News from P.I.T. (Priest in Training)



The Eucharist is the “source and summit of the Christian life”. (*Lumen Gentium*, 11) It is our direct contact with the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus. As St. John Paul II put it, “The Church constantly draws her life from the redeeming sacrifice; she approaches it not only through faith-filled remembrance, but also through a real contact, since this sacrifice is made present ever anew, sacramentally perpetuated, in every community which offers it at the hands of the consecrated minister. The Eucharist thus applies to men and women today the reconciliation won once for all by Christ for mankind in every age.” (*Ecclesia de Eucharistia*, 12)

There’s a *lot* riding on the Catholic doctrine of transubstantiation (the bread and wine change substantially into the Body and Blood of Jesus), so if we have any doubts about Jesus’ intentions when he instituted the Eucharist at the Last Supper, let’s listen to how the early Christians understood what Jesus meant by the words “This is my body...do this in remembrance of me.”

St. Ignatius of Antioch, writing in AD 110: “I have no taste for corruptible food nor for the pleasures of this life. I desire the bread of God, which is the flesh of Jesus Christ, who was of the seed of David; and for drink I desire his blood, which is love incorruptible.” (*Letter to the Romans* 7:3)

“Take note of those who hold heterodox opinions on the grace of Jesus Christ which has come to us, and see how contrary their opinions are to the mind of God. . . . They abstain from the Eucharist and from prayer because they do not confess that the Eucharist is the flesh of our Savior Jesus Christ, flesh which suffered for our sins and which that Father, in his goodness, raised up again. They who deny the gift of God are perishing in their disputes.” (*Letter to the Smyrnaeans* 6:2–7:1)

St. Justin Martyr, writing in AD 151: “We call this food Eucharist, and no one else is permitted to partake of it, except one who believes our teaching to be true and who has been washed in the washing which is for the remission of sins and for regeneration [i.e., has received baptism] and is thereby living as Christ enjoined. For not as common bread nor common drink do we receive these; but since Jesus Christ our Savior was made incarnate by the word of God and had both flesh and blood for our salvation, so too, as we have been taught, the food which has been made into the Eucharist by the Eucharistic prayer set down by him, and by the change of which our blood and flesh is nurtured, is both the flesh and the blood of that incarnated Jesus” (*First Apology* 66)

St. Irenaeus, writing in AD 189: “He has declared the cup, a part of creation, to be his own blood, from which he causes our blood to flow; and the bread, a part of creation, he has established as his own body, from which he gives increase unto our bodies. When, therefore, the mixed cup [wine and water] and the baked bread receives the Word of God and becomes the Eucharist, the body of Christ, and from these the substance of our flesh is increased and supported, how can they say that the flesh is not capable of receiving the gift of God, which is eternal life—flesh which is nourished by the body and blood of the Lord, and is in fact a member of him?” (*Against Heresies*, 5:2).

Noticias del P.I.T. (Sacerdote en formación)



La Eucaristía es la “fuente y cumbre de la vida Cristiana” (*Lumen Gentium*, 11). Es nuestro contacto directo con la pasión, muerte y resurrección de Jesús. Como dijo San Juan Pablo II, “La Iglesia constantemente saca su vida del sacrificio redentor; se acerca a él no sólo a través del recuerdo lleno de fe, sino también a través de un contacto real, ya que este sacrificio se hace presente siempre de nuevo, perpetuado sacramentalmente, en cada comunidad que lo ofrece de manos del ministro consagrado. La Eucaristía aplica así a los hombres y mujeres de hoy la reconciliación ganada una vez por todas por Cristo para la humanidad en todos los tiempos” (*Ecclesia de Eucharistia*, 12).

Hay mucho en juego en la doctrina Católica de la transubstanciación (el pan y el vino se transforman sustancialmente en el Cuerpo y la Sangre de Jesús), así que si tenemos alguna duda sobre las intenciones de Jesús cuando instituyó la Eucaristía en la Última Cena, escuchemos cómo los primeros cristianos entendieron lo que Jesús quiso decir con las palabras “Esto es mi cuerpo... haced esto en memoria mía”.

San Ignacio de Antioquía, escribiendo en el año 110 DC: “No tengo gusto por la comida corruptible ni por los placeres de esta vida. Deseo el pan de Dios, que es la carne de Jesucristo, que era del linaje de David; y como bebida deseo su sangre, que es el amor incorruptible” (*Carta a los Romanos* 7:3).

“Tomen nota de los que tienen opiniones heterodoxas sobre la gracia de Jesucristo que ha venido a nosotros, y vean cuán contrarias son sus opiniones a la mente de Dios. . . . Se abstienen de la Eucaristía y de la oración porque no confiesan que la Eucaristía es la carne de nuestro Salvador Jesucristo, carne que padeció por nuestros pecados y que ese Padre, en su bondad, lo resucitó. Los que niegan el don de Dios perecen en sus disputas” (*Carta a los de Esmirna* 6:2–7:1).

San Justino Mártir, escribiendo en el año 151 DC: “Llamamos a este alimento Eucaristía, y nadie más puede participar de él, excepto aquel que cree que nuestra enseñanza es verdadera y que ha sido lavado en el lavatorio que es para la remisión de los pecados y para la regeneración [es decir, ha recibido el bautismo] y por lo tanto está viviendo como Cristo ordenó. Porque no como pan común ni bebida común los recibimos; pero puesto que Jesucristo, nuestro Salvador, se encarnó por la palabra de Dios y tuvo carne y sangre para nuestra salvación, así también, como se nos ha enseñado, el alimento que se ha convertido en la Eucaristía por la oración Eucarística establecida por él, y de cuyo cambio se nutre nuestra sangre y carne, es a la vez la carne y la sangre de aquel Jesús encarnado” (*Primera Apología* 66).

San Ireneo, escribiendo en el año 189 DC: “Él ha declarado que la copa, una parte de la creación, es su propia sangre, de la cual Él hace que fluya nuestra sangre; y el pan, una parte de la creación, lo ha establecido como su propio cuerpo, del cual da crecimiento a nuestros cuerpos. Cuando, por lo tanto, la copa mezclada [vino y agua] y el pan horneado reciben la Palabra de Dios y se convierten en la Eucaristía, el cuerpo de Cristo, y de éstos crece y se sostiene la sustancia de nuestra carne, ¿cómo pueden decir que la carne no es capaz de recibir el don de Dios, que es la vida eterna, carne que se nutre del cuerpo y de la sangre del Señor, y es de hecho un miembro de él?” (*Contra las Herejías*, 5:2).

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

It's amazing how one interaction can brighten an otherwise gloomy day. I love a nice sunrise on a wintry morning or a crackling fire on an autumn night. But whatever the weather, nothing quite lights up my day like a shared laugh with a friend, a snippet of real conversation with my teen son, or a hot cup of coffee delivered by my husband. In today's reading, Jesus continues the Sermon on the Mount, telling the disciples: "Your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father." We, too, can be light for others – through good deeds large and small, ordinary and extraordinary. As we go about our days, we can ask the Lord to show us how to serve others. We will have days when we don't feel up to the task but, like St. Paul, we can ask the Holy Spirit to light the way.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus used images that resonate with us as much as they did with his followers 2,000 years ago: salt and light. Salt serves many purposes, preserving our food and giving it flavor, for example. And of course we cannot live without light. In today's Gospel, Jesus tells the disciples: "You are the salt of the earth ... You are the light of the world." Like the disciples we, too, can be salt and light for others by giving witness to our faith. What that involves will be different for each of us. For ideas, we can turn to today's reading from Isaiah, which calls us to share our bread, shelter the oppressed and clothe the naked. In doing so, our light "shall break forth like the dawn."

ACTION We all know people we'd call "the salt of the earth." Who are those people in your life? Make a list of the characteristics they exhibit or actions they take that you can learn from and try to imitate. Ask God for the grace to see and do likewise for his glory.

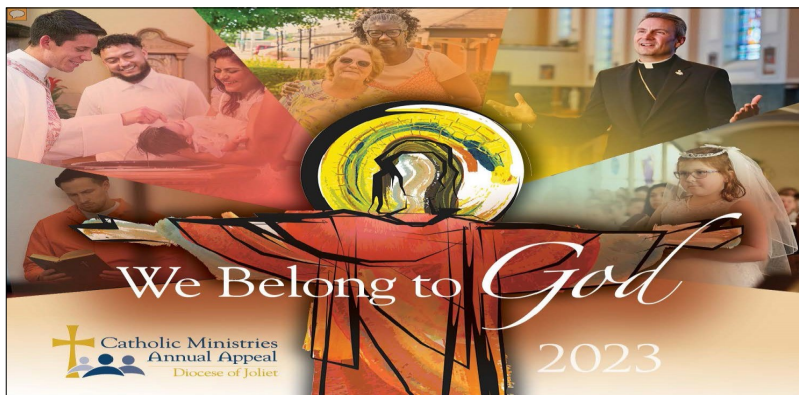
