News from P.I.T (Pastor in Training)



Normally when we think of voluntary poverty, we think of religious brothers or sisters. Indeed, the catechism tells us, "The life consecrated to God is characterized by the public profession of the evangelical counsels of poverty, chastity, and obedience." (CCC 944) However, it also tells us, "Christ proposes the evangelical counsels, in their great variety, to every disciple." (CCC 915) Really? Yup. We hear it this

weekend: "Whoever of you does not renounce all that he has cannot be my disciple."

Of course, we can't all be mendicants, but the evangelical counsels have proven for two thousand years to be the surest way to perfection. Since we're all called to "be perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matt 5:48), we're also all called to some form of poverty, chastity, and obedience.

I've sought to do so in my own vocation through my priestly association, the Companions of Christ. For example, we pursue poverty by having a \$200 spending limit. This means, if I'm going to make a purchase over \$200, I know I'm going to have to run it by my fellow Companions. Sometimes that's all it takes to discourage me from being so quick to spend money on myself!

This trifecta of holiness directly combats the three major temptations. Chastity fights the lust of the flesh, calling us to the self-possession that frees us to make a gift of ourselves. Poverty fights the lust of the eyes (greed), calling us to the healthy detachment that frees us to store up our treasure in heaven. Obedience fights the pride of life, calling us to the humility that frees us to serve God rather than our ego.

For us, practicing obedience may simply mean a humble submission to the circumstances of life, trusting that "all things work together for good for those who love God." (Rom 8:28) Chastity may mean googling for the "parents' guide" before beginning a new TV show or movie. Poverty may mean setting aside a percentage of our income for OLM, the Diocese, and our favorite charities like Hesed House or Waterleaf. Each disciple's circumstances are unique, but every disciple is called to the perfection of heaven. Let's ask God this weekend how He is asking us to live out poverty, chastity, and obedience.

Noticias del P.I.T. (Párroco en Formación)



Normalmente cuando pensamos en pobreza voluntaria, pensamos en hermanas o hermanos religiosos. En efecto, el catecismo nos dice: "La vida consagrada a Dios se caracteriza por la profesión pública de los consejos evangélicos de pobreza, castidad y obediencia" (CIC 944). Sin embargo, también nos dice: "Cristo propone los consejos evangélicos, en su gran variedad, a todo discípulo" (CIC 915). ¿En serio? Sí. Lo escuchamos este fin de semana:

"Cualquiera de ustedes que no renuncia a todo lo que tiene, no puede ser discípulo mío".

Por supuesto, no todos podemos ser mendicantes, pero los consejos evangélicos han demostrado durante dos mil años ser el camino más seguro hacia la perfección. Dado que todos estamos llamados a "ser perfectos como es perfecto su Padre que está en el cielo" (Mateo 5:48), también todos estamos llamados a alguna forma de pobreza, castidad y obediencia.

He buscado hacerlo en mi propia vocación a través de mi asociación sacerdotal, los Compañeros de Cristo. Por ejemplo, perseguimos la pobreza al tener un límite de gasto de \$200. Esto significa que, si voy a hacer una compra de más de \$200, sé que tendré que consultar con mis colegas Compañeros. ¡A veces eso es todo lo que se necesita para disuadirme de ser tan rápido para gastar dinero en mí mismo!

Esta trifecta de santidad combate directamente las tres grandes tentaciones. La castidad combate el deseo de la carne, llamándonos al dominio propio que nos libera para hacer un don de nosotros mismos. La pobreza combate el deseo de los ojos (la codicia), llamándonos al sano desapego que nos libera para atesorar nuestro tesoro en el cielo. La obediencia combate el orgullo de la vida, llamándonos a la humildad que nos libera para servir a Dios en lugar de nuestro ego.

Para nosotros, practicar la obediencia puede significar simplemente una humilde sumisión a las circunstancias de la vida, confiando en que "Dios dispone todas las cosas para el bien de los que lo aman" (Romanos 8:28). La castidad puede significar buscar en Google la "guía para padres" antes de comenzar un nuevo programa de televisión o película. La pobreza puede significar reservar un porcentaje de nuestros ingresos para OLM, la Diócesis y nuestras organizaciones benéficas favoritas como Hesed House o Waterleaf. Las circunstancias de cada discípulo son únicas, pero cada discípulo está llamado a la perfección del cielo. Preguntémosle a Dios este fin de semana cómo El nos pide que vivamos la pobreza, la castidad y la obediencia.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Often, before writing these reflections, I take a minute to pray. I decided to add a minute of mindfulness using my new Apple Watch, which conveniently provides a meditation prompt. Today's happened to be: "Bring to mind a close relationship that can be challenging, and think about what it can teach you." Like those paper messages in fortune cookies, even this auto-generated prompt carried a grain of truth. Our thoughts may turn to our spouse, a prickly co-worker, or a moody teen. However, given today's readings, it struck me that this description can also fit our relationship with Jesus. Yes, we know that Jesus loves us, shepherds us, forgives us ... but he also challenges us! He reminds us today that being a disciple requires that we go all in, prepared to place our relationship with Jesus above all else. Easier said than done. But we can start, one minute at a time, with our prayers, priorities, and actions. We can also follow the example of saints such as Paul, imprisoned for preaching the Gospel, and the saints among us who teach us by example.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I bet we all know people we would consider saints, or at least well on their way: A compassionate friend, a priest or lay minister at our parish, a generous neighbor, that person who has not let suffering and loss shake their faith. Then there are the saints we Catholics celebrate each day: Francis, who threw off the cloak of privilege to live for Christ; Mother Teresa, who served others day in and day out even as she faced a spiritual drought; Paul, the one-time persecutor who built up the early Church and whose letters continue to inspire Christians. Each of them took Jesus' words at face value and laid down their lives for him. Learning how to be a disciple of Christ from studying the lives of the saints can be an ongoing pursuit throughout our lives. But perhaps we can also learn from a "living saint," if the opportunity presents itself, and ask, in so many words, "what's your secret?" It may be praying first thing in the morning, or something practical that we had not considered, such as managing their time in such a way that allows them to volunteer regularly or to be a continuous presence in the life of someone who needs them. If other priorities have gotten in the way of our relationship with Jesus, perhaps we can challenge ourselves to develop new habits. Even an incremental change - such as spending less time or money on nonessentials or reading an inspirational book - can help us reignite our faith and free up our time to focus on someone or something other than ourselves.

STUDY Take time to read about the lives of a few saints. What habits did they create to lead holy lives? What vices did they give up for Christ's sake to truly become his disciple?

Prayer:

- +Prayer Spot: Use the ride to school as an opportunity to put Jesus at the start of your day! Have your children choose a prayer spot somewhere between your home and school that you pass each morning. It could be a certain tree, sign, building, etc. As you pass your prayer "spot" every morning make the sign of the cross and pray for the upcoming day, your teachers, friends, people who are sick, etc.
- +Pits and Peaks: Have your children choose a highlight (peak) and a struggle (pit) as a way to share a few moments from their day with you. Share a peak and a pit each day.
- +Night Time Blessing: Start a bedtime blessing tradition! Each evening, trace the sign of the cross over your child's head and heart saying aloud, "Rest in the arms of Jesus - You are loved." To end the day with a parent's hand over a child's small head praying them to sleep is a gift we can pass on to our children. Allow the breath of God's words to send your children to sleep.

Family Adventure: Apple Picking!

Load up the car, get on the road, head to a local orchard, and experience a bit of autumn. Handpick apples, run through fallen leaves, and make sure to bring enough fruit home to bake an apple pie together. Put this on your yearly traditions list and watch your family change - like the seasons!

Caramel Apple Salact Recipe:

Gather your family, add in time together, mix well with laughter, and finish with a delicious treat!

- 6 small apples, cored and chopped (blend of Granny Smith and Red Delicious)
- 6 Snickers Bars, cut into bite-sized pieces
- 1 (5.1 oz) box instant vanilla pudding mix
- 1/2 cup milk

Refrigerate until time to eat!


Teaching:
