

News from P.I.T. (Pastor in Training)



Sometimes we come across a Gospel reading where we initially hear it and don't know how to react! This Sunday's reading of Jesus initially rejecting the Canaanite woman is perhaps one of them. We may see Jesus's treatment and response to her harsh and difficult to comprehend. Isn't our faith in Jesus Christ based on his willingness to die for EVERYONE? Why does Jesus ignore this woman and then compare the Canaanite people to dogs?

I'm sure there are various ways to approach this Gospel passage. One approach is to ask the question, "Could Jesus be testing the woman's perseverance even in the midst of persecution, which is something the Apostles will eventually have to learn themselves?" I, however, would like to approach today's Gospel with this main proposition about our own brokenness: When God's actions don't match up with our will, we seem to always perceive God's actions as harsh and questionable.

Have you ever wanted God to act or respond to a problem in your life? And what happened when your prayers were not answered in the ways you wanted them to? Did you throw a fit? (As I have done many times) Did you feel like God didn't have a plan for you, let alone love you?

Yet, what is clear throughout the Scriptures is that God loves all of us and desires to bring salvation, not only to the Israelites, but to all people (cf. 1 Tim 2:4). We fail in our perception of God's plan in not understanding that God doesn't always act the way we want Him to. We don't see God's greater picture of salvation. Jesus Christ came to fulfill the covenants (promises) given to the Israelites first, and then spread salvation to the whole world. Hence Christ said, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel" (Matthew 15:24). And then after his death and resurrection he said, "Go, therefore and make disciples of ALL NATIONS, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 28:16-20). God's plan from the very beginning was to bring all nations, including the Canaanite woman, into His Body the Church. Yet, in its proper time and way!

Sometimes when God doesn't act or respond the way we want Him too, we feel that God is harsh and unresponsive. But what we need to realize is that the Lord's love and plan is greater than our own. He desires the good and salvation of all people, including you and me! Let's, yes, learn from the Canaanite woman in perseverance, but more importantly trust in the Lord when He doesn't respond in the way we want Him too!

Noticias del P.I.T. (Párroco en Formación)



¡A veces nos encontramos con una lectura del Evangelio donde inicialmente la escuchamos y no sabemos cómo reaccionar! La lectura de este domingo de Jesús rechazando inicialmente a la mujer Cananea es quizás una de ellas. Podemos ver el trato y la respuesta de Jesús a ella dura y difícil de comprender. ¿No se basa nuestra fe en Jesucristo en su voluntad de morir por TODOS? ¿Por qué Jesús ignora a esta mujer y luego compara al pueblo Cananeo con perros?

Estoy seguro de que hay varias maneras de abordar este pasaje del Evangelio. Un enfoque es hacer la pregunta: "¿Podría Jesús estar probando la perseverancia de la mujer incluso en medio de la persecución, que es algo que los Apóstoles eventualmente tendrán que aprender por sí mismos?" Sin embargo, me gustaría abordar el Evangelio de hoy con esta proposición principal sobre nuestro propio quebrantamiento: cuando las acciones de Dios no coinciden con nuestra voluntad, parece que siempre percibimos las acciones de Dios como duras y cuestionables.

¿Alguna vez has querido que Dios actúe o responda a un problema en tu vida? ¿Y qué pasó cuando tus oraciones no fueron respondidas de la manera que querías? ¿Tuviste un ataque? (Como lo he hecho muchas veces) ¿Sentiste que Dios no tenía un plan para ti, y mucho menos amarte?

Sin embargo, lo que está claro a lo largo de las Escrituras es que Dios nos ama a todos y desea traer la salvación, no sólo a los israelitas, sino a todas las personas (cf. 1 Tim 2: 4). Fallamos en nuestra percepción del plan de Dios al no entender que Dios no siempre actúa como queremos. No vemos la imagen más grande de Dios de la salvación. Jesucristo vino a cumplir los pactos (promesas) dados a los israelitas primero, y luego esparcir la salvación a todo el mundo. Por eso Cristo dijo: "Solo he sido enviado a las ovejas perdidas de la casa de Israel" (Mateo 15:24). Y luego, después de su muerte y resurrección, dijo: "Vayan, pues, y hagan discípulos a TODAS LAS NACIONES, bautizándolos en el nombre del Padre y del Hijo y del Espíritu Santo" (Mateo 28:16-20). El plan de Dios desde el principio fue traer a todas las naciones, incluyendo a la mujer Cananea, a Su Cuerpo, la Iglesia. ¡Sin embargo, en su debido tiempo y manera!

A veces, cuando Dios no actúa o responde de la manera en que lo queremos, sentimos que Dios es duro e indiferente. Pero de lo que debemos darnos cuenta es que el amor y el plan del Señor son más grandes que los nuestros. ¡Él desea el bien y la salvación de todas las personas, incluidos ustedes y yo! ¡Aprendamos, sí, de la mujer Cananea en perseverancia, pero lo más importante es que confiemos en el Señor cuando Él no responde de la manera que nosotros también lo queremos!



The abundance of God's love for us is what stood out for me in our readings today. If we consider the concept of abundance outside the Scriptures, it can be tricky. When we have it, does it imply we have too much when others have too little? If we are speaking of material things, then perhaps. But God's infinite and merciful love for us resound in each of our readings today, and this is cause for joy. In Isaiah, the Lord announces that he will accept offerings from anyone who holds to his covenant, Jewish or not. Saint Paul stresses that God's mercy is for all, and Jesus, after some back-and-forth with the Canaanite woman, heals the woman's daughter because of her great faith. God never tires of desiring healing and wholeness for all his children, which is a great gift. Let this gift of grace from God be a catalyst for us to reach out in love to others so that we also can come to God's "holy mountain and [be made] joyful in [his] house of prayer."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

How can we reach out in love to others as we called to do? Perhaps we can start with our parish. Is there a ministry we have read about in the bulletin that needs volunteers? Or a coordinator? Perhaps it is time to ask God how we can be his instrument in the world. We can start small. I will never forget when my friend volunteered to run our Vacation Bible School one summer. Of course, she turned to her friends to help her with this daunting task! What she desperately needed was someone to go from classroom to classroom and lead the children in song. Talk about out of my comfort zone! But she gave me the music books and song suggestions, and pretty soon, "This Little Light of Mine" was reverberating through the halls of the school. I learned then and there that kids don't notice the quality of your voice if you are joyful and enthusiastic. They love to sing! Take a chance and get out there. You won't regret it.

PRAY Lord, Jesus Christ, give me the wisdom to view my hands as extensions of yours. Give me eyes to see all people as you see them. Help me to use my voice to praise you and bring the truth of your goodness to everyone I encounter. Give me the strength to have unwavering faith. Amen.

"WHAT I DID THIS SUMMER" is usually the first essay of the school year for students. My own essay would include a trip to El Salvador, staying at Nuestros Pequeños Hermanos (Spanish for "Our Little Brothers and Sisters"). NPH was originally founded in Mexico, by Father William Wasson in 1954, as a home to care for orphaned,

abandoned and at-risk children. He created a safe place where children could thrive within a culture of unconditional love and faith at its core. Currently, NPH nurtures children and transforms lives in nine countries in Latin America and the Caribbean.

With permission from Cardinal George, I worked as a priest as the Regional Director of our NPH homes in Central America from 2005 until 2010. Last month, I returned to El Salvador, and as I walked through the enormous doors, the aromas of handmade tortillas mixed with the cow farm next door instantly filled me with memories from five years of service there. I instantly smiled and thought to myself, what a blessing to be back here! I knew, of course, I would be sacrificing many of the creature comforts of home during my visit.

While I was there, NPH celebrated its 24th anniversary of operating a home in El Salvador. We began the day with an early Mass, and I was uplifted knowing the tradition of full and active participation in the liturgy still exists there, as over 500 children enthusiastically sang and responded to the prayers.

After Mass, everyone changed out of their "church clothes" and into their "play clothes." By 9 a.m. it was already 95 degrees, so I, too, decided to change out of my black suit and roman collar and into a T-shirt and sandals. It was a good decision because the day's next activity was an hour-long Zumba/salsa class! Did the bishop Zumba and salsa? Yes! However, trust me when I say that I lacked all skill and grace while doing it—it was an exercise in true humility that also got my heart pumping.

The rest of the day was filled with games and soccer tournaments as we basked in each other's warm friendship and lively conversation. The highlight for the children was being served hotdogs, a bag of chips and a can of pop for lunch. While you may think this is rather basic food, these children are accustomed to eating rice and beans daily, so this was a wonderful and welcomed treat.

After my morning holy hour the next day, I waited for the daily ritual of the water trickling on at 6 a.m. After showering, I dressed in my black suit, roman collar and pectoral cross and got into a pickup truck to drive across the border to Guatemala—a trip that should have taken about two-and-a-half hours. However, because of the condition of the roads scattered with potholes and fallen trees, the drive took almost four hours.

I arrived in the town of Santa Rosa de Lima to ordain Juan Carlos Pirir. For the past four years he has been a seminarian studying for the Diocese of Joliet. After completing his studies, I ordained him a priest there in his hometown as he was surrounded by his parents, siblings, relatives and just about everyone else from the town.

Before and after the Mass, fireworks were launched. And outside of the church, with its large choir and sacred music, the spirit of fiesta filled the air with booming music along with colorful balloons, banners and decorations. It was an amazing celebration and reflected the deep faith in that community, which formed Father Juan Carlos Pirir and fostered his vocation.

Back in El Salvador, a strong storm came through and knocked out the power my last night there. But instead of being upset by this inconvenience, I was thankful for the rain which cooled everything down, including me.

As I went to bed, I thanked God for keeping me safe during my travels. I asked for special blessings upon the dear children of NPH and upon Father Juan's proud family and supportive community. My "summer essay" would thank God for the comforts we enjoy "back home" and often take for granted: our safety, food, water, electricity and our parish communities.


