. Start a regular exercise program to delay further symptoms. Talk with family and friends who can provide support. For additional information check out the Parkinson's Foundation at www.parkinson.org.




