

News from P.I.T (Pastor in Training)



Sometimes I fall into my autopilot responses. When I am in conversation with my family such as my parents, sister, aunts and uncles, I can find myself ending our conversations with "Okay. Love you, Goodbye." But you have to be careful with these responses, as they can possibly get you into trouble. A few years ago, at my previous parish, the church secretary reached out to me about an upcoming funeral. As we wor-

ked out the details and we were coming to the end of our conversation, I went into my autopilot response. "Okay. Love you, Goodbye." I hung up the phone and then I realized I had just professed my love to my church secretary. What I learned that day: going into autopilot responses can be dangerous.

I hope after the reading of our Gospel this weekend you didn't just go into autopilot and say, "Praise to you Lord, Jesus Christ." Jesus in the Gospel brings a difficult truth to the Gospel: "Do you think that I have come to establish peace on the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division." Did you pause to reflect on how this is in the Gospel? How is this Good news?

What we need to come to realize is the division isn't from God, the division lies in our own hearts. None of us is perfect and we all need God's mercy. But, to receive that mercy, we need to acknowledge the need to change. Change can be difficult and painful. Hence, people's rejection of change leading to division.

Why should we truly say "Praise to you Lord, Jesus Christ" for this Gospel? We should claim it all the more because the Lord loves us so much. God desires to not leave us where we are at. He desires to draw us to Himself. He calls us to become a new creation in him. Let us ask God for the grace, as St. Paul says to "rid ourselves of every burden and sin that clings to us and persevere in running the race that lies before us while keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus."

A veces caigo en mis respuestas de piloto automático. Cuando estoy conversando con mi familia, como mis padres, hermana, tías y tíos, puedo terminar nuestras conversaciones con "Está bien. Te quiero, Adiós". Pero debes tener cuidado con estas respuestas, ya que posiblemente te puedan meter en problemas. Hace unos años, en mi parroquia anterior, la secretaria de la iglesia me contactó sobre un próximo funeral. Mientras resolvíamos los detalles y es-

tábamos llegando al final de nuestra conversación, entré en mi respuesta de piloto automático. "Está bien. Te quiero, Adiós". Colgué el teléfono y luego me di cuenta de que acababa de declararle mi amor a la secretaria de mi iglesia. Lo que aprendí ese día: entrar en respuestas de piloto automático puede ser peligroso.

Espero que después de la lectura de nuestro Evangelio este fin de semana no hayas entrado en piloto automático y dicho: "Alabado seas Señor, Jesucristo". Jesús en el Evangelio trae una verdad dificil al Evangelio: "¿Piensan acaso que he venido a establecer paz en la tierra? De ningún modo. No he venido a traer la paz, sino la división". ¿Te detuviste a reflexionar en cómo es esto en el Evangelio? ¿Cómo es esto una Buena noticia?

Lo que debemos darnos cuenta es que la división no proviene de Dios, la división se encuentra en nuestros propios corazones. Ninguno de nosotros es perfecto y todos necesitamos la misericordia de Dios. Pero, para recibir esa misericordia, necesitamos reconocer la necesidad de cambiar. El cambio puede ser difícil y doloroso. Por lo tanto, el rechazo de la gente al cambio conduce a la división.

¿Por qué deberíamos decir verdaderamente "Alabado seas Señor, Jesucristo" por este Evangelio? Debemos afirmarlo aún más porque el Señor nos ama tanto. Dios desea no dejarnos donde estamos. Él desea atraernos hacia Él. Nos llama a convertirnos en una nueva creación en él. Pidamos a Dios la gracia, como dice San Pablo para "dejar todo lo que nos estorba y librarnos del pecado que nos ata, para correr con perseverancia la carrera que tenemos por delante, manteniendo fija la mirada en Jesús".

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

My mom loved her Nintendo 64. We especially enjoyed "Paperboy," a video game where a paperboy riding a bicycle attempts to deliver newspapers along Easy Street, Middle Road, or Hard Way. He has to avoid obstacles that pop up along the way barking dogs, mailboxes, skateboarders, trash cans, you name it! Sometimes life can seem that way. We can't predict which obstacles will pop up, but the author of the Letter to the Hebrews encourages us to persevere, "keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus." Whether we're riding along "Easy Street" or "Hard Way," we can look to Jesus to help us overcome the hardships that may come our way because we are his followers. As Jesus tells the disciples, following him will not always be easy and may even result in conflicts within our families. When that happens, we can look to the example of Jesus and the great "cloud of witnesses" to whom the Letter to the Hebrews refers, knowing that peace and reconciliation await us at the finish line.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I used to have great fun watching my boys at our neighborhood swim meets. Even as my then-7-year-old zig-zagged into the lane lines during the backstroke, I would yell "Go! Go! Go! You've got this." (And, please, someone catch his head at the finish!) He couldn't hear a word I said. I wonder if it's a bit like this when it comes to the "cloud of witnesses" – the saints, known and unknown, who encourage us in our faith. We can't see them or hear them, but we know they are there. In turn, we can become cheerleaders for others running the race alongside us: offering encouragement, prayers, and reminding one another of the joy that awaits us. Spoken or silent, our prayers can help us and others persevere in our faith and place our trust in Jesus when times are tough.

STUDY The *catechism* chapter 3, The Characteristics of Faith (153-165), references this passage from Hebrews on being surrounded by a cloud of witnesses. Read especially #165.

Marking 20 Years of Reforms to Protect Children

During a recent conversation with a longtime friend, she mentioned she had just signed up to volunteer at her parish by teaching religious education to fifthand sixth- graders. I was overjoyed to hear that she was going to use her talent and time to pass on our faith to our

When my friend told me of the multistep process she had to go through to be approved as a volunteer, I nodded my head in understanding - and waited for a complaint. Instead, she said she was impressed by and proud of her Church for its commitment to keeping children safe.

As a bishop, I was heartened to hear her words, especially when we in the Catholic Church are this year marking the 20th anniversary of the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People. Known as the Charter, this document sets out a mandated blueprint tens to, affirms and connects the indifor dioceses to follow to create a safe environment for children and vulnerable adults in our churches, schools and activities.

My friend, like all other volunteers who work with minors and vulnerable adults in the Catholic Church, had to submit to a criminal background check. She also created an account with the parish administrator of a national training program that combats child sexual abuse. She then took the training class, followed by a class on mandated reporting of child abuse or neglect required by the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS). She also was required to read the Diocese of Joliet's policy regarding sexual abuse of minors and vulnerable adults, in addition to the diocesan standards of behavior for those working with minors and vulnerable adults. She signed and dated forms stating she had read these policies and standards.

She also filled out a volunteer application.

None of these steps is intended to discourage volunteers, but the Catholic Church is committed to creating and maintaining a safe environment for minors in all situations. All diocesan clergy and employees follow the same process, with the addition of reading monthly continuing education materi-

The Charter also puts in place a transparent and supportive process to receive and respond to allegations of sexual abuse by clergy of individuals when they were minors. The Catholic Church takes seriously every allegation that is brought forth, be it reported by an individual who suffered abuse or a third party. The firststep is always the same: All allegations of abuse and/or neglect of minors are encouraged to be reported to the state child welfare agency - the DCFS hotline (1-800-25- ABUSE) here in Illinois and the local civil authorities.

Dioceses also report the allegation to these agencies, and offer the help of a victim assistance coordinator to the individual who suffered the abuse. The victim assistance coordinator lisvidual with the appropriate services. This same pastoral care is offered when the alleged abuser is deceased.

Dioceses then undertake an investigation into the abuse allegation. The same investigative process is followed when the accused priest or deacon is deceased or already listed on the diocesan list of credible allegations of sexual misconduct with minors. If the priest or deacon is in active ministry, he is removed while the investigation is ongoing and advised of his right to counsel. If public authorities conduct a criminal investigation against the cleric, the diocese defers its own investigation until that public inquiry is concluded, and cooperates fully with civil authorities.

Following the diocesan investigation, allegations against clergy not on the diocesan public list go before the diocesan review board. The Charter requires this panel to be composed of a majority of lay people not employed by the diocese and to include a pastor and a person with expertise in the treatment of minors who have been sexually abused.

The review board advises the bishop in his assessment of the allegations and the cleric's suitability for ministry. Priests or deacons determined to have credible allegations are permanently removed from ministry and placed on the diocesan list, which is published on the diocesan website. When the allegation is found to be unsubstantiated, the cleric isreturned to active ministry.

The most recent report on the implementation of the Charter - dated May 2022 - shows the impact of the Catholic Church's commitment to protecting minors and vulnerable adults. The number of credible allegations reported against clergy nationwide has decreased from ahigh of 162 in the five-year period from 1970-1974 to four in 2021. Policies, procedures and data inform our vigilance against abuse, yet we must always keep sight of the victim/ survivors. Thankfully, no new credible allegations have surfaced during my time in the Diocese of Joliet, yet Ihold in my heart a mantra I learned while serving as vicar general of the Archdiocese of Chicago: "Any decision we make should be made as if the child were in the center of the room." +

SEEK is our great story of faith. It is the Biblical texts that describe the stories of being created in love (and for love), being captured by sin, rescued by Jesus Christ, and our response to the Holy Spirit as builders of the kingdom of God. Both children and parents enroll in SEEK, enjoying their two separate learning experiences, culminating with a family prayer. The series is comprised of four, on-site sessions - a journey to discover anew the good news of our faith.

What is SEEK FOR PARENTS?

Seek for Parents is a small group experience designed just for parents. Throughout the SEEK journey you are guided through discussions, activities, reflections, plus video witness talks and teachings intended to lead each participant to know and grow in relationship with our God of love. As parents, you are given a shared vocabulary to begin conversations of faith with your children at home.

What is SEEK FOR CHILDREN?

Seek for Children is a VBS style experience designed for children in grades K-5. Through songs, activities, and video teachings, your children will get to know a God who is love and be given a shared vocabulary to begin to discuss and ask questions about their faith, with you, their parents.

ROOT follows the SEEK series and begins in the month of November. ROOT is a learning experience of our foundational beliefs that we recite in the Creed at every Mass. Both children and parents attend each of the ROOT gatherings. Parents and children explore their faith in distinct learning experiences, culminating with a family prayer. The series is comprised of six, on-site sessions, equipping parents to lead a relatable family faith experience at home, allowing the family to discover meaning and grow deep roots in the knowledge and practice of our core beliefs.

What is ROOT FOR PARENTS?

Root for parents is designed to guide parents to know the Trinity and the essential teachings of our faith contained in the Creed. Parents are given a vocabulary of faith and empowered with the knowledge to share the faith with their families.

What is ROOT FOR CHILDREN?


In grade level groups, children come to know the Trinity and the essential teachings of our faith contained in the Creed through the guidance of trained catechists.

MEND is a First Reconciliation family learning experience. Families will encounter Jesus and discover the beauty of Reconciliation as it connects to daily life through innovative faith activities such as forming clay, making field goals, reading Scripture, engaging in meaningful conversation, and much more.

MEND is designed to equip parents to teach, share faith, and pray with their children through both on-site participation in community with other families as well as taking the lead with a few at-home MEND meetings. This combination of on-site and at-home gatherings provide a life-giving partnership between the parish community and each household of faith.

NOURISH is a First Communion family experience designed to equip parents to teach, share faith, and pray with their children as they participate on-site and lead at-home family meetings through a variety of hands-on and innovative activities. A total of ten themes of family life connected to the prayer of the Mass will be experienced deepening a family's awareness of God's real presence of love at home in the celebration of the Eucharist at every Mass.

Families will encounter Jesus and experience the beauty of the Mass as it connects to daily family life by building puzzles, baking, reading Scripture, engaging in meaningful conversation, and much more. Sacramental preparation is enhanced by parent and family participation.

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
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
