News from P.I.T. (Pastor in Training)



(Queue dramatic voice.) "If you had one week to live, what would you do?" This was a frequent conversation starter among my high school friends. The responses varied from traveling the world seeing the seven wonders, to spending time with family before our untimely demise. As much as it was a morbid question to ask in high school, it was meant to remove all distractions and point us to

desires of the heart.

Every year as we approach the end of the liturgical season of Ordinary Time and move toward Advent, our Sunday readings turn toward the end of days or end times. In our Gospel we read, "All that you see here, the days will come when there will not be left a stone upon another..." This points to the destruction of the Jerusalem Temple which itself represents the cosmos. What is even more striking, however, is Jesus' response as to when this will occur: "Nation will rise against nation...there will be... famines, and plagues." According to Christ's description, it may seem that we are fast approaching the second coming of Christ and the end of time.

However, the reason the Church has selected these readings is no different than the question we asked in high school. The Church is desiring for us to remove any and all distractions and have us turn to that which is most important - Our Lord.

Certainly, there are few who help us to do this very thing, like our seminarians—young men who show us that God is still very much alive and very much calling us to lay down our lives in service to God and our brothers and sisters. That's why this weekend we are hearing a testimony from our seminarian, Jonathan Hernandez, in collaboration with our Diocesan Seminary Endowment Weekend. I truly believe that those who pursue religious vocations have the ability to point us past this world and point us to the Lord. Please continue to pray for our priests and religious, but also for more young men to answer the call to the priesthood. May we support them as they prepare to spiritually support us, our families, and our future generations.

Noticias del P.I.T. (Párroco en Formación)



(Voz dramática.) "Si te quedara una semana de vida, ¿qué harías?" Este fue un tema de conversación frecuente entre mis amigos de la escuela secundaria. Las respuestas variaron desde viajar por el mundo para ver las siete maravillas hasta pasar tiempo con la familia antes de nuestro fallecimiento extemporáneo. Aunque era una pregunta morbosa para hacer en la escuela secundaria, tenía la intención de eliminar todas las distracciones y señalarnos los deseos del corazón.

Cada año, a medida que nos acercamos al final de la temporada litúrgica del Tiempo Ordinario y avanzamos hacia el Adviento, nuestras lecturas dominicales giran hacia el final de los días o el final de los tiempos. En nuestro Evangelio leemos: "Todo lo que ven aquí, vendrán días en que no quedará piedra sobre piedra..." Esto apunta a la destrucción del Templo de Jerusalén, que en sí mismo representa el cosmos. Lo que es aún más sorprendente, sin embargo, es la respuesta de Jesús en cuanto a cuándo ocurrirá esto: "Se levantará nación contra nación... habrá... hambres y plagas". Según la descripción de Cristo, puede parecer que nos acercamos rápidamente a la segunda venida de Cristo y al fin de los tiempos.

Sin embargo, la razón por la cual la Iglesia ha seleccionado estas lecturas no es diferente a la pregunta que hicimos en la escuela secundaria. La Iglesia desea que eliminemos todas y cada una de las distracciones y que nos volvamos a lo que es más importante: Nuestro Señor.

Ciertamente, hay pocos que nos ayudan a hacer esto mismo, como nuestros seminaristas, jóvenes que nos muestran que Dios todavía está muy vivo y que nos llama mucho a dar nuestra vida al servicio de Dios y de nuestros hermanos y hermanas. Es por eso que este fin de semana escucharemos un testimonio de nuestro seminarista, Jonathan Hernandez, en colaboración con nuestro Fin de Semana de Donación al Seminario Diocesano. Realmente creo que aquellos que persiguen vocaciones religiosas tienen la capacidad de señalarnos más allá de este mundo y señalarnos al Señor. Continúen orando por nuestros sacerdotes y religiosos, pero también por más jóvenes que respondan al llamado al sacerdocio. Que podamos apoyarlos mientras se preparan para apoyarnos espiritualmente a nosotros, a nuestras familias y a nuestras generaciones futuras.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

In today's Gospel, Jesus describes events leading up to the end times: wars, earthquakes, famines, plagues, persecution, and even death. It's no wonder some Christians believe the Second Coming could be any day now. After all, our world has seen more than its share of these signs. However, as Jesus tells the disciples, we don't know when the end times will come. We do know, however, that Jesus remains at our side through the thick and thin of these "in between times." Just as Jesus tells the disciples he will give them "wisdom in speaking" to refute their enemies, he will give us the strength we need to persevere in faith. As St. Paul reminds us, we can do that by imitating the early Christians, working quietly to build up the kingdom of God each day.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

When facing a difficult decision or situation, it can be easy to fall into the trap of "catastrophizing" - that is, thinking of our biggest fear coming true, or of the worst that can happen. Today's readings include a laundry list: a blazing fire, toil and drudgery, wars and insurrections, earthquakes, famines, persecution, and death. Yet Jesus tells the disciples, "not a hair on your head will be destroyed. By your perseverance you will secure your lives." Rather than focus on our fears - not only about the end times but in our day-to-day lives - Jesus challenges us to trust in God's love for us. It doesn't mean we should resign ourselves to the difficulties we or others face. However, by placing faith over fear we can seek to help others here on earth, confident that Jesus will lead us home when our time comes.

ACT Many people today suffer due to natural disasters, authoritarian leadership, and human violence. Pray for these victims, of course, but also - in your creativity - seek out ways to use your time, talent, and/or treasure to alleviate their situation if possible.

Bishop Hicks' Column November 2022: Our Baptismal Duty

Recently, many of us tuned in to watch the events surrounding the passing of Queen Elizabeth II, the longest reigning British monarch. In the United States, the existence of a royal family may be somewhat of a foreign concept in our political system that prefers democratically elected officials. Yet, with some curiosity, many of us cast our gaze across the pond to capture a glimpse of the new King Charles III receiving the royal scepter.

In the Catholic Church, we tap into “royal language” with titles like “Queen of Heaven” and the “Prince of Peace.” During this month, we will come to the end of our liturgical year when the universal Church boldly proclaims Christ as King of the Universe on November 20.

Pope Pius XI instituted the celebration of “Christ the King” in 1925 with his encyclical *Quas primas* (“In the first”) to respond to growing secularism and atheism in the world. From the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops: “This solemnity reminds us that while governments come and go, Christ reigns as King forever. During the early twentieth

century, in Mexico, Russia and some parts of Europe, militantly secularistic regimes threatened not just the Catholic Church and its faithful, but civilization itself.”

Almost 100 years after the solemnity’s inception, there is still a need to promote the message of this feast day. We do not have to look far to see blatant attacks on religious liberty and increasing secularism. It is in this context that atheists are proactively trying to convert vulnerable minds to not believing in God. Still, there are others who plant a deceptive message by saying, “If you insist on believing in God, at least do so by being only spiritual and not religious within the Church.”

While we embrace Christ as our king, we also need to remind ourselves that he is a very different kind of king. Instead of donning a crown of gold, Jesus wears a crown of thorns, and instead of ruling with arrogance or revenge, he utters decrees of mercy and

forgiveness: “Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing” (Luke 23:34). Jesus rules by being a good shepherd who rejects loftiness and domination. Instead, he serves, as opposed to seeking to be served. He calls all those who follow him to join his ministry of service, humility, forgiveness and charity.

During the past few years, there has been a popular streaming series named “The Crown.” In the first season, there is a poignant scene in which King George VI reminds his son-in-law, Philip, of his duty, especially toward the new queen, Eliza-

beth II. “You understand, the titles, the dukedom. They’re not the job. She is the job! She is the essence of your duty. Loving her. Protecting her.”

For those of us who have been called to minister in the Church, I think this quote is quite appropriate. It applies not exclusively to bishops, clergy and religious, but to every Catholic who is baptized and is a missionary disciple of Jesus: “The Church is our duty. Loving her. Protecting her.”

In the rite of baptism for children, the parents listen to the following words before the water is poured: “You have asked to have your child baptized. In doing so, you are accepting the responsibility of training him or her in the practice of the faith. It will be your duty to bring him or her up to keep God’s commandments as Christ taught us, by loving God and our neighbor.” When parents are asked, “Do you clearly understand what you are undertaking?” the affirmative answer they give at that moment is hopefully repeated daily and throughout the course of their lives.

To accomplish this, I continue to invite us to follow my vision for this diocese of Catechesis, Evangelization and Faith into Action. For if we truly know Jesus, love Jesus and serve others like he taught us, then we are doing our baptismal duty. As we strive to keep God at the center of our lives, the Church and the universe, may Christ the King live and reign today and always. †

Dear Friends,

Our diocese will soon will take up the national collection for the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD), which serves as the U.S. bishops' anti-poverty initiative.

Helping our brothers and sisters living on the margins has always been a key element of Catholic social teaching. I'm reminded of Pope Francis' words when he visited a homeless shelter in Rome: "To love God and neighbor is not something abstract, but profoundly concrete: it means seeing in every person the face of the Lord to be served, to serve him concretely." (*Visit at the "Dono di Maria" homeless shelter: Meeting with the Missionaries of Charity, the poor and volunteers, May 21, 2013*)

It's important to remember that 25% of the CCHD collection stays within our diocese to be distributed through grants to local organizations whose mission is to help the marginalized. Let me tell you about one of those groups.

Children's Art and Recreation Enrichment Services (C.A.R.E.S.) in Pembroke Township provides community events focused on arts, recreation and education for children and families. The organization's "Focus on the Family" project features monthly classes centered on parenting skills that conclude with a family meal.

The motto of CCHD is that it "offers a hand up, not a hand out." Let us extend our hands in service to our brothers and sisters who need our help through a donation on the weekend of November 19-20.
