

News from P.I.T. (Priest in Training)



Every year, my family tries to guess when the local radio station would begin playing Christmas music. This music forms the background of our festive activities from decorating the Christmas tree to baking cookies. For the last couple years, the song "Last Christmas" by Wham! has been particularly popular, being covered by so many different singers that it feels like every other song is some iteration of "Last Christmas." Now, don't get me wrong, it's a catchy song, but to hear it that

often tends to wear out its novelty.

The Psalm for Christmas Day proclaims, "Sing to the LORD a new song!" We are called to sing a new song because God is doing something completely new in history in the Christmas story.

For many of us, the story of Christmas is nothing new. We have our traditions such as our favorite Mass time to attend and our usual family gathering. And so when we hear the Christmas Gospel, it feels as old and comfortable as Linus proclaiming this same Gospel in the Peanuts Christmas special. But as we settle into what is old and comfortable and familiar about Christmas, we run the risk of missing what is new and unsettling and strange about Christmas.

Perhaps what is most strange about this Gospel is what is most familiar to us today: "You will find an infant wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger." God has become a baby in order to save the world, and He is currently lying in a feeding trough. When we think about the literal meaning of those words, they become almost ridiculous. But this strangeness isn't just strangeness for its own sake. It points to the newness of what God is doing, perhaps the only truly new thing in history: God has become man in Jesus Christ in order to save us from our sins.

We cannot afford to let Christmas become something familiar and boring. Otherwise, it will have no effect on our lives. We instead need to receive this news like the shepherds, who are first "struck with great fear," but after they go to see the baby in the manger, they return "glorifying and praising God."

We are also called to encounter the baby Jesus this Christmas, and to allow His newness to make us new, so that we don't go back to our old way of life. This new way of life might seem as strange and unsettling as the Christmas story, but as the shepherds and the saints throughout the ages show us, it is also a way of life filled with joy. When we have allowed this joy to fill our hearts, then we will want to sing a new song with the angels at the birth of Christ, even if the song we choose to sing is "Last Christmas."

On behalf of Fr. Michael and all the staff at Our Lady of Mercy, we would like to wish you a blessed Christmas season!

Cada año, mi familia intenta adivinar cuándo la estación de radio local comenzaría a transmitir música Navideña. Esta música forma el fondo de nuestras actividades festivas, desde decorar el árbol de Navidad hasta hornear galletas. Durante los últimos años, ila canción "La Navidad Pasada" de Wham! ha sido particularmente popular, ya que ha sido versionada por tantos cantantes diferentes que parece que cualquier otra canción es una versión de "La Navidad Pasada". Ahora, no me malinterpreten, es una can-

ción pegajosa, pero escucharla a menudo tiende a desgastar su novedad.

El Salmo del día de Navidad proclama: "¡Canten al SEÑOR un canto nuevo!" Estamos llamados a cantar un canto nuevo porque Dios está haciendo algo completamente nuevo en la historia del relato de Navidad.

Quizás lo más extraño de este Evangelio sea lo que hoy nos resulta más familiar: "Encontrarán a un niño envuelto en pañales y acostado en un pesebre". Dios se ha hecho un bebé para salvar al mundo y actualmente El yace en un comedero. Cuando pensamos en el significado literal de esas palabras, se vuelven casi ridículas. Pero esta extrañeza no es sólo extrañeza por sí misma. Señala la novedad de lo que Dios está haciendo, quizás la única cosa verdaderamente nueva en la historia: Dios se ha hecho hombre en Jesucristo para salvarnos de nuestros pecados.

No podemos permitir que la Navidad se convierta en algo familiar y aburrido. De lo contrario, no tendrá ningún efecto en nuestras vidas. En lugar de eso, necesitamos recibir esta noticia como los pastores, quienes al principio "sienten gran temor", pero después de ir a ver al bebé en el pesebre, regresan "glorificando y alabando a Dios".

También estamos llamados a encontrarnos con el niño Jesús esta Navidad y a permitir que su novedad nos haga nuevos, para no volver a nuestra antigua forma de vida. Esta nueva forma de vida puede parecer tan extraña e inquietante como la historia de Navidad, pero como nos muestran los pastores y los santos a lo largo de los tiempos, también es una forma de vida llena de alegría. Cuando hayamos permitido que este gozo llene nuestros corazones, entonces querremos cantar un canto nuevo con los ángeles en el nacimiento de Cristo, incluso si la canción que elegimos cantar es "La Navidad Pasada".

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"Hail, full of grace! The Lord is with you." The angel Gabriel announces this in the Gospel today, and it is a phrase with which we are all familiar thanks to our recitation of the Hail Mary prayer. Although some may be comforted by such a message and its angelic messenger, it is troubling to Mary because the angel goes on to tell her she will conceive and bear the Son of God. Thinking practically, Mary is being told the impossible will happen – who wouldn't be troubled? And yet Mary offers herself: "I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word." Despite her fear and trepidation, Mary went on to answer God's call and do his will. Our Blessed Mother became a great example of fortitude at that moment, as she exemplified what it means to step outside of our own uncertainty and trust God completely. Although doing God's will can be difficult at times, St. Paul reminds us in his Letter to the Romans that we can ask God for the strength to say "yes" in spite of our fears.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Up until today, December has probably been a whirlwind. Trees and lights, ornaments, parties and presents – all these things help to kick off "the most wonderful time of year" beginning soon after Thanksgiving. Come Dec. 26, however, for many, the decorations become a nuisance and Christmas trees are out on the curb for pickup. Thank goodness for our Catholic faith because for us, Christmas is just beginning! Mary didn't say "may it be done to me" only to forget about it the next day. And on that blessed Christmas night, her work as the Mother of God was only just beginning. EUCHARISTIC REVIVAL AND SYNODALITY, TOGETHER





ARE YOU A CUBS FAN? OR ARE YOU A WHITE SOX FAN? If you have any roots in Chicagoland, you instinctively understand that you must declare one or the other. It is common practice to choose one team — one is never a fan of both!

During these past two years, throughout our country and within the Catholic Church, that same principle seems to have been applied to the National Eucharistic Revival and the Synod on Synodality. As you know, the Eucharistic Revival is a three-year initiative of the Church to enkindle a living relationship with Jesus Christ in the holy Eucharist. The Synod on Synodality is an international, multiyear undertaking during which Catholics give feedback and deeply listen to each other — so, as a Church, we can all discern together where the Holy Spirit is leading us.

Curiously, many people seem to be taking sides; they are in favor of one, but not the other.

The week before Thanksgiving, I joined over 250 bishops in Baltimore for a week of meetings hosted by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. We began the meetings with prayer, adoration, benediction, and Mass. The first address to the assembly was given by Cardinal Christophe Pierre, the Papal Nuncio. When it comes to the Eucharistic Revival and the Synod, he encouraged us to move away from an "either/or" approach, and to instead embrace and promote both. The special connections between the Eucharistic Revival and the Synod prevailed through our week of meetings.

At one point, Cardinal Pierre beautifully reflected on the road to Emmaus story from the Gospel of Luke (24: 13–35). Along their journey, the disciples debated their theological points of view while Jesus listened to them. "Listening, corresponds to the humble style of God," said the cardinal, quoting Pope Francis. "God loves humanity: that is why he addresses his word to them, and why he "inclines his ear' to listen to them."

You see, *listening* is essential for a synodal Church because it is a dimension of love. Through this Emmaus moment, Jesus accompanies, listens, and discerns with His disciples. Then, their hearts were set on fire because they recognized His true presence in the Eucharist. After this Eucharistic encounter, they go

back to the other disciples and proclaim that Jesus is alive and — with missionary zeal — are committed to sharing the risen Christ with the world.

Cardinal Pierre concluded his presentation with these moving insights: "Our people need us to be adventurers for the Lord. They need us to be united with one another. They need to see how our diversity, harmonized, displays the beauty of the Church and of the Catholic faith. They need to be reminded that salvation comes not from one idea or another, but through a shared encounter with the living person of Jesus, who is love."

Most of us can agree we are a stronger Church when we both listen *and* keep the Eucharist as our source and summit. Let's look for ways to stay united with each other and with Christ.


From the onset, I announced that the Diocese of Joliet was going to participate in both the National Eucharistic Revival and the Synod on Synodality. Walking in numerous Eucharistic processions and attending many talks about the Eucharist, I am proud of how robustly our clergy and parishioners have promoted and embraced this Eucharistic Revival. I look forward to participating in our continued celebrations of the Eucharist in the Diocese of Joliet, and will joyfully attend the Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis in July 2024. That event will launch us into the next phase of the revival by enthusiastically taking the Eucharistic Lord into the world and putting our faith into action as missionary disciples.

At the same time, I am also proud of how we have participated in the Synod on Synodality. For over six months, groups gathered throughout every deanery of our diocese to listen intently to each other. The themes from these listening sessions were gathered and compiled into a report sent to Rome. The first half of the synod concluded in the Vatican this October. With faithful hope, we await the next steps for the second half next October.

As a baseball fan, I am fiercely loyal to my team, while politely ignoring the other. Gratefully, that's not what our Church does when it comes to the National Eucharistic Revival and the Synod on Synodality. Like you, I love Jesus so much — especially in the Eucharist — and at the same time — through Him, with Him, and in Him — I desire a *listening* Church that calls us to be on mission! With faith and trust in God, I look forward to walking on this all-connected journey with you ahead.


