"Let us never assume that if we live good lives we will be without sin; our lives should be praised only when we continue to beg for pardon. But men are hopeless creatures, and the less they concentrate on their own sins, the more interested they become in the sins of others. They seek to criticize, not to correct. Unable to excuse themselves, they are ready to accuse others." ~ St. Augustine

I am always drawn to this quote by St. Augustine, because it points to the fact without seeking God's mercy and growing in humility, we end up falling into pride and judgment of others. Have you ever noticed when you push down on in an object, you in return push yourself up? I don't know if we subconsciously know this or just out of our brokenness and sinfulness, but we love to pass judgment on others. When we judge others or when we gossip about others faults, we lift ourselves up in our pride and we glorify in the fact that at least we are not like them.

Clearly this is sinful and we need to reject this inclination because this is contrary to the life and mission of Jesus Christ. Jesus, who is the Son of God, had every right, as God, to push down through judgement, but he doesn't. From the power of his infancy narrative where Jesus comes not in majesty and power, but in simplicity and poverty. Jesus enters into the midst of our lives not to push us down, but by his life, death, and resurrection, lift us up in his mercy and love!

That is what our readings are encouraging us to do; to continue to grow in humility. By doing so, we not only find favor with God, as our first reading says, we act more and more like Christ. When we humble ourselves, we allow God to exalt us. May we be strengthened by our readings and the Eucharist to always seek to grow in humility, seek God's endless mercy, and lift those around us up.

Siempre me atrae esta cita de San Agustín, porque señala el hecho de que sin buscar la misericordia de Dios y crecer en la humildad, terminamos cayendo en el orgullo y el juicio de los demás. ¿Alguna vez has notado que cuando empujas un objeto hacia abajo, a cambio te empujas hacia arriba? No sé si lo sabemos inconscientemente o simplemente por nuestro quebrantamiento y pecaminosidad, pero nos encanta juzgar a los demás. Cuando juzgamos a los demás o cuando chismeamos sobre las faltas de los demás, nos enorgullecemos y nos gloriamos en el hecho de que al menos no somos como ellos.

Claramente esto es pecaminoso y debemos rechazar esta inclinación porque es contraria a la vida y misión de Jesucristo. Jesús, quien es el Hijo de Dios, tenía todo el derecho, como Dios, de presionar a través del juicio, pero no lo hace. De la narración del poder de su infancia donde Jesús viene no en majestad y poder, sino en sencillez y pobreza; ¡Jesús entra en medio de nuestras vidas no para hundirnos, sino por su vida, muerte y resurrección, para levantarnos en su misericordia y amor!

Eso es lo que nuestras lecturas nos animan a hacer; para seguir creciendo en humildad. Al hacerlo, no sólo hallamos el favor de Dios, como dice nuestra primera lectura, sino que actuamos cada vez más como Cristo. Cuando nos humillamos, permitimos que Dios nos exalte. Que nuestras lecturas y la Eucaristía nos fortalezcan para buscar siempre crecer en humildad, buscar la misericordia infinita de Dios y levantar a quienes nos rodean.



## Twenty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Sir 3:17-18, 20, 28-29 | Heb 12:18-19, 22-24a | Lk 14:1, 7-14

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Pope St. John XXIII, one of the most influential figures of the 20th century, had a wonderful sense of humor. In stories recalled by Fr. Greg Friedman, OFM, Good Pope John would say, "God knew from all eternity I was going to be pope. Couldn't God have made me more handsome?" He also had a deep devotion to St. Joseph. In his writings, he talks about the humble and overlooked role that Joseph played in the life of Christ. He promoted an increased devotion to the humble, loyal saint who stayed quietly in the background and provided a home for Christ and his mother. St. Joseph is a model for the humility that our readings speak of today. Being humble doesn't mean being embarrassed or ashamed of the talents and abilities we have. It means acknowledging that these are gifts from God. God does not give us these gifts so we can place ourselves above others, as Jesus observed people doing at the home of the Pharisee. They are to be used to glorify God. By being humble, we "will be loved more than a giver of gifts ... and find favor with God."

#### GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I always remember what I was told in a volunteer training when preparing to serve hospice patients and their families: sit at eye level or lower when meeting with the patient or their family members. Being "at the same level" not only "lifted up" the patient but also brought the volunteer "down" to their level. This not only made listening easier and showed respect for the dignity of the patient; it also helped the volunteer see things from the patient's perspective. Jesus tells us in the Gospel today that being his disciples is not about elevating ourselves, but about lowering ourselves. He calls us to invite, welcome, and accept those who are least able to repay us. When we forget about ourselves and our place in the world and instead lift up others, he tells us we "will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

ACT One of the greatest acts of humility is to acknowledge when we are wrong, apologize, and ask forgiveness. Is there someone you can reconcile with by admitting you were wrong? Allowing God to forgive you in the sacrament of reconciliation will help you grow in humility.

#### Celebrate the Season of Creation

The Season of Creation is a month-long prayerful observance that calls upon Catholics to pray and care for God's Creation. It starts September 1 and ends October 4th. It's a time to reflect on our relationship with the environment, how we live, and how our lifestyles impact the natural world, humans and other creature inhabiting it. This "time for creation" offers, in the words of Pope Francis, "individual believers and communities a fitting opportunity to reaffirm their personal vocation to be stewards of creation, to thank God for the wonderful handiwork which he has entrusted to our care, and to implore his help for the protection of creation...".

The US Conference of Catholic Bishops reminds us that "we show our respect for the Creator by our stewardship of Creation". Pope Francis urges us to recognize our connectedness with the natural world saying, "Nature cannot be regarded as something separate from ourselves or as a mere setting in which we live. We are part of nature, included in it and thus in constant interaction with it." (LS 139). Advocating for Creation Care helps safeguard the inheritance the Creator has given us, ... an inheritance essential to our well-being. Pope Benedict XVI told us that protecting this inheritance is a way of fulfilling our role as stewards of Creation.
