GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Is it me, or does every popular waiting-room magazine feature an article on “how to declutter” in six easy steps? I always read those first, then add them to the unsightly pile of magazines on the end table. The constant, if futile, quest to declutter comes from a deeper place than a desire for a clean house. It feels so liberating to let go of those things that we no longer need. Today’s readings challenge us to look not just outward, but inward, at what distracts us from what really matters. Paul exhorts us to “seek what is above,” letting go of earthly concerns or habits that get in the way of our relationship with God. By putting on a “new self” through prayer, the sacrament of reconciliation and receiving Jesus in the Eucharist, we will become “rich in what matters to God.”

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Personal-finance writers often divide people into two camps: Savers or spenders. I’m definitely a saver! I dutifully contribute to my 401K, stash unexpected windfalls into my savings account, and carefully budget. On the rare occasions when I go out to dinner, I struggle with choosing what to order: It’s a high-stakes decision! Fiscal responsibility is a good thing, but today’s parable challenges me to be just as diligent about investing in my relationship with God, my family, and the people I encounter. We are blessed with so many opportunities to “seek what is above”: It may mean spending the first 30 minutes of the day in prayer, reading books or articles that help us grow spiritually, or joining a parish Bible study. Or even taking a friend to dinner and picking up the tab! In doing so, we are investing in this life – and the next.

ACTION Take a look around your house and donate items in good condition to a charity in your community. And then ask the organization if they need any help with a summer yard cleanup or simple tasks around the facility – these are easy ways to involve the whole family in serving others.

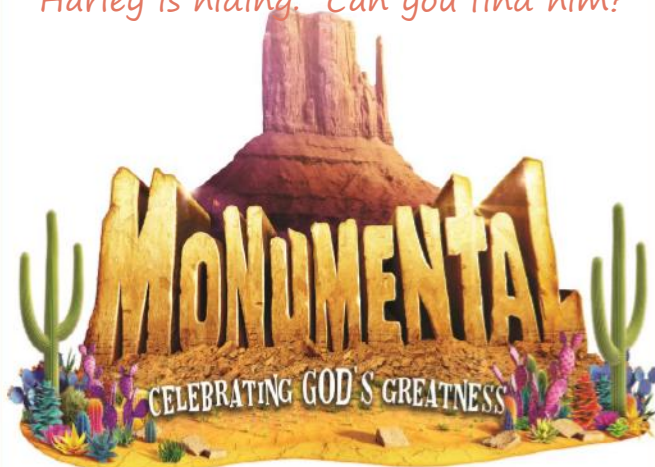

This week during OLM's Vacation Bible School, campers will participate in a daily learning station where they explore the principles of Catholic Social Teaching by hearing witness stories from parishioners, staff members, and friends from the wider community who are serving our brothers and sisters in need. One of our friends is presenter, Carrisa Zaffiro, from **Exodus World Service**. She is an outreach mobilization manager for refugee children and their families. Some other "in-house" friends include Jolene LeRoy, Maybird D'Silva, Jean and Deacon Phil Rehmer who serve in leadership roles with OLM's **Ministers of Care** and coordinate, cook, and serve meals once a month at **Hesed House**.

Our "Faith into Action" activity to care for refugee children is to ask one another in the VBS community, and you, the parish family at large, to donate school supplies and/or a quality backpack to refugee children in the DuPage County area who will be attending school for the first time in the United States. Backpacks will be donated locally to **Hesed House** as well.

Our goal on Friday, August 5 is to have our VBS campers take service into their own hands by helping to prepare dozens of backpacks for children PreK through Grade 5, the same age of our campers. This will bring home to their hearts what is meant by our Catholic social principles, *Call to Family, Community, and Participation, Option for the Poor, and Life and Dignity of the Human Person*.

AN UPDATE FROM FR. DON.....

Pope Francis offered advice on about how to live in retirement fruitfully by leaving "a legacy of good, rather than just goods."

Speaking during his general audience on May 11, the pope said that retirement can be a "time to leave a good legacy of wisdom, tenderness, and gifts for the family and the community." "When we think of an inheritance, at times we think of goods, and not of the goodness that is done in old age, and that has been sown. That goodness is the best legacy we can leave," he said in St. Peter's Square. Now that I am retired, I've been pondering those words and wondered if I've left a legacy of goodness. Reading all your notes in the cards and emails I received, I take great comfort in knowing I have left some goodness. I sit on the balcony of my condo and treasure re-reading them. Again, thank you for your kindness and generosity as I retired.

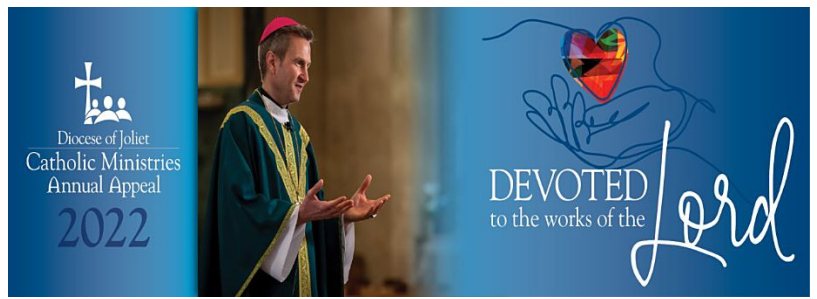
Regarding my health....the CT Scan I had on June 20 showed no significant change to the cancer in my lungs. However, the bloodwork showed I am very anemic, which explains my constant fatigue and shortness of breath the I've experienced the past nine months.

At my oncologists' direction, I am now taking an iron supplement 3x daily, and a ___ ___ load (pun intended) of laxatives to counter the effect of so much iron! It isn't a pleasant experience! This routine goes until September 13. Then bloodwork at and CT scan again.

Ministerially, I have started celebrating Mass at Marianjoy on the second and fourth Sundays of the month at 2:00pm. I will begin my 10 hour a week volunteer chaplaincy at Marianjoy sometime in August. I have celebrated Sunday Mass at various parishes and have done some funeral service outside of Mass at local funeral homes. In August I will start a regular scheduled of celebrating Sunday Mass at St. John the Baptist in Winfield. They have four weekend Masses and only one priest. Please keep my health issues in your prayers.
