

News from P.I.T. (Pastor in Training)



I'm pretty good at throwing parties, in particular, pity parties. When I was 25 years old, I was diagnosed with Hodgkin's Lymphoma. As I look back, I know that the Lord uses all things for His glory because my diagnosis led to my priestly discernment. But, for selfish reasons, it added to my pity party; I was now a proud owner of "the cancer card"! I remember one time when my sister and I were

discussing with my mom where we should all go to dinner. My sister and I had different ideas of which restaurant to go to, but ultimately, I won in the end. Why? Because I had cancer!

I bring this up because in our first reading, Job is throwing his own pity party. "Job spoke, saying: 'Is not man's life on earth is a drudgery?'" (Job 7:1) Now, I don't think it's just Job or myself that tend to feel this way sometimes. Why? Well, when we are going through our crosses and trials, or when we are hurting, we typically feel isolated and alone. We may feel like no one can grasp or comprehend what we are actually going through.

However, what our faith makes clear is that we are never alone, and the Lord knows exactly what we are going through. In our Gospel reading today, the Lord seeks out Peter's Mother-in-Law who is sick. Not only does the Lord seek us out, but we are also able to approach him and call out in our need. Later in Job's story, he will cry out to the Lord and the Lord will hear his cry. In the Gospel, many people come to Lord seeking healing as the sun sets.

May I invite us, especially with the crosses we bear, to seek out the Lord in prayer instead of throwing a pity party and feeling isolated. Next Sunday, February 11th, after the Noon Mass Bishop Ronald Hicks will dedicate our new Adoration Chapel. My hope is that this sacred space may become a place where many can come and bring their crosses before the Lord, knowing that they are never alone, and that the Lord is with them!

Soy bastante bueno dejándome llevar por la pena. Cuando tenía 25 años, me diagnosticaron Linfoma de Hodgkin. Al mirar atrás, sé que el Señor usa todas las cosas para Su gloria porque mi diagnóstico me llevó a mi discernimiento sacerdotal. Pero, por razones egoístas, se sumó a mi pena; ¡Ahora era el orgulloso propietario de "la tarjeta del cáncer"! Recuerdo una vez en la que mi hermana

y yo estábamos discutiendo con mi mamá dónde deberíamos ir todos a cenar. Mi hermana y yo teníamos ideas diferentes sobre a qué restaurante ir, pero al final gané. ¿Por qué? ¡Porque tenía cáncer!

Menciono esto porque en nuestra primera lectura, Job está dejándose llevar por su propia miseria. "Job habló, diciendo: ¿No es la vida del hombre sobre la tierra un trabajo pesado?'" (Job 7:1) Ahora bien, no creo que seamos sólo Job o yo los que tendemos a sentirnos así a veces. ¿Por qué? Bueno, cuando atravesamos nuestras cruces y pruebas, o cuando sufrimos, normalmente nos sentimos aislados y solos. Es posible que sintamos que nadie puede captar o comprender lo que realmente estamos pasando. Sin embargo, lo que nuestra fe deja claro es que nunca estamos solos y el Señor sabe exactamente por lo que estamos pasando.

En nuestra lectura del Evangelio de hoy, el Señor busca a la suegra de Pedro que está enferma. El Señor no sólo nos busca, sino que también podemos acercarnos a él y clamar en nuestra necesidad. Más adelante en la historia de Job, él clamará al Señor y el Señor escuchará su clamor. En el Evangelio, muchas personas acuden al Señor en busca de sanación cuando se pone el sol.

Los invito, especialmente con las cruces que llevamos, a buscar al Señor en oración en lugar de dejarnos llevar por la pena y sentirnos aislados. El próximo domingo 11 de febrero, después de la Misa del mediodía, el Obispo Ronald Hicks dedicará nuestra nueva Capilla de Adoración. Mi esperanza es que este espacio sagrado se convierta en un lugar donde muchos puedan venir y traer sus cruces ante el Señor, sabiendo que nunca están solos y que el Señor está con ellos.



Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jb 7:1-4, 6-7 | 1 Cor 9:16-19, 22-23 | Mk 1:29-39

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Why me? It could be a flat tire, a lost job or a serious illness. When inconvenient, unpleasant or even downright horrible things happen, it is understandable to wonder why God allows it. I know that is what goes through my head in extreme adversity. God can do all things, so why wouldn't he change "this thing" for me? In the Gospel, we see Jesus curing Simon Peter's mother-inlaw of her illness, but many of us don't have our prayers answered like that. Instead, we may relate more to Job in today's first reading when he says life is a "drudgery" and he "shall not see happiness again." The reality is that God's ways are not our ways, so we can't know why some people endure hardship while others receive miracles. But we can change how we respond to those hardships when they arrive. Just as this passage from Job is understood better within the context of the whole book, discrete events in our lives are part of something larger than ourselves. Praying with Scripture, including reading more of Job, can help us understand how God is molding, refining, and yes - always loving us.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

When we are tempted to feel like Job is a good time to embrace the ageold practice of "offering it [suffering] up." As a child, my parents explained
that offering it up meant I was telling God I would happily suffer in exchange for it helping someone else. What does this really mean? Everything
stems from our being united to Christ in our baptism and being participants
in his priestly, prophetic and royal office. We offer ourselves, our whole
being, including our worship, praise, joy, gratitude, bodies and even sufferings to God as sacrifice. So, to "offer it [suffering] up" is a powerful way of
taking a bad situation and allowing it to be used for something good; to
give our inconvenience, pain and grief to the Lord and ask him to unite it
to Christ's suffering for the good of others. It is a redemptive act, a form of
love-in-action. St. Paul is a great example of someone who suffered gladly, and in today's second reading he shares that "to the weak [he] became
weak, to win over the weak."

PRAY Offering up our sufferings and difficulties is a way to participate in the redemptive work of Christ. It is a simple way to pray and can keep our focus on God throughout the day. There isn't any one specific prayer for doing this. Instead, when something unpleasant or painful happens, take a moment to acknowledge it and give it to the Lord. It can be as simple as saying, "Lord, I am happy to endure this for the benefit of others." You may want to insert a specific intention or offer it for the souls in purgatory. It's not always easy especially when your suffering is great – but give it a try this week.






LENTEN GUIDELINES

Diocese of Joliet-in-Illinois Fasting and Abstinence Regulations

- Everyone 14 years of age or over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent.
- 2. Everyone 18 years of age and under 59 years of age is bound to fast and to abstain on *Ash Wednesday* and *Good Friday*.
- 3. On Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, only one full meatless meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted on these two days, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices are allowed. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige.
- 4. To disregard completely the law of fast and abstinence is seriously sinful.
- Lent is the principal season of penance in the Christian year; all, in addition to following the Lenten regulations, are strongly urged to develop and follow a program of voluntary self-denial, serious prayer, and a performance of works of charity and mercy.

DisABILITIES Mass



Jail Ministry Volunteers



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
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
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
