

News from P.I.T. (Priest in Training)



In high school, I suffered from a pneumothorax, which means that my right lung collapsed. When it happened, all I felt was sharp back pain. My parents began to drive me to the emergency room, but I decided it really wasn't a big deal and I made them turn around and go back home. The pain continued, so I eventually went to see a doctor. He listened to my lungs with a stethoscope, and

when he got to my right lung, he said very calmly, "There are no lung sounds in your right lung. You need to get to the emergency room immediately." He explained that in thinner young men, small bubbles called blebs form on the tops of their lungs and can pop, creating a hole in the lung, and causing the area above to fill with air. After I spoke with the doctor, I was able to go the emergency room to get the surgery and care I needed. Thankfully, I haven't had another pneumothorax for over ten years.

I bring this up because when I had the surgery for my pneumothorax, I learned that the word that Jesus uses for the Holy Spirit in the Bible is *pneuma*. It can mean spirit, and also more literally, breath and wind. The Responsorial Psalm says, "If you take away their breath, they perish [...]. When you send forth your spirit, they are created, and you renew the face of the earth." The Holy Spirit is as necessary to us as our breath. Just as we need to breathe to stay alive, we need the Holy Spirit to fill our souls to keep us spiritually alive.

We first receive the Holy Spirit at our Baptism, and we receive the fullness of the Holy Spirit at our Confirmation. And so we are alive. But many of us do not know the Holy Spirit. Many of us are like me after my lung collapsed. We are still alive, but we feel that something is wrong. We just can't put our finger on it. And maybe, like me, we refuse to go to the emergency room because we think we are okay. But in reality, we are trying to breathe with only one lung while the other lung has a hole in it!

So what's the remedy to this? We need to ask the Holy Spirit to renew the grace of Pentecost in our hearts so that we can live out the mission He is calling us to. And after we ask the Holy Spirit for this grace, we need to get to know Him, becoming more aware of His voice, and following His promptings in our daily lives. We might not notice any change at first, but when we open the Upper Rooms of our hearts to the Holy Spirit, we will be amazed at the transformation He will begin to work in our lives. And it all begins with one simple prayer: *Come*, *Holy Spirit!*

Noticias del P.I.T. (Sacerdote en formación)



En la escuela secundaria sufrí un neumotórax, lo que significa que mi pulmón derecho colapsó. Cuando sucedió, lo único que sentí fue un dolor agudo en la espalda. Mis padres comenzaron a llevarme a la sala de emergencias, pero decidí que realmente no era gran cosa y los hice dar media vuelta y regresar a casa. El dolor continuó, así que finalmente fui a ver a un médico. Escuchó mis pulmones con un estetoscopio y cuando llegó a mi pulmón derecho, dijo con mucha calma: "No hay ruidos pulmonares en tu pulmón derecho. Debes ir a la sala de emergencias de

inmediato". Explicó que, en los hombres jóvenes más delgados, se forman pequeñas burbujas llamadas ampollas en la parte superior de sus pulmones y pueden reventar, creando un agujero en el pulmón y haciendo que el área superior se llene de aire. Después de hablar con el médico, pude ir a la sala de emergencias para recibir la cirugía y la atención que necesitaba. Afortunadamente, no he tenido otro neumotórax en más de diez años

Menciono esto porque cuando me operaron de neumotórax, aprendí que la palabra que Jesús usa para el Espíritu Santo en la Biblia es *pneuma*. Puede significar espíritu y también, más literalmente, aliento y viento. El Salmo Responsorial dice: "Si les quitas el aliento, perecerán [...]. Cuando envías tu espíritu, son creados y renuevas la faz de la tierra". El Espíritu Santo es tan necesario para nosotros como nuestro aliento. Así como necesitamos respirar para mantenernos vivos, necesitamos que el Espíritu Santo llene nuestras almas para mantenernos espiritualmente vivos.

Primero recibimos el Espíritu Santo en nuestro Bautismo y recibimos la plenitud del Espíritu Santo en nuestra Confirmación. Y así estamos vivos. Pero muchos de nosotros no conocemos al Espíritu Santo. Muchos de nosotros somos como yo después de que mi pulmón colapsara. Seguimos vivos, pero sentimos que algo anda mal. Simplemente no podemos decir qué es exactamente. Y tal vez, como yo, nos negamos a ir a emergencia porque creemos que estamos bien. ¡Pero en realidad, estamos tratando de respirar con un solo pulmón mientras el otro pulmón tiene un hueco!

Entonces, ¿cuál es el remedio para esto? Necesitamos pedirle al Espíritu Santo que renueve la gracia de Pentecostés en nuestros corazones para que podamos vivir la misión a la que Él nos llama. Y después de pedirle esta gracia al Espíritu Santo, debemos llegar a conocerlo, volvernos más conscientes de Su voz y seguir Sus inspiraciones interiores en nuestra vida diaria. Puede que al principio no notemos ningún cambio, pero cuando abrimos los Aposentos Superiores de nuestro corazón al Espíritu Santo, nos sorprenderemos de la transformación que Él comenzará a obrar en nuestras vidas. Y todo comienza con una simple oración: ¡Ven, Espíritu Santo!

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Pentecost Sunday is here! If ever there was a day in the Church calendar to celebrate the transformational power of Christianity, this is it. We know from the first reading how the disciples go from being huddled and afraid in a locked room to stepping out boldly in the streets, loudly proclaiming the Good News of Jesus. What changed them so suddenly? It was the coming of the Holy Spirit, the third divine person of the Trinity, into their hearts and lives. Jesus calls the Spirit an Advocate, "the Spirit of truth," who will remain with the apostles after he has left. That same Spirit is promised to us, continuing the Easter joy. It is only through the power and grace of the Holy Spirit that we have the knowledge, ability, and courage to proclaim Jesus as our Lord. Only in this way can we belong to Jesus and be in relationship with the Father. The very same God who created all things is here to help us become the sons and daughters he always envisioned us to be.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

"Peace be with you," Jesus says, twice, to his disciples today. He approaches them with gentleness and a calming demeanor. He is aware of their fear and their anxiety, and that they would be confused and unsure upon seeing him in his resurrected body. Jesus offers us the same words: "peace be with you." For he knows we, too, can be afraid and unsure about what living out his words will mean to our lives. But we need not be worried! The Holy Spirit, that helper and advocate who came to the first disciples, is here to help us fill our hearts with love and joy and speak our beliefs without fear. When we open our hearts to God's love, Jesus tells us, the Holy Spirit "will guide [us] to all truth." In other words, he will be there to help us. As Paul states in the reading from Corinthians, we all have different gifts of the Spirit, and the important thing is that we use those gifts and talents to model ourselves after Jesus.

PRAY The Holy Spirit is with us to be our guide and advocate. Today, we pray, "Come, Holy Spirit," and witness the power of that first Pentecost which set the world on fire with God's love and truth. This week, spend some time reflecting on the joy you have as a Christian - and show that joy to the world!

A BETTER WAY FORWARD

A Message on Assisted Suicide from the Catholic Bishops of Illinois

April 2024

Legislation has been introduced to legalize assisted suicide in Illinois. SB 3499 makes it legal for a physician to prescribe an array of lethal drugs to a person diagnosed with a terminal disease who requests to end his or her life. The Catholic Bishops of Illinois oppose this legislation; there is a better way forward for our state.

As Pope Francis underscores, "We must accompany people towards death, but not provide death or facilitate assisted suicide."

Assisted suicide disregards the Hippocratic Oath, "Do No Harm," and sends the wrong message about the role of medical professionals. We cannot say it any better than the American Medical Association, "Physician assisted suicide is fundamentally incompatible with the physician's role as healer, would be difficult or impossible to control, and would provide serious societal risks."

This legislation brings a range of possible abuses. It should alarm us that in states with legalized assisted suicide there are documented cases of people being offered inexpensive lethal drugs to end their life rather than being provided more costly treatment. The poor and those with disabilities are particularly in jeopardy because they are the most vulnerable to abuses. Every major national organization that represents people with disabilities is opposed to assisted suicide.

In Oregon, where assisted suicide has been legal since 1997, data show that pain is not among the top five reasons why a person wants to end their life. Loss of autonomy, feelings of being a burden and being less able to engage in activities that make life enjoyable are most often cited as reasons for choosing assisted suicide. A better way forward is to expand mental health coverage and strengthen social supports such as community programs to help those dealing with depression and feelings of hopelessness.

No one wants to suffer or experience a loved one's suffering. Fortunately, there are effective ways to alleviate suffering or make a person more comfortable at the end of life through palliative care. This relatively new specialty area of medicine cares for the whole person – physically, emotionally, socially, and spiritually – to relieve symptoms and stress that often accompany serious illness or side effects of treatment. A better way forward is to expand the number of palliative care locations and services in all areas of Illinois.

Assisted suicide is not a compassionate solution for those who are suffering. There is a better way forward that truly offers compassionate care and compassionate choices.
