

News from P.I.T (Pastor in Training)



This weekend the Scriptures are trying to move us past our misconceived notions of how we expect God to work. Our first reading finishes the story about Naaman, a Syrian Commander. He was a man of great influence and strength, but he worshipped false gods. When faced with leprosy, he received advice from an Israelite to turn to the prophet Elisha in Samaria. Naaman, initially rejected the

simple prophetic instruction to wash in the Jordan, a dirty river, only to be encouraged by others to listen. After rinsing himself in the Jordan River seven times, Naaman was healed in two ways; physically of his leprosy, but also spiritually which led him to proper worship.

Like Naaman, don't we struggle to believe in the simple ways the Lord can work in our lives? Naaman was hurting both physically and spiritually and simply listening to another person, a servant of God, and following a simple task, he found healing. Sometimes we doubt God's power in healing our body and our souls, yet Jesus Christ desires to make us whole and has given us simple tools of Sacraments to bring healing to our body and soul.

In the Gospel, Jesus encounters 10 lepers in Samaria and Galilee. Jesus heals all 10, but only one returns. The one who returns is a Samaritan. A Samaritan, according to the Jews, were people who were beyond salvation because they were once part of the 12 tribes of Israel. However, they had rejected the covenant and began worshipping false gods. Jesus points out to his followers that it was only the Samaritan, even though all 10 lepers were healed, that was able to see the true reason for his healing, which was Jesus.

In my priestly ministry, I have encountered many people who have felt they were beyond God's mercy, yet our Gospel is meant to move us past our false notions. That the Lord is able to bring healing to anyone, even those who feel the furthest away, including ourselves! Let us move past our misconceived notions in the way the Lord can work in the heart of others and ourselves. Let us seek healing in Christ through the beautiful gifts of the Sacraments!



Noticias del P.I.T. (Párroco en Formación)



Este fin de semana las Escrituras están tratando de movernos más allá de nuestras nociones erróneas de cómo esperamos que Dios trabaje. Nuestra primera lectura termina la historia de Naaman, un Comandante Sirio. Era un hombre de gran influencia y fortaleza, pero adoraba a dioses falsos. Cuando se enfrentó a la lepra, recibió el consejo de un Israelita de acudir al profeta Eliseo en Samaria. Naamán inicialmente

rechazó la simple instrucción profética de lavarse en el Jordán, un río sucio, solo fue alentado por otros para escuchar. Después de lavarse siete veces en el Río Jordán, Naamán se curó de dos maneras: físicamente de su lepra y también espiritualmente lo que lo llevó a la adoración adecuada.

Al igual que Naamán, ¿no luchamos por creer en las formas sencillas en que el Señor puede obrar en nuestras vidas? Naamán estaba sufriendo tanto física como espiritualmente y simplemente escuchando a otra persona, un siervo de Dios, y siguiendo una tarea sencilla, encontró la curación. A veces dudamos del poder de Dios para sanar nuestro cuerpo y nuestra alma, sin embargo, Jesucristo desea hacernos completos y nos ha dado herramientas simples de Sacramentos para traer sanación a nuestro cuerpo y alma.

En el Evangelio, Jesús se encuentra con 10 leprosos en Samaria y Galilea. Jesús sana a los 10, pero solo uno regresa. El que vuelve es un Samaritano. Un samaritano, según los judíos, eran personas que estaban más allá de la salvación porque alguna vez fueron parte de las 12 tribus de Israel. Sin embargo, habían rechazado el pacto y comenzaron a adorar dioses falsos. Jesús les señala a sus seguidores que solo el samaritano, a pesar de que los 10 leprosos fueron sanados, pudo ver la verdadera razón de su curación, que era Jesús.

En mi ministerio sacerdotal, me he encontrado con muchas personas que han sentido que estaban más allá de la misericordia de Dios, sin embargo, nuestro Evangelio está destinado a movernos más allá de nuestras nociones falsas. Que el Señor es capaz de traer sanación a cualquiera, incluso a los que se sienten más alejados, jincluyéndonos a nosotros mismos! Dejemos atrás nuestras nociones erróneas en la forma en que el Señor puede obrar en el corazón de los demás y en el nuestro. ¡Busquemos la sanación en Cristo a través de los hermosos dones de los Sacramentos!



GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE


Back in 2018, a Christmastime video about gratitude went viral. A young Dad wakes up covered in wrapping paper to discover his similarly adorned wife and kids. He runs through the house, "unwrapping" the electricity, running water, his shoes ... and a car! Today's Gospel reminded me of this, and of all the times the Lord has provided: whether it is something ordinary like food in the fridge or something extraordinary like the birth of our sons. But how often do I acknowledge that all these gifts come from God? I am guessing all 10 of the lepers in today's Gospel felt much gratitude and joy after they were healed. But only one, a foreigner no less, returned to Jesus to give thanks to God. Likewise, today's readings remind us to return to God with gratitude for all the blessings in our lives – both extraordinary and ordinary.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Hearing the account in Kings today, I picture Naaman plunging into the Jordan – not just once but seven times! What if he'd stopped after one, or two, or four? We hear in the Gospel of 10 other lepers, all of whom raised their voices shouting "Jesus, Master! Have pity on us!" In both cases, those seeking healing showed faith in God, persevering against all odds. This perseverance also is evident in the second reading, where Saint Paul bears great suffering for the sake of the Gospel and the salvation of others. These readings challenge us to persevere in our faith – through prayer and our witness to others we encounter. God will not always answer our prayers the way we want or expect – at least not the first time. We need to jump back in like Naaman, trusting that God will give us what we need.

PRAY We quickly turn to God when things go wrong. Next time something good happens, turn to God with the same urgency and say a prayer of thanks.



To everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under heaven. - Ecclesiastes 3:1



Teaching:

This month, the trees begin to drop their leaves. When leaves are no longer connected to their life source, they wither and die. Jesus is our life source - when we disconnect from Him we wither as well. Bring some fall leaves inside and share this message around your table.

Family Adventure: In October, the world is a beautiful painting full of vibrant colors! Pack up some paper, paints, brushes, and

markers and head outside. Take a nature hike and stop along the way to not just "take a picture" but to paint a picture of what you see. Sign and display your October masterpieces in your home.

Prayer:

As families we continue to be busier than ever It seems like there is an endless list of things to do. As the evenings begin to cool off this month, call to us as parents to sit a little closer. listen a little harder, and laugh a little longer beside those we love most. Amen.

Recipe:

Flavored Pumpkin Seeds

Boil pumpkin goop in salted water to separate seeds from the membrane. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Then, heat 2 tbsp. butter in the microwave until melted. Toss 2 cups of pumpkin seeds in melted butter to coat them, then toss with desired flavor.

Spread the seeds out on a baking sheet and roast for 25-27 minutes, or until lightly golden.

Flavors:

- + Cinnamon Sugar: 1 Tsp. cinnamon and 2 Tbsp. sugar
 - + Ranch: 1 / Tbsp. ranch seasoning mix
 - Pumpkin Pie: 3 tbsp. brown sugar and 1 1/2 tsp. of pumpkin pie spice





Faith + Family Tips:

- + Spread some kindness this fall! Let your children use small post-it notes to write positive messages on the Halloween candy for your trick or treaters. Messages such as - You are Boo-tiful, Be Kind Not Scary, You are Ahh-mazing, etc.
- + Add a prayer reflection to your pumpkin carving. Each pumpkin is a little bit different - just like we are. What makes you special? We are all filled with a bit of "gunky" stuff. What are a few things you need to work on getting rid of? God carves us perfectly for the plan He has for us. How is God using you right now? God puts a light in us so we can reflect His love to everyone we meet. How can others see God in you?
- + October is the month of the Rosary. Praying one decade, or the entire prayer together is a wonderful family practice. You could add some "sweetness" by making a little mix - chocolate chips for each Hail Mary, marshmallows for each Our Father, and graham cracker pieces for the Glory Be. I think Mary would love us to spend s'more time together.
