

News from P.I.T. (Priest in Training)



When I was a little kid, I would watch a show called *The Big Comfy Couch*, in which most of the adventures took place on the eponymous sofa. One of my favorite segments of the show was the "Ten Second Tidy." At the end of the show, the characters would clean up the mess they made in ten seconds by comically shoving everything into the couch cushions. Of course, this show influenced how I cleaned as a child. One day, as we were leaving a friend's house, my mom said I had to clean up my mess really quickly before we left. "Ten second tidy?" I

said. She nodded, probably thinking I meant that I would clean really fast. When we got back home, my mom received a phone call from my friend's mom. "We can't find our remote control. Do you have any idea where it might be?" She looked at me for a second and replied, "Have you checked your couch cushions?"

Even now as an adult, I still do not enjoy cleaning, and much of my "tidying" probably still resembles shoving everything out of sight into the couch cushions. During this Lent, we are called to do a kind of "spring cleaning" of our souls. But left to ourselves, our cleaning might look more like a "ten second tidy," shoving problems out of sight rather than truly removing them from our lives. So how can we truly clean our souls?

In the Gospel, where Jesus makes a whip and drives all the money changers out of the Temple. What does that have to do with us? John gives us a clue: "But he was speaking about the temple of his body." Jesus refers to His body as a Temple, and because we are joined to His Body through Baptism, St. Paul can call our bodies Temples of the Holy Spirit (1 Cor 6:19).

We need to invite Jesus to cleanse the temples of our bodies and souls of any sin. We do this primarily through the Sacrament of Reconciliation, but as we go to receive this sacrament during Lent, we should take Jesus as a model of the attitude we need to have toward sin. He doesn't allow any of the money changers to remain in the Temple, but drives them completely out. In the same way, we cannot make any compromises with sin, but resolve to drive it completely out of our lives.

This driving out of the money changers isn't without purpose. The Temple is a place of communion with God, and even more so the Temple of the Body of Christ. So we allow Jesus to cleanse the temples of our souls so that we can enter more deeply into communion with Him, especially through the Holy Eucharist. As we prepare for Easter, let's remember that going to Confession shouldn't be a "ten second tidy," but a true cleansing of our sins so that Jesus can fill us with His Presence.

Noticias del P.I.T. (Sacerdote en formación)



Cuando era pequeño, veía un programa llamado *El Gran Sofá Cómodo*, en el que la mayoría de las aventuras tenían lugar en el sofá del mismo nombre. Uno de mis segmentos favoritos del programa fue "*Ordenado en Diez Segundos*". Al final del espectáculo, los personajes limpiaban el desorden que habían hecho en diez segundos empujando todo cómicamente entre los cojines del sofá. Por supuesto, este programa influyó en mi forma de limpiar cuando era niño.

Un día, cuando salíamos de la casa de un amigo, mi mamá me dijo que tenía que limpiar mi desorden muy

rápido antes de irnos. "¿Ordenado en diez segundos?" yo dije. Ella asintió, probablemente pensando que yo quería decir que limpiaría muy rápido. Cuando regresamos a casa, mi mamá recibió una llamada telefónica de la mamá de mi amigo. "No podemos encontrar nuestro control remoto. ¿Tienes alguna idea de dónde podría estar? Ella me miró por un segundo y respondió: "¿Has revisado los cojines de tu sofá?"

Incluso ahora, como adulto, todavía no disfruto el limpiar, y gran parte de mi "ordenamiento" probablemente todavía se parezca a guardar todo fuera de la vista entre los cojines del sofá. Durante esta Cuaresma, estamos llamados a hacer una especie de "limpieza general" de nuestras almas. Pero si lo dejamos a nosotros mismos, nuestra limpieza podría parecer más bien un "ordenamiento de diez segundos", alejando los problemas fuera de la vista en lugar de eliminarlos realmente de nuestras vidas. Entonces, ¿cómo podemos realmente limpiar nuestras almas?

En el Evangelio, donde Jesús hace un látigo y expulsa a todos los cambistas del Templo. ¿Qué tiene eso que ver con nosotros? Juan nos da una pista: "Pero él hablaba del templo de su cuerpo". Jesús se refiere a Su cuerpo como un Templo, y debido a que estamos unidos a Su Cuerpo a través del Bautismo, San Pablo puede llamar a nuestros cuerpos Templos del Espíritu Santo (1 Cor 6:19).

Necesitamos invitar a Jesús a limpiar los templos de nuestro cuerpo y alma de cualquier pecado. Hacemos esto principalmente a través del Sacramento de la Reconciliación, pero a medida que vamos a recibir este sacramento durante la Cuaresma, debemos tomar a Jesús como modelo de la actitud que debemos tener hacia el pecado. No permite que ninguno de los cambistas permanezca en el Templo, sino que los expulsa por completo. De la misma manera, no podemos hacer concesiones con el pecado, sino que decidimos expulsarlo por completo de nuestras vidas.

Esta expulsión de los cambistas no carece de propósito. El Templo es un lugar de comunión con Dios, y más aún el Templo del Cuerpo de Cristo. Entonces permitimos que Jesús limpie los templos de nuestras almas para que podamos entrar más profundamente en comunión con Él, especialmente a través de la Sagrada Eucaristía. Mientras nos preparamos para la Pascua, recordemos que confesarnos no debe ser un "ordenamiento de diez segundos", sino una verdadera limpieza de nuestros pecados para que Jesús pueda llenarnos con Su Presencia.



GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

When I was a kid, my older siblings used to tell me what to do (no surprise there!) and often backed up their, ahem, "commands," by saying, "Mom and Dad said so." Interestingly, sometimes that statement was not true (!), and I would get the right information - what to do and the correct way to do it - directly from my parents. My experience is not unlike that of the Israelites in today's first reading. As they escaped from bondage in Egypt and followed the Lord through the guidance of Moses, they developed their own ways of doing things, listened to the wrong people and acted as if they were indeed conveying truth. But the Lord steps in to correct them, and in "a direct, unmediated communication" of truth to them, gives them commandments to follow. (USCCB commentary) These instructions for how to live a moral life in relationship with God and with one another are the basis of the covenant they made there with the Lord. They are the foundation of the new covenant in which we partake through Jesus Christ, who came into our history as the perfect, unmediated communication of God.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

How do you envision Jesus? It's easy to think of him as kind and easy-going - the type of person who never lets his feathers get ruffled, no matter how many times the Pharisees question and challenge him. However, we see a different side of Jesus today - one in which he is flipping over tables and brandishing a whip. He is driving out those who are using his Father's house as a place to make money rather than as a place to worship. In the drama of that scene, let's not overlook what comes next in the reading. The people there at the temple, obviously taken aback by what they have seen, ask for a sign to justify what authority Jesus has to drive people out of the temple. Jesus says, "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up." That confused people then, but we know today that the true temple is Jesus and that his rising from the dead would be the sign they sought. Just as the commandments of God have authority, so does Jesus who came as perfect obedience to those commandments to help us follow them ourselves.

PRAY It's easy for us to think we're doing a good job keeping the Lord's commandments, but at the same time the line between right and wrong can seem blurred at times and we may relax a bit on some of their finer points. Try this week to dig deep within ourselves and turn to prayer for the strength to do what is right, seeking the wisdom of God rather than relying on human wisdom.






