

## News from P.I.T. (Pastor in Training)



A day I will never forget is when I walked in on my parents watching a movie about St. Thérèse of Lisieux. That movie begins with a simple line, taken from Thérèse's writings: "I want to be a saint." I didn't know that you could want that, but now that I knew, I wanted it! The problem was that I had unusual ways of pursuing that desire. For example, St. Thérèse died at the age of twenty-four of tuberculosis. As a result, every time I left a physical, I would leave disappointed because my tuberculosis test would come back negative. Long before I

turned twenty-four, I realized that my life would look different, but that did not mean that I gave up my desire to become a saint.

In the Second Reading, St. Paul writes, "And you became imitators of us and of the Lord, receiving the word in great affliction, with joy from the Holy Spirit, so that you became a model for all the believers." We are called to imitate the saints and Jesus so that we can become a model for others.

It does not mean we have to imitate the concrete details of every saint's life. As we approach the Solemnity of All Saints on November 1st, we have different opportunities to enter into the lives of the saints, such as the Saints Around the World event on October 28th. As we look at all these saints, we see how different their lives are, but also how they all have one thing in common: love of God and love of neighbor.

In each of the saints, this love shone out in ways as unique as each one of them, and that is what we are called to imitate. Just as they made Jesus' commandment to love take flesh amid the concrete details of their lives, so are we called to love amid the concrete details of our lives. But we can't keep this to ourselves.

In the Gospel, Jesus says the greatest commandment of the law is to love God and to love our neighbors. At the Last Supper, Jesus takes this even further by giving us a new commandment: "Love one another as I have loved you." Because we have received the love of Jesus that led Him to the Cross, we are called to love others with that same love. This might seem daunting, but when we look at the saints, we see that it has been done thousands of times and thousands of different ways.

Loving as Christ loves does not necessarily mean dying of tuberculosis at the age of twenty-four, but it means taking the love we have received from Christ and making it present to others. Pope Francis wrote in *C'est la Confiance*, his Apostolic Exhortation on St. Thérèse, "In the heart of Therese, the grace of baptism became this impetuous torrent flowing into the ocean of Christ's love and dragging in its wake a multitude of brothers and sisters."

# Noticias del P.I.T. (Sacerdote en formación)



Un día que nunca olvidaré es cuando encontré a mis padres viendo una película sobre Santa Teresa de Lisieux. Esa película comienza con una frase simple, tomada de los escritos de Teresa: "Quiero ser santa". No sabía que podrías querer eso, pero ahora que lo sabía, ilo quería! El problema era que tenía formas inusuales de perseguir ese deseo. Por ejemplo, Santa Teresa murió a la edad de veinticuatro años de tuberculosis. Como resultado, cada vez que salía de un examen anual médico, salía decepcionado porque mi prueba de tuberculosis salía negativa. Mucho

antes de cumplir veinticuatro años, me di cuenta de que mi vida sería diferente, pero eso no significó que renunciara a mi deseo de convertirme en santo.

En la Segunda Lectura, San Pablo escribe: "Y ustedes se hicieron imitadores nuestros y del Señor, pues en medio de muchas tribulaciones y con la alegría que da el Espíritu Santo, han aceptado la palabra de Dios en tal forma, que han llegado a ser ejemplo para todos los creyentes". Estamos llamados a imitar a los santos y a Jesús para poder convertirnos en modelo para los demás.

No significa que tengamos que imitar los detalles concretos de la vida de cada santo. A medida que nos acercamos a la Solemnidad de Todos los Santos el 1 de noviembre, tenemos diferentes oportunidades para entrar en la vida de los santos, como el evento de los Santos Alrededor del Mundo el 28 de octubre. Al mirar a todos estos santos, vemos cuán diferentes son sus vidas, pero también cómo todos tienen una cosa en común: el amor a Dios y el amor al prójimo.

En cada uno de los santos este amor brilló de maneras tan únicas como cada uno de ellos, y eso es lo que estamos llamados a imitar. Así como ellos hicieron que el mandamiento de Jesús de amar se hiciera realidad en los detalles concretos de sus vidas, así nosotros estamos llamados a amar en los detalles concretos de nuestras vidas. Pero no podemos guardarnos esto para nosotros mismos.

En el Evangelio, Jesús dice que el mayor mandamiento de la ley es amar a Dios y amar a nuestro prójimo. En la Última Cena, Jesús va aún más lejos al darnos un nuevo mandamiento: "Amaos unos a otros como yo os he amado". Porque hemos recibido el amor de Jesús que lo llevó a la Cruz, estamos llamados a amar a los demás con ese mismo amor. Esto puede parecer desalentador, pero cuando miramos a los santos, vemos que se ha hecho miles de veces y de miles de maneras diferentes.

Amar como ama Cristo no significa necesariamente morir de tuberculosis a los veinticuatro años, sino que significa tomar el amor que hemos recibido de Cristo y hacerlo presente a los demás. El Papa Francisco escribió en C'est la Confiance, su Exhortación Apostólica sobre Santa Teresa: "En el corazón de Teresa, la gracia del bautismo se convirtió en un torrente impetuoso que desemboca en el océano del amor de Cristo, arrastrando consigo una multitud de hermanos y hermanas".



## Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Ex 22:20-26 | 1 Thes 1:5c-10 | Mt 22:34-40



Sometimes I stop paying attention to the news for a period of time. There seems to be little that's "new" in the daily barrage of natural disasters and the countless ways we humans hurt each other. I've even stopped using social media, which at least made me smile when seeing photos of friends and family welcoming little ones or celebrating big milestones. Which brings me to today's Gospel: Sometimes it seems overwhelming to want to love as Christ commands, and I feel that there's little, if anything, I can do for people outside of my social circle, let alone on the opposite side of the world. Hearing of my struggles with compassion fatigue, a friend recently reminded me of some wise words that have been attributed to St. Mother Teresa: "Never worry about numbers. Help one person at a time and always start with the person nearest you." We love as Christ commands by willing the good of the other. And it is not trite or cliché to say at times, "honestly, all I can do right now is pray." After all, as the Lord says, "If he cries out to me, I will hear him; for I am compassionate." When our compassion is exhausted, let the Lord carry it, for he never tires. And then, when it is possible, practical, and seems to be inspired by the Holy Spirit, we can do more - whatever that may be.

#### GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

If you're like me and somewhat daunted by the second greatest commandment, I encourage you to take another look at today's readings. "You shall love your *neighbor...*" (emphasis added). Surely the world is far too large for us to make a difference? Therefore, remember that "God so loved the world" – and what he asks of us is to love our *neighbor*. So leave the world to God; pray for and give alms for those bigger world issues when we're able. When our circumstances change and we have more time and energy to take on more, such as participate in ministry, even better! But until then, when we walk out our front door in the morning, we go forth knowing that we are "imitators ... of the Lord," and that this smaller, much more manageable part of the world is what we are called to tend. Let our most active role in being the body of Christ extend to what is immediate to us – our neighbor and community – because that is where we will have the most influence for Christ in the world.

**MEDITATE** When you feel overwhelmed with the world, reflect upon today's responsorial psalm: "I love you, Lord, my strength." Let God's love for the world and his strength flow into your heart, and know that you can call on him to help you bear the burden of love.

## CONTEMPLATING THE CONVOCATION

BESIDES CELEBRATING MASS ON SUNDAYS, a question people frequently ask me is, "What do priests do during the week?" My initial response is that priesthood is so much more than a 9-to-5 job—it is more like a 24/7 vocation.

A priest is called to serve God and His people, and to assist his

bishop by governing, teaching, and sanctifying. In modern times, it may seem like a priest is expected to be able to administer with an MBA, counsel with the spirituality of the saints, offer a love for the poor of Saint Mother Teresa, maintain the constant energy of a newly ordained priest, and resolve issues with the wisdom of a seasoned pastor.

While it is virtually impossible to embody all those expectations, leading a parish with a wide variety of ministries and missions in the Catholic Church has become more complicated and challenging. Therefore, there is a growing need to attend to the professional development and spiritual growth of priests. In the Diocese of Joliet, we are blessed to have a director of on-going formation for priests, Father Sunny Castillo, who currently also serves as pastor of Mary Queen of Heaven Parish in Elmhurst.

Besides coordinating a variety of programs for spiritual, educational, and professional growth, Father Sunny and a dedicated team of priests, staff, and volunteers also organize a bi-annual convocation. This September, the priests of the diocese all gathered at our four-day convocation to pray, grow in camaraderie, and learn from a series of talks presented by Sister Miriam James Heidland from the Society of Our Lady of the Most Holy Trinity.

Sister Miriam's daily topics highlighted our theme, The Journey of the Priestly Heart: Building a Eucharistic Legacy in the Priesthood. At the very beginning, she said that one of the greatest dangers to priests is "a hardening of heart." Using a powerful example, she explained that after the child Jesus was found in the temple, the Gospel says that the Holy Family returned home, and Jesus grew. She warned us, "Woe is the day you stop *growing* as priests." This stirring advice is good not only for priests, but also to anyone, especially when it comes to the spiritual life.

I wish space allowed me to share all her many other valuable teachings. Towards the end of the convocation, after Sister Miriam had departed, I pointed out to everyone that she has a true and deep respect for priests. I was moved to say, "I hope you love your priesthood as much as she does."

Besides listening to Sister Miriam's presentations, we also celebrated daily Mass, prayed the Liturgy of the Hours, and had the opportunity to pray a rosary, Divine Mercy Chaplet and daily holy hour with adoration and benediction. And between the prayers and talks, the priests shared with each other their struggles, their triumphs, and their leadership insights.

Evenings were spent enjoying rare social time with brother priests. At one dinner, we honored those marking a special jubilee year of their priesthood. The next evening, we celebrated our upcoming 75th anniversary as a diocese. Not only did we enjoy good food and conversation, but we competed in a friendly trivia game to see who knew the most about the history of the Diocese of Joliet. What a joy to learn more about the deep roots and richness of our diocese!

The last day of the convocation allowed me the opportunity to give a "state of the union" presentation in which I shared a good deal of information and issues, including a Q-and-A session and groupwide dialogue. Appropriately, before departing, we gathered for Mass one more time to thank God for all the blessings and fruits of the convocation.

I left the convocation with a smile on my face, deeply grateful to God for the time and space to renew our minds, bodies, and souls as a presbyterate. My gratitude bubbled over for our priests, and all the clergy, religious, and laity who make this Church so vibrant and wonderful.

May we all continue to *grow* in the knowledge, love, and service of the Lord and each other.






The bride, groom or either set of parents must be registered members of the parish for at least six months prior to scheduling a wedding. Weddings may be scheduled no less than six months out in order to fulfill the diocesan marriage preparation requirements. Contact Diane Reiter, ext. 221.


