



News from P.I.T. (Priest in Training)



When I was a little kid, when I was bad, the usual punishment was "to go to the corner." The corner was a literal corner in my bedroom where I had to sit for as long as my parents told me the punishment would last. I don't know if my parents planned this on purpose, but the way my room was positioned at the end of the hall, I couldn't see the TV or anything that was going on in the living room, but I could hear all the fun

everyone was having without me. I remember crying for the entire time I sat in the corner, and I remember when my dad came to me to tell me that I could come out of the corner. My heart would lighten, and I would be so happy to be able to be part of the life of the family again.

I think as Christians, we can have the temptation to forget that the Gospel is good news. Either we are tempted to think of it as an ideal which is impossible to achieve because we keep sinning, or we can be tempted to see it as only something to make us feel good without any real effect on our lives. But what is the truth?

In the First Reading, we hear the famous words: "Comfort, give comfort to my people." This comfort truly is good news, but it only comes after Isaiah has told Israel the bad news that as a result of their sins they would go into exile. They can only receive this comfort once they acknowledge their sins.

My joy in rejoining the life of the family was only possible after I had received the punishment of being in the corner and said sorry for what I had done. In the same way, we can receive the Good News only after we have acknowledged the bad news. What is the bad news? We are all sinners, and we all need salvation. But the Good News is that God became man in Jesus Christ in order to save us from our sins so that we can have eternal life with Him. And this calls forth a response from us, the response that John the Baptist proclaims: "Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths." In other words, we are called to change our lives, to repent of our sins and to receive the salvation of Jesus.

We are also called, like John the Baptist, to proclaim this good news to others. But this is only possible if we truly believe that it is good news and have responded to it. During this Advent, we have the opportunity to receive the good news proclaimed by John the Baptist, but we can only do that if we acknowledge the bad news of our sinfulness and respond by changing our lives. Then, we don't have to stay in the corner, but can return to the life of the family of God.

Noticias del P.I.T. (Sacerdote en formación)



Cuando yo era pequeño, cuando me portaba mal, el castigo habitual era "ir a la esquina". La esquina era literalmente una esquina de mi dormitorio donde tenía que sentarme por el tiempo que mis padres me dijeran que duraría el castigo. No sé si mis padres planearon esto a propósito, pero por la forma en que mi habitación estaba ubicada al final del pasillo, no podía ver la televisión ni nada de lo que estaba pasando en la sala, pero podía escuchar toda la diversión que todos estaban teniendo sin mí. Recuerdo haber llorado todo el

tiempo que estaba sentado en la esquina y recuerdo cuando mi papá venía a decirme que podía salir de la esquina. Mi corazón se alegraba y estaba muy feliz de poder volver a ser parte de la vida de la familia.

Creo que como Cristianos podemos tener la tentación de olvidar que el Evangelio es una buena noticia. O estamos tentados a pensar en ello como un ideal imposible de alcanzar porque seguimos pecando, o podemos sentirnos tentados a verlo sólo como algo que nos hace sentir bien sin ningún efecto real en nuestras vidas. ¿Pero cuál es la verdad?

En la Primera Lectura escuchamos las famosas palabras: "Consuelen, consuelen a mi pueblo". Este consuelo verdaderamente es una buena noticia, pero sólo llega después de que Isaías le ha dicho a Israel la mala noticia de que, como resultado de sus pecados, irían al exilio. Sólo pueden recibir este consuelo una vez que reconocen sus pecados.

Mi alegría de reincorporarme a la vida de la familia sólo era posible después de haber recibido el castigo de estar en el rincón y pedir perdón por lo que había hecho. De la misma manera, podemos recibir las Buenas Nuevas sólo después de haber reconocido las malas noticias. ¿Cuáles son las malas noticias? Todos somos pecadores y todos necesitamos la salvación. Pero la Buena Nueva es que Dios se hizo hombre en Jesucristo para salvarnos de nuestros pecados y que podamos tener vida eterna con Él. Y esto exige de nosotros una respuesta, la respuesta que proclama Juan el Bautista: "Preparen el camino del Señor, enderecen sus senderos". En otras palabras, estamos llamados a cambiar nuestras vidas, a arrepentirnos de nuestros pecados y a recibir la salvación de Jesús.

También nosotros estamos llamados, como Juan el Bautista, a proclamar esta buena noticia a los demás. Pero esto sólo es posible si realmente creemos que es una buena noticia y hemos respondido a ella. Durante este Adviento, tenemos la oportunidad de recibir las buenas nuevas proclamadas por Juan el Bautista, pero sólo podemos hacerlo si reconocemos las malas noticias de nuestra pecaminosidad y respondemos cambiando nuestras vidas. Entonces, no tendremos que quedarnos en el rincón, sino que podremos regresar a la vida de la familia de Dios.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Can you hear it? The voice crying out in the desert? While John the Baptist was the one literally proclaiming, from the desert, the coming of the Lord, we should listen for echoes of his message today. John foretold that Jesus - the Father's Incarnate Son - was on his way to redeem the world. Through Jesus' passion and death, the gates of heaven were flung open so all who believe in him would have eternal life. This is the Good News he proclaimed then, and the Church proclaims today: Christ has come! Christ has died, Christ is risen, and Christ will come again. This is what we prepare for in Advent - to celebrate, on Christmas day, Christ's coming into the world, and that he will one day return in glory. The Lord gives comfort to his people in his words, and in his presence to us in the Eucharist: "According to his promise we await new heavens and a new earth in which righteousness dwells." So, trust in the Lord, remain vigilant, and take heed of the voices that remind us to "prepare the way of the Lord."


GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Each year, we are given the gift of Advent. It is a season that invites us to slow down, reflect on the gift of Jesus and prepare to celebrate the Nativity of the Lord. Ironically, though, it happens at one of the most frenzied times of the year as we rush to keep up with cookie baking, tree decorating and merry-making. Advent is short – it includes four Sundays but can be three to four weeks long depending on the weekday upon which Christmas falls – and it sometimes doesn't seem long enough to truly prepare our hearts. This year Advent is three weeks and a day – so we are close to reaching the midway point, which is a good time to ask ourselves: How tuned in are we to John the Baptist's message? If we feel like we're being carried along in a wave of consumerism, it's not too late to make a course correction. We can step away from the fray and carve out time to enjoy the stillness of Advent and truly listen to the voice crying out in the desert.




