From The Pastor's Desk...

Also Known as Chardonnay W(h)ines!



There is probably someone in your life who was the best teacher you've ever known – in elementary, high school, or college, maybe a coach or advisor of another extracurricular activity. Perhaps it was a relative or mentor who helped you get started in your career or business. The reason that person was your

best teacher is not necessarily the content but the way in which they taught, the example they set for you, the model they presented for the way to live your life. It is very likely that this teacher was only in your life for a brief time — a year, maybe two or three — but their impact has lasted a lifetime. That's why you remember them today. I especially remember Dr. Robert Meyne, chair of the Department of Recreation at Indiana State University. I was a confused undergraduate changing my major for the third time. In meeting with him I immediately felt a special bond — a father figure who encouraged and challenged in the most gentle way. As a senior, I was at the hospital with his wife when he died. I still think of him today, 48 years after his death and appreciate how his example has formed part of who I am today.

Today we celebrate the Ascension of the Lord. The disciples who followed Jesus and witnessed his life and death experienced him as their best teacher ever. Jesus taught them far more than facts and information. He set an example of how to live and empowered his followers so they could take forward his message of salvation. In the Ascension Jesus left them for a final time. But despite his physical absence, Jesus left the disciples with the resources they would need to carry on the mission of his Church. The effects of Jesus' earthly ministry remain with us today. Though the historic events of Christ's life and ministry took place two thousand years ago, he remains with us along with the effects of his teaching and example. The Spirit that Jesus promised to send still gives power to his Church and each of her members. Jesus' ascension is a preview of what will occur for all who believe and follow him!

This weekend we also celebrate Memorial Day. With what has become the "official" start of summer with a day off work, barbecues, opening of swimming pools, and picnics, let us not forget the REAL OFFICIAL meaning of this day. Let us take some time to pause and not only remember, but pray for our citizens who have sacrificed their life by dying in battle for the freedoms we enjoy. May God bless those who gave the ultimate sacrifice, and may God bless our veterans and keep safe all who serve in our military today!

Next Sunday is Pentecost – Come Holy Spirit!

Desde el Excritorio Del Pastor

Probablemente haya alguien en tu vida que haya sido el mejor maestro que hayas conocido, en la escuela primaria, secundaria o universidad, tal vez un entrenador o asesor de otra actividad extracurricular. Quizás fue un pariente o un mentor que te ayudó a comenzar tu carrera o negocio. La razón por la que esa persona fue tu mejor maestro no es necesariamente el contenido, sino la forma

en que enseñó, el ejemplo que te dio, el modelo que presentó para vivir tu vida. Es muy probable que este maestro haya estado en tu vida solo por un breve tiempo, un año, tal vez dos o tres, pero su impacto ha durado toda la vida. Por eso los recuerdan hoy. Recuerdo especialmente al Dr. Robert Meyne, jefe del Departamento de Recreación de la Universidad Estatal de Indiana. Yo era un estudiante universitario confundido que cambiaba mi especialidad por tercera vez. Al reunirme con él, inmediatamente sentí un vínculo especial: una figura paterna que alentaba y desafiaba de la manera más gentil. Como estudiante de último año, estaba en el hospital con su esposa cuando él murió. Todavía lo recuerdo hoy, 48 años después de su muerte, y aprecio cómo su ejemplo ha formado parte de lo que soy hoy.

Hoy celebramos la Ascensión del Señor. Los discípulos que siguieron a Jesús y fueron testigos de su vida y muerte lo experimentaron como su mejor maestro. Jesús les enseñó mucho más que hechos e información. Dio ejemplo de cómo vivir y empoderó a sus seguidores para que pudieran llevar adelante su mensaje de salvación. En la Ascensión Jesús los dejó por última vez. Pero a pesar de su ausencia física, Jesús dejó a los discípulos los recursos que necesitarían para llevar a cabo la misión de su Iglesia. Los efectos del ministerio terrenal de Jesús permanecen con nosotros hoy. Aunque los eventos históricos de la vida y el ministerio de Cristo tuvieron lugar hace dos mil años, él permanece con nosotros junto con los efectos de su enseñanza y ejemplo. El Espíritu que Jesús prometió enviar todavía da poder a su Iglesia y a cada uno de sus miembros. ¡La ascensión de Jesús es un anticipo de lo que ocurrirá para todos los que creen y lo siguen!

Este fin de semana también celebramos el Día en que se recuerda a los Caídos en la guerra (Memorial Day). Con lo que se ha convertido en el inicio "oficial" del verano con un día libre de trabajo, barbacoas, apertura de piscinas y picnics; no olvidemos el significado REAL OFICIAL de este día. Tomemos un tiempo para hacer una pausa y no solo recordar, sino orar por nuestros ciudadanos que han sacrificado su vida al morir en la batalla por las libertades que disfrutamos. ¡Que Dios bendiga a aquellos que dieron el sacrificio máximo, y que Dios bendiga a nuestros veteranos y mantenga a salvo a todos los que sirven en nuestras fuerzas armadas hoy!

The Ascension of the Lord DISCIPLE

Acts 1:1-11 | Eph 1:17-23 or Heb 9:24-28; 10:19-23 | Lk 24:46-53

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"Praise Jesus." Those two words pack a powerful punch. We often say them with relief on hearing news of a better-than-expected prognosis, celebrating a milestone, seeing a beautiful sunset, or other moments when we feel God's presence. Jesus' ascension to the Father was clearly one of those moments. After Jesus was taken up into heaven, the Apostles "returned to Jerusalem with great joy, and they were continually in the temple praising God." We might wonder how they could do that, after watching Jesus depart. I think the answer is found in Paul's Letter to the Ephesians. The Apostles had what Paul desired for the people of Ephesus, and for all people: "a Spirit of wisdom and revelation resulting in knowledge of [Christ]"; enlightened hearts that know "the hope that belongs to his call" for all who believe. The Lord has brought us salvation: "Sing praise to God, sing praise; sing praise to our king, sing praise."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Jesus said, "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, throughout Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." The Apostles took Jesus' words to heart, and we must too. In a homily in 2013, Pope Francis said: "The Ascension does not point to Jesus' absence, but tells us that he is alive in our midst in a new way. He is no longer in a specific place in the world as he was before the Ascension. He is now in the lordship of God, present in every space and time, close to each one of us." As the two men clothed in white reminded the Apostles, Jesus will return. And we know that he is not distant, but that he is fully present to us in a new way. His presence is felt through the workings of the Holy Spirit in our lives and in the sacraments.

GIFTS OF THE SPIRIT Remember confirmation? A refresher on the gifts of the Spirit can serve as inspiration when we have a big decision to make or need guidance in our everyday lives: wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety and fear of the Lord.

Pastoral Care

Mary: Model of Faith

Last year in May we had a virtual afternoon of reflection that. I wanted to repeat the article since this is the month of Mary. The presenter, Kate Wicker, popular Catholic speaker and author deepened our understanding of Mary and our relationship with her. Mary loves with a mother's love and takes us under her mantle. Turn to Mary for comfort, strength and courage. Mary accepted everything in her life with grace even if she did not understand. She said "yes" to God and followed His will.

Mary can help us accept our crosses in life as she suffered and was at the foot of the cross watching her son suffer. When we accept our crosses – that is faith personified. We can be a Simon or Veronica to others as they experience their cross. In the Magnificat, Mary knew that God had done great things for her and was aware of her female nature. As women, we have unique gifts to share. The world is hungry for a woman's gentle touch and love. Women see with their hearts.

Kate reminded us that as women we possess a divine beauty and can bring Jesus to others in the everyday activities of our life, in whatever role we are in - as a mother changing diapers of her infant, as a woman reaching out to a neighbor with a meal, being kind in matters at work or offering a smile to a stranger. We are to see Jesus in others - ask yourself if others can see Jesus in you?

How is Your Blood Pressure?

The month of May is designated as *High Blood Pressure Education Month*. It is an opportunity to learn about what is normal blood pressure compared to high blood pressure. Blood pressure is the pressure of blood pushing against the walls of the arteries. The first number (systolic blood pressure) measures the pressure in the arteries when the heart beats. The second number (diastolic blood pressure) measures the pressure in your arteries when the heart rests between beats. A normal blood pressure is less than 120/80 mmHg. When was the last time that you had your blood pressure taken and was it normal or above normal?

The reason that it is so important to know your blood pressure levels is because the higher the blood pressure, the more risk there is for heart disease, heart attack, stroke, kidney disease or eye problems. Many people do not know that they have high blood pressure because there are usually no warning signs or symptoms and it is often called the "silent killer".

There are ways to prevent or manage high blood pressure. Be active about thirty minutes a day at least five days a week. Be a non-smoker. Eat a healthy diet, of a variety of fruits and vegetables and limit sodium and alcohol. Maintain a healthy weight. Manage your reaction to stress with healthy coping strategies. Some people may need to take medicine to manage their blood pressure even when making positive lifestyle choices. That is why it is important to regularly measure your blood pressure and talk with your health care providers about your blood pressure. (Source: Centers for Disease Control and Prevention)

Always verify in person/telephone before sending money or sensitive data. Be suspicious! Make it standard operating procedure to confirm email requests for wire transfer, debit cards, account information or confidential information.
