

News from P.I.T. (Priest in Training)



One of my best friends' love language is physical touch. This means that he shows his affection by shaking hands or patting you on the back or giving you a hug. Physical touch is not my love language. So my friend had to learn that there were times when I just wasn't in a place to receive affection through physical touch. I could really relate to Jesus saying, "Who touched me?" But on the other hand, I had to learn that physical touch is how he showed affection and to accept a

hug from him as a sign of friendship rather than as a sign to run away.

There is something very powerful in physical touch. In almost every healing encounter, Jesus touches the person He heals. This continues in the Church today in the Anointing of the Sick. The priest lays his hands on the head of the sick person, invoking the Holy Spirit, and then anoints the head and hands with the Oil of the Sick. This is not just a nice gesture, but the *Catechism* tells us "in the sacraments Christ continues to 'touch' us in order to heal us" (CCC 1504).

But something different happens in our Gospel this weekend. Rather than Jesus reaching out to heal a sick person, the hemorrhaging woman reaches out to touch Jesus. Because of her illness, the woman was considered ritually unclean, excluded from the life of the community, and untouchable. To all intents and purposes, she is dead to the world. She is excluded from the intimacy and love which is expressed by touch.

Jesus is able to distinguish her touch from the pressing of the crowd. Unlike the people pressing on Jesus, this woman touched Him in faith, and, as a result, she is healed. The woman's touch, which would normally have led to uncleanness, does not make Jesus unclean, but instead makes her clean as well. Through the intimacy of touch, the woman is brought back into communion.

But the woman doesn't take healing against Jesus' will. Instead, by healing her through her own act of touch, Jesus affirms her dignity and welcomes her back into communion. One of the reasons why Jesus touches those He heals and the Church lays hands on people in the sacraments is because we are body and soul, and that touch expresses in a physical way the love and mercy of Christ we experience in our souls.

Maybe many of us don't believe that Christ wants to heal us and believe we need to sneak up behind Him and steal the healing, and so we approach Him in fear and trembling like the woman. But Jesus truly wants our healing, and He still reaches out to heal us today. Like I had to learn to accept that my friend was expressing love through physical touch, so we also need to allow Jesus to touch us to heal us and to extend that touch of healing to everyone we meet.

Noticias del P.I.T. (Sacerdote en formación)



Uno de los lenguajes de cariño de mi mejor amigo es el contacto físico. Esto significa que él demuestra su afecto dándote la mano, dándote palmaditas en la espalda o dándote un abrazo. El contacto físico no es mi lenguaje de cariño. Así que mi amigo tuvo que aprender que había momentos en los que yo simplemente no estaba en condiciones de recibir afecto a través del contacto físico. Realmente podía identificarme con Jesús cuando decía: "¿Quién me ha tocado?". Pero, por otro lado, tuve que aprender que el contacto físico es su forma de mostrar afecto y aceptar un abrazo de él

como una señal de amistad en lugar de una señal para huir.

Hay algo muy poderoso en el contacto físico. En casi todos los encuentros de sanación, Jesús toca a la persona que sana. Esto continúa en la Iglesia hoy en día en la Unción de los Enfermos. El sacerdote pone sus manos sobre la cabeza de la persona enferma, invocando al Espíritu Santo, y luego unge la cabeza y las manos con el Óleo de los Enfermos. No se trata de un simple gesto agradable, sino que el Catecismo nos dice que "en los sacramentos Cristo continúa 'tocándonos' para curarnos" (CIC 1504).

Pero algo diferente sucede en nuestro Evangelio de este fin de semana. En lugar de que Jesús se acerque para curar a una persona enferma, la mujer con hemorragia se acerca para tocar a Jesús. Debido a su enfermedad, la mujer era considerada ritualmente impura, excluida de la vida de la comunidad e intocable. Para todos los efectos, está muerta para el mundo. Ella está excluida de la familiaridad y el cariño que se expresan mediante el tacto.

Jesús es capaz de distinguir su toque de la presión de la multitud. A diferencia de la gente que presionaba a Jesús, esta mujer lo tocó con fe y, como resultado, se curó. El toque de la mujer, que normalmente habría llevado a la impureza, no hace que Jesús sea impuro, sino que la limpia también a ella. A través de la intimidad del tacto, la mujer vuelve a la comunión.

Pero la mujer no acepta la curación contra la voluntad de Jesús. En cambio, al sanarla a través de su propio acto de contacto, Jesús afirma su dignidad y la acoge nuevamente en la comunión. Una de las razones por las que Jesús toca a quienes sana y la Iglesia impone las manos sobre las personas en los sacramentos es porque somos cuerpo y alma, y ese contacto expresa de manera física el amor y la misericordia de Cristo que experimentamos en nuestras almas.

Tal vez muchos de nosotros no creemos que Cristo quiere sanarnos y creemos que debemos acercarnos sigilosamente a Él y robarle la sanación, y por eso nos acercamos a Él con miedo y temblando como la mujer. Pero Jesús realmente quiere nuestra sanación, y todavía hoy nos tiende la mano para sanarnos. Así como yo tuve que aprender a aceptar que mi amigo estaba expresando cariño a través del contacto físico, también nosotros debemos permitir que Jesús nos toque para sanarnos y extender ese toque de sanación a todas las personas que conocemos.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"If I but touch his clothes, I shall be cured." The assuredness with which the woman in today's Gospel, afflicted with hemorrhages, speaks, is something I aspire to. She is at her wit's end, with nothing to lose and everything to gain, and she simply determines what she will do, bolstered by her faith in Jesus Christ. Notice how she doesn't approach Jesus directly, engage in conversation, or even ask anything of him. And Jesus, for his part, doesn't actively seek her out or call her to him. But the woman knows. "She had heard about Jesus," and she just knows that by simply touching his clothing, not even touching his human flesh, that the power he has within him will cure her. Her actions reflect the virtues of fortitude and hope, but it is her faith that has allowed her to see and understand the divine nature of Jesus - to see the God of healing standing before her. And she is not afraid. She trusts in his promises and compassion, and gives herself over to him with full vulnerability, achieving healing and being granted peace in response. If only we could do the same every time we are at our wit's end ... or maybe even long before we get there.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

If we are to follow Jesus we're instructed to imitate him – giving people hope in situations that can seem hopeless. The promises of Christ are real, and through him God's original order for Creation is restored. Death is defeated. The sick are healed. The kingdom of God, inaugurated by Christ and in which we participate here in this life, will be brought to fullness and fruition in the next. Being people of faith doesn't mean we won't suffer or die, but it does mean that suffering and death don't have the last word with us. When we know and understand this, it affects our whole approach and way of relating to one another. When we know the words of Jesus are the truth, we take them into our hearts, live them in our actions, and share them by our witness.

ACCOMPANIMENT Who around you could use this hope? Think of someone to whom you might bring the healing power of Christ, through listening and presence. Pray for someone who needs the peace of Christ in his or her life.
