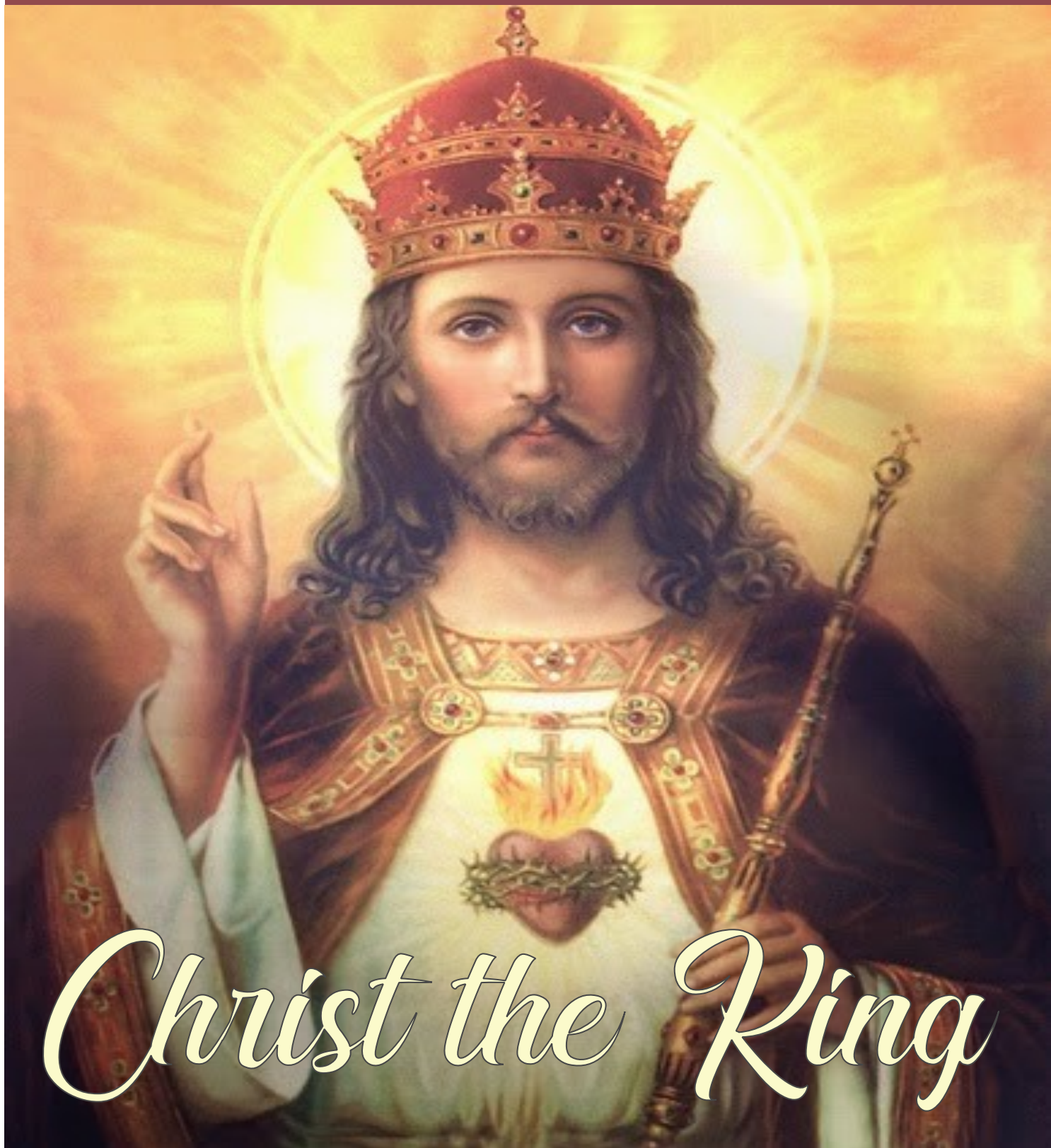

Christ the King

News from P.I.T. (Pastor in Training)



I have to say, I enjoyed growing up in the 80s and 90s! I still remember going to the movie theater with my family and friends to see great movies that our culture continues to try to recapture today. One movie in particular that I remember seeing was the Lion King. The music and cinematography were absolutely beautiful. As I was leaving the theater, one of the songs in particular was stuck in my head: "I Can't Wait to be King." The lyrics went on, "No one say 'do this', no one say 'be there', no one say 'stop that', no one say 'see here'..." It's quite a catchy song with an adolescent concept of freedom. The main character began the movie by thinking that kingship was all about having it *my* way. However, as the movie progresses and the main character comes of age, it becomes clear that kingship is best wielded at the service and love of others.

Based on my time forming future priests in the seminary, I can say that this misunderstanding often arises in many young seminarians today who may sing, "I can't wait to be pastor! No one say do this, no one say be there... free to do it all *my* way!" However, that too would be a misunderstanding of what it means to be a pastor. Lucky for myself, the Church is very clear about how pastors are to lead their parishes. The scriptures used in the celebration of Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, are a perfect example.

Our first reading brings it all together: kingship and shepherding (pastoring) belong together!

*"And the LORD said to you,
'You shall shepherd my people Israel
and shall be commander of Israel.'"*

The great King David in the Old Testament, prior to being Israel's great king, was first a shepherd willing to lay down his life for his flock. David was only made king when he first served and fought for his people. Jesus, who is the ultimate David, is both King and Shepherd. Christ makes it clear in His ministry, with the heart of a good shepherd, that He desires not only to serve and love his people, but even to suffer and die for them. What a beautiful King and Shepherd we have in Christ. Please pray that Fr. James and I may have the same heart of Christ the King and that we may continue to entrust our very lives to our Lord and King!

Noticias del P.I.T. (Párroco en Formación)



¡Tengo que decir que disfruté crecer en los años 80 y 90! Todavía recuerdo ir al cine con mi familia y amigos a ver estupendas películas que nuestra cultura sigue tratando de recuperar hoy. Una película en particular que recuerdo haber visto fue el Rey León. La música y la cinematografía fueron absolutamente hermosas. Cuando salía del teatro, una de las canciones en particular se me quedó grabada en la cabeza: "No puedo esperar a ser Rey". La letra continuaba: Que "Nadie me diga 'haz esto', nadie me diga 'estar allí', nadie me diga 'deja de hacer eso', nadie me diga 'mira aquí'...". Es una canción bastante pegajosa con un concepto adolescente de libertad. El personaje principal comenzó la película pensando que la realeza se trataba de hacer las cosas a *mi* manera. Sin embargo, a medida que avanza la película y el personaje principal alcanza la mayoría de edad, queda claro que la realeza se ejerce mejor al servicio y al amor de los demás.

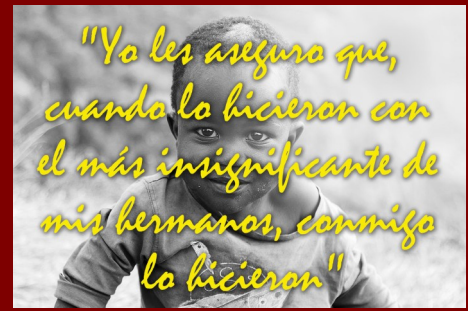
Basado en mi tiempo formando futuros sacerdotes en el seminario, puedo decir que este malentendido surge a menudo en muchos jóvenes seminaristas de hoy que pueden cantar: "¡No puedo esperar a ser párroco! Por suerte para mí, la Iglesia tiene muy claro cómo los párrocos deben dirigir sus parroquias. Las escrituras utilizadas en la celebración de Jesucristo, Rey del Universo, son un ejemplo perfecto.

Nuestra primera lectura lo reúne todo: ¡la realeza y el apacentar (pastorear) van juntos!

*Y el SEÑOR te dijo:
"Apacentarás a mi pueblo Israel
y serás el guía de Israel."*

El gran Rey David en el Antiguo Testamento, antes de ser el gran rey de Israel, fue primero un pastor dispuesto a dar su vida por su rebaño. David solo fue hecho rey cuando sirvió y peleó por primera vez por su pueblo. Jesús, quien es el supremo David, es tanto Rey como Pastor. Cristo deja claro en Su ministerio, con corazón de buen pastor, que El desea no sólo servir y amar a su pueblo, sino incluso sufrir y morir por el. Qué hermoso Rey y Pastor tenemos en Cristo. ¡Por favor oren para que el Padre James y yo podamos tener el mismo corazón de Cristo Rey y que podamos continuar confiando nuestras vidas a nuestro Señor y Rey!

The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

2 Sm 5:1-3 | Col 1:12-20 | Lk 23:35-43

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Did you watch Queen Elizabeth's funeral procession? The Imperial State Crown that sat atop her coffin is "made of gold and set with 2,868 diamonds, 17 sapphires, 11 emeralds, 269 pearls, and 4 rubies," according to the Historic Royal Palaces website. It had been made for her father, King George VI, for his 1937 coronation. It is hard to reconcile this bejeweled crown with the crown of thorns worn by Jesus at his crucifixion. Yet we recognize the crucified Christ as the king of kings, the firstborn of creation, above "thrones or dominions or principalities or powers." As we conclude the liturgical year, we are reminded that the cross, not the crown, is the primary symbol of Christ's power. By embracing the cross - through service, sacrifice and recognizing Jesus as the king of our lives - we can help bring about his kingdom.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

It can be easy to distance ourselves from the two condemned criminals crucified alongside Jesus, much the way we might write off the prisoners in our midst today. Yet Luke's telling reveals their humanity and our shared human nature. One reacts as any of us might, telling Jesus to "save himself." The other speaks words of faith, recognizing Jesus as the Son of God, our true king of the universe. As we prepare to enter Advent, let us ask God for the grace to recognize Jesus as our king. Soon we will be swept up in the Christmas countdown. By placing Christ, the newborn king, at the center of our lives, we can in turn help ourselves and those close to us slow down and experience Advent in such a way so as to fully prepare for his coming.

PRAY This week, make the words of the second criminal your prayer: "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom."

Grieving at Thanksgiving

For some, holidays are a welcome time of year to celebrate with family and friends. For others, it is a painful time as a reminder of the loss of loved ones and tough changes that have taken place. During the season of thanksgiving, is it possible to be both grateful and grieving? The answer to that is not easy and is different for everyone. Research has shown that over time, gratitude can provide a source of healing during the grieving process. According to researcher, Jeff Huffman, "There is growing evidence that being grateful may not only bring good feelings. It could lead to better health."

Like any skill, gratitude requires practice. If you are not currently practicing gratitude in your life but would like to try – start small. Think about being thankful for your morning coffee or tea, the sunshine, a friend's call or a warm meal. When we practice gratitude, it does not mean that we stop grieving our loss. Grief expert, Dr. Alan Wolfelt shares "that being grateful for what remains after you have experienced a loss can be a powerful way to deal with, and heal, that loss.

Turning your attention on how your life was enriched because that person was in it, for example, rather than on the vacuum the loss created, might be one powerful and healthy approach to confronting grief."

Take the time to consider some ways to practice gratitude. A gratitude journal may help to give thanks for one thing each day. If you do not like to journal, write one thing you are grateful for on a piece of paper each day and put it in a gratitude jar or put it on a board. Give at least one compliment daily. This helps your thoughts to turn to others and uplift them.

Turn to the faith community for a source of hope and support in your grief journey. There are grief support sessions or you could meet one-on-one with clergy or a grief minister. Turn to scripture, spend time in prayer, or spend quiet time with the Lord at Adoration. It is so important that you do not grieve alone. At times, it may be helpful to receive support from a grief counselor.
