

### News from P.I.T. (Priest in Training)



When I was in eighth grade, we had that classic project where we would be given a baby doll to take home with us for a weekend to experience what it was like to be a parent. The baby would cry randomly, especially in the middle of the night, and we had to make sure we were there to touch a special wristband to its back to stop the crying. I was a very dedicated "parent," taking the baby with me to Mass, Confession, and a friend's house. The only hiccup was that my sister broke off

the baby's leg. Somehow that did not cause the baby to cry, and we were able to reattach it without any problem. I even got 100% on the project. But this project missed the point.

If we made a list of all the sacrifices that parents have to make for their children—getting up in the middle of the night to soothe a crying baby, changing diapers, giving up their free time—I don't think many people would be eager to do that. But a child is not simply a list of sacrifices. Fathers and mothers say yes to these because they love their children.

This is why St. John describes the love of God as the love of a loving Father for His children. But living for others, laying down our lives for others, making sacrifices for others, is hard. We only find the strength to live this way through love, both the love we received from Christ and the love we have for others.

There is one sacrifice which parents are called to make which often gets ignored, and that is passing on the faith. The Church tells us that parents are called to be the first teachers of the faith to their children. This is a great responsibility, and it might seem daunting at first, but what it boils down to is that parents must first know the love of the Good Shepherd so that they can bring their children into that love.

Here at Our Lady of Mercy, our faith formation model is different from what you might find at most other parishes in that it is based around the family. This means that when the children come for formation, the parents also receive formation at the same time. But the goal is that the formation doesn't stay in that classroom. The goal is that both parents and children can encounter the love of the Good Shepherd here, and take that love home with them. On the weekend of April 20th and April 21st, we will have an open house so that you can learn more about Family Faith Formation here at Our Lady of Mercy. And thankfully, there will not be any baby dolls involved.

### Noticias del P.I.T. (Sacerdote en formación)



Cuando estaba en octavo grado, tuvimos ese proyecto clásico en el que nos daban un muñeco bebé para llevarlo a casa por un fin de semana y experimentar lo que era ser un padre/madre. El bebé lloraba al azar, especialmente a media noche, y teníamos que asegurarnos de estar allí para tocarle la espalda con una pulsera especial para detener el llanto. Yo era un "padre" muy dedicado y llevaba al bebé conmigo a Misa, a la Confesión y a la casa de un amigo. El único inconveniente fue que mi hermana le rompió la pierna al bebé. De alguna manera

eso no hizo que el bebé llorara y pudimos volver a colocarla sin ningún problema. Incluso obtuve el 100% en el proyecto. Pero este proyecto no captó la importancia.

Si hiciéramos una lista de todos los sacrificios que los padres tienen que hacer por sus hijos (levantarse a media noche para calmar a un bebé que llora, cambiar pañales, renunciar a su tiempo libre) no creo que mucha gente estaría ansiosa por hacer eso. Pero un niño(a) no es simplemente una lista de sacrificios. Los padres y las madres dicen sí a esto porque aman a sus hijos.

Por eso San Juan describe el amor de Dios como el amor de un Padre amoroso por sus hijos. Pero vivir para los demás, dando nuestras vidas por los demás, hacer sacrificios por los demás, es difícil. Sólo encontramos la fortaleza para vivir así a través del amor, tanto el amor que recibimos de Cristo como el amor que tenemos por los demás.

Hay un sacrificio que los padres están llamados a hacer y que a menudo se ignora: transmitir la fe. La Iglesia nos dice que los padres están llamados a ser los primeros maestros de la fe para sus hijos. Esta es una gran responsabilidad, y puede parecer desalentadora al principio, pero todo se reduce a que los padres primero deben conocer el amor del Buen Pastor para que puedan llevar a sus hijos a ese amor.

Aquí en Our Lady of Mercy, nuestro modelo de formación en la fe es diferente del que se puede encontrar en la mayoría de las otras parroquias porque se basa en la familia. Esto significa que cuando los hijos vienen a formarse, los padres también reciben formación al mismo tiempo. Pero el objetivo es que la formación no se quede en esa aula. El objetivo es que tanto ambos padres como hijos puedan encontrar aquí el amor del Buen Pastor y llevárselo a casa. El fin de semana del 20 y 21 de abril, tendremos una jornada de puertas abiertas para que puedan aprender más sobre la Formación de Fe Familiar aquí en Our Lady of Mercy. Y afortunadamente, no habrá muñecos bebes involucrados.



### Fourth Sunday of Easter

### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Several years ago I went to a shopping mall with my six-yearold son, and I could tell he was overwhelmed by the fast-moving crowds; he stuck close to my side. Not long into our trip, he turned a corner and, suddenly, his face lit up. He pointed at a young boy ahead. "That's James! I know him! He's in my class!" he exclaimed, and ran up to talk to him. Out of the sea of strangers was someone he knew, and who knew him. That changed the whole experience for him. Today's readings are all about that kind of knowing. In the Gospel Jesus tells us that, like a good shepherd, he knows his flock and they know him. How comforting it is to know that Jesus not only knows each one of us, but he willingly chose to lay down his life for each one of us as the ultimate sacrifice of love. But how do we get to know our Good Shepherd better? By immersing ourselves in Scripture and prayer and seeking a personal relationship with him. If we stay close to the Lord, we'll know his voice when we hear it - in the quiet of our prayer, in the everyday promptings of the Spirit in our decision-making, and even, in the midst of all the noise, as the calming and guiding voice leading us along the right path.

### GO EVANGELIZE

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Being known is one of the most fundamental human and spiritual needs. When my son recognized his friend, he also instinctively recognized – without being able to articulate it – this need, in the midst of the anonymity of the mall. And his reaction was so pure: "I know him, and he knows me!" But he didn't leave it at that; he went to engage with his friend. He encountered his friend. This is what Christ desires for, and with us – not just to know us, to simply recognize us from afar, but for us to want to encounter him! We are meant to be in community; Jesus is always here for us: in the Church, in the sacraments, in Scriptures and in our hearts.

PRAY Spending time in prayer and reading the Scriptures are essential in order to get to know the voice of Jesus. Read the Gospels this week, even a chapter a day, and contemplate what passages stand out for you. Pray about it at Mass. The Scriptures and the sacraments are how Jesus speaks to us, like a good shepherd speaks to his flock so the sheep will know his voice and follow it.

Lent is a solemn season in the church, but through it all, Our Lady of Mercy radiated with God's love and the love of many volunteers who diligently worked to bring beauty to our liturgies. Thank you to everyone for a great job!





# **Stop Assisted Suicide**

A Better Way Forward - A Message from the Catholic Bishops of Illinois

Legislation has been introduced to legalize assisted suicide in Illinois. SB 3499 makes it legal for a physician to prescribe an array of lethal drugs to a person diagnosed with a terminal disease who requests to end his or her life. The Catholic Bishops of Illinois oppose this legislation; there is a better way forward for our state.

Assisted suicide disregards the Hippocratic Oath, "Do No Harm," and sends the wrong message about the role of medical professionals. We cannot say it any better than the American Medical Association: "Physician assisted suicide is fundamentally incompatible with the physician's role as healer, would be difficult or impossible to control, and would provide serious societal risks."

This legislation brings a range of possible abuses. It should alarm us that in states with legalized assisted suicide there are documented cases of people being offered inexpensive lethal drugs to end their life rather than being provided more costly treatment. The poor and those with disabilities are particularly in jeopardy because they are the most vulnerable to abuses. Every major national organization that represents people with disabilities is opposed to assisted suicide.

In Oregon, where assisted suicide has been legal since 1997, data show that pain is not among the top five reasons why a person wants to end their life. Loss of autonomy, feelings of being a burden and being less able to engage in activities that make life enjoyable are most often cited as reasons for choosing assisted suicide. A better way forward is to expand mental health coverage and strengthen social supports such as community programs to help those dealing with depression and feelings of hopelessness.

No one wants to suffer or experience a loved one's suffering. Fortunately, there are effective ways to alleviate suffering or make a person more comfortable at the end of life through palliative care. This relatively new specialty area of medicine cares for the whole person — physically, emotionally, socially, and spiritually — to relieve symptoms and stress that often accompany serious illness or side effects of treatment. A better way forward is to expand the number of palliative care locations and services in all areas of Illinois.




