


News from P.I.T. (Priest in Training)



"What did you go out to the desert to see? A reed swayed by the wind?" One has to wonder why everyone who met Jesus didn't immediately fall down at His feet and exclaim, "Truly this man was the Son of God!" (Matt 27:54) Rather, He was hidden in ordinary human flesh. John the Baptist himself, who according to Jesus is greater than all those born of women, has to ask, "Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for anoth-

er?" Our expectations can severely limit our capacity to see, and Jesus' response to John is thus to refix his expectations.

It should therefore be no wonder that everyone who encounters the Eucharist doesn't immediately fall down at His feet and exclaim, "Truly this is the Son of God!" We can really only see the Eucharist for what it is, if we see Jesus for who He is, and adjust our expectations accordingly.

So, what would we expect? What has Jesus shown us about Himself? Jesus is humble. He's not afraid to be a helpless little baby. He is generous—He does not withhold His Body and Blood from being poured out for the world on the cross. He wants to be with us—so much so that He left the glory of heaven to visit His people. And He is radically in love with us—He is "the bridegroom", we are the bride, and He therefore wants to become "one flesh" with us.

Knowing this—knowing Jesus for who He truly is—it is no wonder that God gives Himself to us in the Eucharist: His Presence, His Sacrifice, and His Communion. Just as He was hidden in human flesh to give us this threefold gift, so too now He is doubly hidden, both His divinity and humanity, so as to give all of humanity these gifts until the end of time.

Jesus provides us with something irrefutably stable in his words, deeds, and person to show us who God is—in a word, He teaches us to see God. Although this doesn't come immediately to those who meet Our Lord, remember that "the blind regain their sight" because of Him. Thus, just as Jesus revealed how much God loves us on the cross, may we allow Him to heal our blindness and show us just how much God loves us in the Eucharist.

Noticias del P.I.T. (Sacerdote en formación)



"¿Qué salisteis a ver al desierto? ¿Una caña sacudida por el viento?" Uno tiene que preguntarse por qué todos los que conocieron a Jesús no se postraron inmediatamente a Sus pies y exclamaron: "¡Verdaderamente este hombre era el Hijo de Dios!" (Mateo 27:54). Más bien, Él estaba escondido en carne humana ordinaria. Juan el Bautista mismo, quien según Jesús es el más grande que todos los nacidos de mujer, tiene que preguntar: "¿Eres tú el que ha de venir, o debemos esperar a

otro?" Nuestras expectativas pueden limitar severamente nuestra capacidad de ver, y la respuesta de Jesús a Juan es, por lo tanto, volver a fijar sus expectativas.

Por lo tanto, no debería sorprendernos que todos los que se encuentran con la Eucaristía no se postran inmediatamente a Sus pies y exclaman: "¡Verdaderamente este es el Hijo de Dios!" Realmente solo podemos ver la Eucaristía por lo que es, si vemos a Jesús por lo que Él es, y ajustamos nuestras expectativas como corresponde.

Entonces, ¿qué esperaríamos? ¿Qué nos ha mostrado Jesús acerca de Sí Mismo? Jesús es humilde. No tiene miedo de ser un pequeño bebé indefenso. Él es generoso: Él no impide que Su Cuerpo y Su Sangre sean derramados por el mundo en la cruz. Él quiere estar con nosotros, tanto que El dejó la gloria del cielo para visitar a Su pueblo. Y Él está radicalmente enamorado de nosotros: Él es "el novio", nosotros somos la novia, y por eso El quiere hacerse "una sola carne" con nosotros.

Sabiendo esto, conociendo a Jesús por lo que El realmente es, no es de extrañar que Dios se entregue El Mismo a nosotros en la Eucaristía: Su Presencia, Su Sacrificio y Su Comunión. Así como Él se escondió en carne humana para darnos este triple regalo, así también ahora El está doblemente escondido, tanto en su divinidad como en su humanidad, para dar a toda la humanidad estos dones hasta el fin de los tiempos.

Jesús nos proporciona algo irrefutablemente estable en sus palabras, hechos y persona para mostrarnos quién es Dios; en una palabra, nos enseña a ver a Dios. Aunque esto no llega de inmediato a quienes se encuentran con Nuestro Señor, recuerden que "los ciegos recobran la vista" gracias a Él. Así como Jesús reveló cuánto nos ama Dios en la cruz, permitamos que Él cure nuestra ceguera y nos muestre cuánto nos ama Dios en la Eucaristía.



GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Today many of us light a rose Advent candle as we celebrate Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete means "rejoice," and today's readings hint at the joy of Christ's coming. Who among us can't relate to the concrete examples from the prophet Isaiah that give us many reasons for hope and joy as we anticipate Christ's birth. Those of us who have experienced fear or doubt find reassurance: "Be strong, fear not!" During the holidays when many will grieve those who have died this past year, we hear that "sorrow and mourning will flee." In today's Gospel, John the Baptist points us to the source of our joy in the person of Jesus Christ. As we continue to prepare for his coming, we can take comfort knowing that God is with us now and for eternity. As we hear in today's Psalm, "The Lord God keeps faith forever."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I am not a patient person. Waiting in the slow grocery line raises my heart rate, and I have to use cruise control in 35 mph zones (it works!). Despite my impatience, I've grown to love planting a vegetable garden in the spring and never cease to be amazed at the rich harvest of tomatoes in July or August. As St. James reminds us, we can learn from the farmer who patiently waits for the rains. "You too must be patient. Make your hearts firm, because the coming of the Lord is at hand." Just as the rains help our tomatoes to come in – a miracle that still surprises me each summer – our faithfulness, prayer and good works can nurture our hearts and our souls.
