# News from P.I.T. (Pastor in Training)



When I was growing up, my family would often host the various holiday gatherings. Inevitably, when Thanksgiving or Christmas rolled around and we were on to host, the family would go into an all-out cleanup mode. Suddenly, everyone had extra chores, and I still remember that my job was to Windex the tabletops and vacuum the carpets. The family went full court press on cleanup and our hope was to prepare a home worthy of receiving

our extended family and honored guests.

We can make the same connection with the season of Advent. This Liturgical season is meant to prepare our hearts to receive Jesus Christ on Christmas day. St. John the Baptist proclaims, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand!" His mission was much the same: to prepare people to receive Jesus through the gift of repentance. Hence, if we're wondering how to prepare for Christmas, the Sacrament of Reconciliation is always a beautiful way to prepare to receive Jesus.

It is important to note that, although St. John the Baptist's message was proclaimed in the desert of all places, people still traveled great distances to receive his message of repentance. I truly believe that these travels themselves were even part of the preparation of repentance—showing they were willing to go out of their way to ask God for forgiveness. Likewise, any good confession needs preparation and effort. I would suggest taking the time to read through a good examination, whether it's the ones in the narthex, on our My-Parish app, online by searching for the "Knights of Columbus examination of conscience" or on our website under Sacraments and select Reconciliation (where you can find an Examination of Conscience for Children, Teens, Singles, Married and one in Spanish).

Now in all honesty, I have to acknowledge that when we had to prepare the house for our visitors, I didn't always respond in the most enthusiastic way. I sometimes would only begrudgingly finish my tasks. However, the one thing that never changed was the joy that we all had in celebrating the holidays with family and friends. This can happen with the Sacrament of Reconciliation too! It might not be an enjoyable experience to have to acknowledge our brokenness and sins, but it will allow us all the more to celebrate the welcoming of Jesus into our hearts this Christmas!

In this spirit, Fr. James and I will be offering six straight days of confession this year. Starting Monday December 12th, the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, through Friday the 16th, 7-8:30 PM, followed by our normal Saturday confession times. Our hope is to give an ample amount of time for people to prepare their hearts to receive Jesus.

# Noticias del P.I.T. (Párroco en Formación)



Cuando era niño, mi familia a menudo organizaba las diversas reuniones festivas. Inevitablemente, cuando llegaba el Día de Acción de Gracias o Navidad y éramos los anfitriones, la familia entraba en un modo de limpieza total. De repente, todos tenían tareas adicionales, y todavía recuerdo que mi trabajo consistía en limpiar con Windex las mesas y aspirar las alfombras. La familia presionaba a todos sobre la limpieza y nuestra esperanza era preparar un hogar digno de recibir a nuestra amplia familia e invitados de honor.

Podemos hacer la misma conexión con la temporada de Adviento. Este tiempo Litúrgico está destinado a preparar nuestros corazones para recibir a Jesucristo el día de Navidad. San Juan Bautista proclama:

"¡Arrepiéntanse, porque el reino de los cielos se ha acercado!" Su misión era muy parecida: preparar a las personas para recibir a Jesús a través del don del arrepentimiento. Por lo tanto, si nos preguntamos cómo prepararnos para la Navidad, el Sacramento de la Reconciliación es siempre una hermosa manera de prepararse para recibir a Jesús.

Es importante notar que, aunque el mensaje de San Juan Bautista fue proclamado en el desierto de todos los lugares, la gente todavía viajó grandes distancias para recibir su mensaje de arrepentimiento. Realmente creo que estos viajes en sí mismos fueron incluso parte de la preparación del arrepentimiento, lo que demuestra que estaban dispuestos a hacer todo lo posible para pedirle perdón a Dios. Asimismo, toda buena confesión necesita preparación y esfuerzo. Sugeriría tomarse el tiempo para leer un buen examen, ya sea los que están en el nártex, en nuestra aplicación MyParish, en línea buscando el "Examen de conciencia de los Caballeros de Colón" o en nuestro sitio web bajo Sacramentos y seleccionar Reconciliación (donde se puede encontrar un Examen de Conciencia para Niños, Adolescentes, Solteros, Casados y uno en Español).

Ahora, con toda honestidad, debo reconocer que cuando teníamos que preparar la casa para nuestros visitantes, no siempre respondía de la manera más entusiasta. A veces solo terminaba mis tareas a regañadientes. Sin embargo, lo único que nunca cambió fue la alegría que todos teníamos al celebrar las fiestas con familiares y amigos. ¡Esto también puede suceder con el Sacramento de la Reconciliación! Puede que no sea una experiencia agradable tener que reconocer nuestro quebrantamiento y nuestros pecados, ¡pero nos permitirá celebrar aún más la bienvenida de Jesús en nuestros corazones esta Navidad!

En este espíritu, el Padre James y yo ofreceremos seis días seguidos de confesión este año. A partir del lunes 12 de diciembre, fiesta de Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe, hasta el viernes 16, de 7:00 a 8:30 p. m., seguido de nuestro horario normal de confesión de los sábados. Nuestra esperanza es dar suficiente tiempo para que las personas preparen sus corazones para recibir a Jesús.



# Second Sunday of Advent

### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Harmony. It can seem so elusive in these times when our news-feeds bombard us with reminders of what's wrong with our world: war, political conflicts, hunger, injustice, violence. We may also experience discord in our homes or within our hearts. Perhaps that is why the beautiful imagery in Isaiah's prophecy, where Isaiah envisions a world transformed by the coming of the Messiah, strikes a chord as we prepare for Christ's coming: We picture the wolf lying beside the lamb, and the calf with the lion. All will be right with the world. As we reflect on the areas in our lives that lack harmony, we are reminded to focus on Jesus and the Father, the source of all good. Through prayer and reflection on our Advent readings, we can "prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths."

#### GO EVANGELIZE

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I have a "smart" alarm clock. To shut it off, I just have to say, "Alexa, turn off my alarm." Easy, right? Well, too easy, it turns out, because lately I've slept right through the one-sided conversation. But it's hard to miss John's wake-up call: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand!" Perhaps, though, we've become complacent; we've heard it so often that we skip right past it. That can happen during Advent, this season of preparation and, yes, repentance. I love our family traditions - candy every day, in the morning!; our well-worn Nativity set; lighting the Advent candles; Christmas concerts and gatherings. None of those are bad, of course, but in the blur of the season we must be challenged by John the Baptist's words to prepare not only our homes but our hearts for Christ's coming. During this season, we can examine our lives to separate the wheat from the chaff. focusing on those things that bring us closer to the Lord and one another. As St. Paul encourages the Romans, "Welcome one another, then, as Christ welcomed you, for the glory of God."

PRAY St. Paul's words above give us pretty clear instruction for how to live out our faith by welcoming others as Christ has welcomed us. Reflect on these words during daily Advent reflection this week: When have we welcomed others in our lives – and truly loved them? How can we do that for someone in the coming days?


### **Healing Hearts Ministry**

- + Advent is the 4-week period leading up to Christmas. We burn candles to remind us that we are preparing for Jesus, the light of the world. This month, intentionally light a candle while you read a story together, play a board game, say a prayer, eat dinner together, etc. As you light the candle, remind your family that Jesus is the reason for the Christmas season.
- + Celebrate the Feast of St. Nicholas on December 6th. Have your children leave their shoes outside their bedroom door on the evening of the 5th. It is customary to have parents stuff them with treats: small oranges, chocolate coins, or an ornament for the tree. Share how Santa Claus can be traced back to this saint.
- + The star led the shepherds and wise men to the place where Jesus was born. Take a star and hide it each day for your children to find. On Christmas, hang it over your nativity or at the top of your tree!

Teaching: Wreaths were a teaching tool in the early Church. The circular shape represents the circle of life from Jesus'

birth till death. Pointy holly leaves symbolize the crown of thorns and the berries signify His blood and sacrifice for us. The enduring evergreen branches tell of His victory over death and forever love for us. As you see Christmas wreaths this year, stop for a moment and share this message!

# Best Hot Chocolate Recipe:

1 1/2 cups sugar 1 1/4 cups cocoa powder 1/2 - 1 1/4 teaspoon saft, to taste 3/4 cup hot water 1 gallon milk 1 tsp vanilla extract 1/4 tsp cinnamon

In a large saucepan, combine sugar, cocoa, and salt. Slowly add in hot water, mixing well. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture boils. Boil and stir for 2 minutes. Add milk, stirring occasionally. Do not boil. Remove from heat and whisk in vanilla and cinnamon.




