



News from P.I.T. (Pastor in Training)



To be attentive and to stay attentive is very hard. It takes a significant effort to stay focused on the task at hand. And yet, this is what the Lord is asking of us in our 1st Sunday of Advent readings. As much as we like to think we can multi-task, it has been proven that it's better to focus on one thing at a time than to try to juggle multiple activities at once. How many of us try to juggle prayer

with our daily activities, only to come to the conclusion that we are failing to pray as we ought? Currently, I'm thinking of all the things I need to do to get ready for Christmas, from liturgical duties like extra confessions and Masses to buying Christmas presents for my niece and nephews so that I can keep the title of "Coolest Uncle." Yet, in all these tasks that need to be done, the most important task should be preparing my heart for the Lord and his coming.

The Advent season begins a new liturgical year for the Church. Similar to the resolutions we make for our calendar New Year, the Church is asking us to make a resolution now. In the Gospel today, the Lord is asking his disciples, which include us, to keep watch for his coming. We need to recommit to being attentive, and to preparing our hearts to receive the Lord. Isn't that much easier said than done?

The winter season naturally is a perfect time for refocusing. As the sun sets earlier each day, nights come sooner and the temperature begins to drop. Have you ever walked outside on a crisp cold night? I feel that during these late night walks my thoughts become clearer and prayer becomes easier. Maybe it's the cold waking me up, the silence as nature is hibernating in the darkness, or maybe it's the awe of looking up at the stars on a clear night. The Advent season seems to help us turn even more towards reflective prayer, just as the Lord has asked it of us.

I'd encourage you to take advantage of this Advent season. Don't get up caught up so easily in the noise and distractions of preparing for Christmas, or in the busyness of daily life. Instead, take the time to pull away and be attentive to the longings of your heart for our Lord who has come, is coming, and will come again.

Noticias del P.I.T. (Párroco en Formación)



Estar atento y permanecer atento es muy difícil. Se necesita un esfuerzo significativo para mantenerse concentrado en la tarea en cuestión. Y, sin embargo, esto es lo que el Señor nos pide en nuestras lecturas del primer domingo de Adviento. Por mucho que nos guste pensar que podemos realizar múltiples tareas, se ha demostrado que es mejor concentrarse en una cosa a la vez que intentar hacer malabares con varias actividades a la

vez. ¿Cuántos de nosotros tratamos de hacer malabares con la oración en nuestras actividades diarias, sólo para llegar a la conclusión de que no estamos orando como deberíamos? Actualmente, estoy pensando en todas las cosas que necesito hacer para prepararme para la Navidad, desde las responsabilidades litúrgicas como confesiones y Misas adicionales hasta comprar regalos de Navidad para mi sobrina y sobrinos para poder conservar el título del "Tío más Genial". Sin embargo, en todas estas tareas que hay que hacer, la tarea más importante debe ser preparar mi corazón para el Señor y su venida.

La temporada de Adviento inicia un nuevo año litúrgico para la Iglesia. De manera similar a las resoluciones que hacemos para nuestro calendario del Año Nuevo, la Iglesia nos pide que hagamos una resolución ahora. En el Evangelio de hoy, el Señor pide a sus discípulos, entre los que nos incluye a nosotros, que estemos atentos a su venida. Necesitamos volver a comprometernos a estar atentos y preparar nuestros corazones para recibir al Señor. ¿No es mucho más fácil decirlo que hacerlo?

Naturalmente, la temporada de invierno es un tiempo perfecto para reenfocarse. Como el sol se pone más temprano cada día, las noches llegan más temprano y la temperatura comienza a bajar. ¿Alguna vez han caminado afuera en una noche fría y fresca? Siento que durante estos paseos nocturnos mis pensamientos se vuelven más claros y la oración se vuelve más fácil. Tal vez sea el frío que me despierta, el silencio mientras la naturaleza hiberna en la oscuridad, o tal vez sea el asombro de mirar las estrellas en una noche despejada. La temporada de Adviento parece ayudarnos a volvernos aún más hacia la oración reflexiva, tal como el Señor nos lo ha pedido.

Los animo a que aprovechen esta temporada de Adviento. No se dejen atrapar tan fácilmente por el ruido y las distracciones de los preparativos para la Navidad, o por el ajetreo de la vida diaria. En lugar de eso, tómense el tiempo para alejarse y estar atentos a los anhelos de su corazón por nuestro Señor que ha venido, viene y vendrá nuevamente.

In a nineteenth-century sermon, St. John Henry Newman wrote of today's Gospel: "[Jesus] mercifully whispers into our ears ... not to share in the general unbelief [around us], not to be carried away by the world but to 'beware, keep alert' and look out for his coming." I love the thought that Jesus is "mercifully whispering" to us. Welcome to Advent! We know that Advent is a time of anticipation and preparing our hearts for the coming of Christ, but today's readings also speak to me of training ourselves to be alert for God's presence in the small, everyday moments of our lives. In his Letter to the Corinthians, Paul writes that "[we] are not lacking in any spiritual gift" as we await the revelation of our Lord Jesus Christ. We are gifted with his grace. Our loving God bestows countless graces on us each day, and with the help of the Holy Spirit we can seek ways to be more aware of these graces. Yes, we can be more "alert" to them, but can also be thankful for these small moments of God's presence with us.


PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Our diocese will soon take up the national collection for the Retirement Fund for Religious. Your support for this collection December 9/10 provides financial assistance for retirement needs for 297 U.S. religious communities.

Catholic sisters, brothers and religious order priests—collectively known as women and men religious—have selflessly served for decades without significant financial compensation. However, due to escalating health-care costs, numerous U.S. religious communities face a substantial gap between their elderly members' needs and the financial resources available for their care. Many religious orders currently experience insufficient retirement savings.

The 2022 appeal demonstrated Catholics' tremendous generosity by raising \$27.6 million. Diocese of Joliet parishioners contributed \$286,788.25 to the collection.

The senior religious in our diocese never retire from their vows, and they play a crucial role in conveying the faith from one generation to the next. In their younger years, they laid the foundation for Catholic schools, hospitals, and works of mercy. Today, many serve in volunteer ministry as ongoing witnesses to the Gospel. Others are frail and need assistance, yet all remain wholly committed to their vocations by embracing the opportunity to spend more time praying for our Church and world.

Weddings




