Today is Divine Mercy Sunday. Someone asked me if I could give a simple explanation of what the Divine Mercy devotion is all about. It's as simple as ABC. **A** – Ask God for His Mercy. God wants us to approach Him in prayer

constantly, repenting of our sins and asking Him to pour His mercy out upon us and upon the whole world. **B** – Be merciful. God wants us to receive His mercy and let it flow through us to others. He wants us to extend love and forgiveness to others just as He does to us. **C** – Completely trust in Jesus. God wants us to know that all the graces of His mercy can only be received by our trust. The more we open the door of our hearts and lives to Him with trust, the more we can receive. It's that simple!

Today's gospel has long be labeled as "Doubting Thomas." Scripture scholars maintain he doesn't deserve that label. Whether he does or not, rare is the person who has never experienced the grey cloud of doubt in his or her spiritual life. Thomas is acquitted of doubt based on this precise definition of doubt: "The refusal to believe even after one has received confirming evidence." As soon as he experienced the in-person confirming evidence (seeing the nail marks and putting his hand in Jesus' side) Thomas confessed his faith. Doubt is not proof of a weak faith, nor is it an act of disloyalty. Mother Teresa spent years feeling God was so distant that she doubted whether he truly cared, loved, or sometimes even existed. Yet she continued faithfully carrying out her mission of lovingly caring for the poorest of the poor. Thomas Merton, the American monk whose spiritual writings are still read by millions, wrote, "Faith means doubt. Faith is not the suppression of doubt. It is the overcoming of doubt, and you overcome doubt by going through it."

So, when in doubt, turn to God's Divine Mercy!

Hoy es el Domingo de la Divina Misericordia. Alguien me preguntó si podía dar una explicación sencilla de qué se trata la devoción a la Divina Misericordia. Es tan simple como el ABC. A – Pide a Dios Su Misericordia. Dios quiere que nos acerguemos a Él en oración constante-

mente, arrepintiéndonos de nuestros pecados y pidiéndole que derrame Su misericordia sobre nosotros y sobre el mundo entero. **B** – Sé misericordioso. Dios quiere que recibamos Su misericordia y la dejemos fluir a través de nosotros hacia los demás. Él quiere que extendamos el amor y el perdón a los demás tal como lo hace con nosotros. **C** – Confía completamente en Jesús. Dios quiere que sepamos que todas las gracias de Su misericordia sólo pueden ser recibidas por nuestra confianza. Cuanto más le abramos la puerta de nuestro corazón y de nuestra vida con confianza, más podremos recibir. ¡Es así de simple!

El evangelio de hoy ha sido etiquetado durante mucho tiempo como "Tomás el incrédulo". Los estudiosos de las Escrituras sostienen que el no merece esa etiqueta. Ya sea que lo haga o no, rara es la persona que nunca ha experimentado la nube gris de la duda en su vida espiritual. Tomás es absuelto de la duda en base a esta definición precisa de duda: "La negativa a creer incluso después de haber recibido evidencia confirmatoria". Tan pronto como experimentó la evidencia confirmatoria en persona (ver las marcas de los clavos y poner su mano en el costado de Jesús), Tomás confesó su fe. La duda no es la prueba de una fe débil, ni es un acto de deslealtad. La Madre Teresa pasó años sintiendo que Dios estaba tan distante que dudaba si realmente le importaba, amaba o, a veces, incluso existía. Sin embargo, continuó cumpliendo fielmente su misión de cuidar con amor a los más pobres de los pobres. Thomas Merton, el monje estadounidense cuyos escritos espirituales aún son leídos por millones, escribió: "Fe significa duda. La fe no es la supresión de la duda. Es la superación de la duda, y se supera la duda al atravesarla".

Entonces, en caso de duda, ¡vuélvete a la Divina Misericordia de Dios!

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE


In today's Gospel, Thomas gets singled out as the one who doubts that Jesus had risen from the dead. But the other Gospels reveal that the other disciples doubted too. I understand why they had trouble believing that Jesus was alive. To think that God loves us enough that he chose to become human to die for our sins is incomprehensible. To accept that he loves us this deeply is almost unbearable. It seems doubtful anyone can love us that much. It seems doubtful that we deserve to be loved that much. It is much easier to doubt than to believe. But Thomas was the first to publicly proclaim the man Jesus as also God: My Lord and my God! he says. The risen Jesus had come into the room, although the doors were locked, and called them back into belief. Through Christ, God shows the disciples - and us - the extent of his love and mercy. We are worth it, even when we doubt, even when we fail. His death and resurrection are testament to that. He will walk through whatever walls exist to tell us. No doubt about it.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

The reading from the Acts of the Apostles today describes the reaction to the apostles' joyful and confident proclamation that Jesus was Lord and God after receiving the Holy Spirit. The crowds drew near just to have Peter's shadow fall upon those who were sick. God's mercy has no bounds. How can we be like the first disciples? In what ways do our lives reflect God's mercy on us? Where can our own "shadows fall" so that God's goodness and grace can bring healing and comfort to others? Let us begin our days by giving "thanks to the Lord for he is good, his love is everlasting," and trust that the Holy Spirit will both remind us of our blessings and continued need for mercy, and guide us to encounters with others who need the same.

PRAY During this Easter season, read a passage from the Acts of the Apostles each day and immerse yourself in the history of the early Church. End your time of reflection by praying the Apostles' Creed, the statement of beliefs of Christians in the first centuries after Jesus' death and resurrection.

As people age health problems such as cognitive decline, depression and heart disease may be factors contributing to loneliness. Isolation and loneliness are two different things. Isolation is a physical separation from other people. Loneliness is emotional and can be experienced by anyone but seems to increase with age. Someone who is lonely experiences the subjective feeling of being alone or separated

Studies show that loneliness can lead to increased risks of high blood pressure, heart disease, anxiety, depression, obesity, cognitive decline, Alzheimer's disease and death. There are ways to combat loneliness. Find a cause and volunteer. It is a way to connect with others and help others. Start a gratitude or blessings journal. Writing down what you are thankful for or feel that is a blessing in your life. It gives you an improved outlook on life which leads to positive feelings. Help for the homebound. If you are unable to go out to be with others or do not know ways to connect with others – reach out.



Always verify in person/telephone before sending money or sensitive data. Be suspicious! Make it standard operating procedure to confirm email requests for wire transfer, debit cards, account information or confidential information.
