


News from P.I.T. (Priest in Training)



In the Gospel Jesus tells us that in heaven we "neither marry nor are given in marriage." That's very surprising given how much emphasis Jesus places on the indissolubility of marriage, but it also reminds us of what marriage is all about.

For one thing, in heaven we "can no longer die" but are "like angels" (we don't become angels). Now, angels don't have babies (they're each their own species and

don't die). Yet, humans would cease to exist if we stopped having children (because we do die). Thus we can see the nod to the fact that marriage is built around the unique capacity of a man and a woman to procreate. Nothing better explains the need for marital fidelity, longevity, exclusivity, and totality than the good of children. Nothing better explains why a government should regulate marriages and incentivize healthy marriages than children (the future citizens!). Plus, as we know, psychology and sociology unequivocally support the value of healthy traditional marriages for both children and couples. So (nuances like infertility and NFP aside), we can see that it's self-contradictory to take procreation out of the definition of marriage. That being said, marriage offers much more than cute little look-a-like humans who push us to our limits. In fact, it takes us to the depths of love.

Couples promise a love that is **full**, **faithful**, **fruitful**, **and freely given** "until death do us part." This doesn't mean that marriage won't have repercussions in heaven, quite the contrary! **Marriage prepares us for heaven**, **and heaven fulfills marriage**. That's why marriage is God's favorite analogy for His relationship with us and why Jesus elevated marriage to a sacrament. Like baptism, marriage is meant to be the place where we selflessly die with Christ so that we might rise with Him. Like confession, marriage is meant to be the place where the worst parts of us will surface, but are greeted with healing love and mercy. And like Communion, marriage is meant to be the place where two individuals—hearts, minds, bodies, and souls—mystically become "one flesh."

As Peter Kreeft simply put it, while "civil marriage is made by man, sacramental marriage is made by God." May all married couples look to heaven, face their brokenness together in Christ, and thereby reach the depths of love which is fulfilled in heaven. Noticias del P.I.T. (Sacerdote en formación)



En el Evangelio Jesús nos dice que en el cielo "ni nos casamos ni somos dados en matrimonio". Eso es muy sorprendente dado el énfasis que Jesús pone en la indisolubilidad del matrimonio, pero también nos recuerda de qué se trata el matrimonio.

Por un lado, en el cielo "ya no podemos morir" sino que somos "como ángeles" (no nos convertimos en ángeles). Ahora, los ángeles no tienen bebés (cada uno es de su propia especie y no mueren). Sin em-

bargo, los humanos dejarían de existir si dejáramos de tener hijos (porque *nosotros si* morimos). Así podemos asentir al hecho de que el matrimonio se construye alrededor de la capacidad única de u0n hombre y una mujer para procrear. Nada explica mejor la necesidad de fidelidad, longevidad, exclusividad y totalidad conyugales que el bien de los hijos. Nada explica mejor por qué un gobierno debe regular los matrimonios e incentivar los matrimonios saludables que los niños (¡los futuros ciudadanos!). Además, como sabemos, la psicología y la sociología respaldan inequívocamente el valor de los matrimonios tradicionales saludables tanto para los niños como para las parejas. Entonces (aparte de matices como la infertilidad y la planificación familiar natural), podemos ver que es contradictorio sacar la procreación de la definición de matrimonio. Dicho esto, el matrimonio ofrece mucho más que lindos pequeños seres humanos que nos empujan a nuestros límites. De hecho, nos lleva a las profundidades del amor.

Las parejas prometen un amor pleno, fiel, fructífero y dado libremente "hasta que la muerte nos separe". Esto no significa que el matrimonio no tendrá repercusiones en el cielo, ¡sino todo lo contrario! El matrimonio nos prepara para el cielo, y el cielo cumple con el matrimonio. Es por eso que el matrimonio es la analogía favorita de Dios para Su relación con nosotros y por qué Jesús elevó el matrimonio a un sacramento. Al igual que el bautismo, el matrimonio debe ser el lugar donde morimos desinteresadamente con Cristo para que podamos resucitar con Él. Al igual que la confesión, el matrimonio está destinado a ser el lugar donde aflorarán las peores partes de nosotros, pero serán recibidas con amor sanador y misericordia. Y al igual que la Comunión, el matrimonio está destinado a ser el lugar donde dos personas: corazones, mentes, cuerpos y almas, se convierten místicamente en "una sola carne".

Como Peter Kreeft dijo simplemente, mientras que "el matrimonio civil lo hace el hombre, el matrimonio sacramental lo hace Dios". Que todas las parejas casadas miren al cielo, enfrenten juntos su quebrantamiento en Cristo, y así alcancen las profundidades del amor que se cumple en el cielo. Si desean que su matrimonio sea bendecido en la Iglesia, i por favor no duden en comunicarse!

Thirty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time

2 Mc 7:1-2, 9-14 | 2 Thes 2:16-3:5 | Lk 20:27-38



My colleague grew up playing a lot of basketball, and she has pointed out the obvious: Despite the fact that the hoop is much larger than the ball, and there is a very large backboard behind it, it can be very easy to miss a shot. Depending on where you are on the floor, you have to set your sights on, and aim the ball toward, a very specific place in space or on the glass. The king in the first reading and the Sadducees in the Gospel are shooting airballs. Each one of them is, literally, not seeing the right goal. In answering the Sadducees' questions, Jesus challenges their assumptions - not about marriage, but about life after death: "Those who are deemed worthy to attain to the coming age and to the resurrection of the dead ... can no longer die ... they are the children of God ... and he is not God of the dead, but of the living." Something even greater, beyond human understanding, awaits. The seven brothers who experienced horrible deaths rather than violate God's law knew that. We, too, hold onto hope that we will be among the living whom Jesus describes. In the meantime, we can place our trust in Jesus and focus on living according to the example he set for us. We may not know exactly what life after death will look and feel like, but we can trust the psalmist's words: "Lord, when your glory appears, my joy will be full."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I like to run races of various distances, and one of my favorite things is seeing the fun posters people hold up ("This is a lot of work for a free banana") and hearing shouts of encouragement. Even more powerful, of course, is the encouragement of friends and family members as we face challenges or difficulties. So it's heartening to hear from St. Paul that we can count on Jesus and the Father as a source of "everlasting encouragement and good hope." Again we are reminded that we cannot – and should not have to – do it alone. Instead, we can join Paul in asking God to "encourage [our] hearts and strengthen them in every good deed and word." In turn, we can encourage others in their faith and daily lives, seeking to reflect God's love to those we encounter.

ACTION One positive thing about social media is the way it allows us to lift one another up through a simple "Like" or comment. In the same way that we "connect" with others on social media, our kind, encouraging words and Christian example in our comments can connect others to Jesus and his Church.
