

# News from P.I.T. (Priest in Training)



Every year for the feast of St. Lucy, my family makes *arancini*, which are balls of rice mixed with cheese and egg that we fill with a meat sauce, cover with breadcrumbs and egg, and fry. One year, it turned out that I was making the *arancini* too big and we wouldn't have enough for everybody. I quickly pivoted and started taking rice from the bigger *arancini* I had already made and made smaller ones. My uncle was amazed, and he kept telling people about how I seemed to make more *arancini* appear out of nowhere.

Clearly, what I did wasn't a miracle. And unfortunately, some people interpret Jesus' feeding of the five thousand in a similar way. They say that all the people in the crowd had brought some food with them and shared it, so that it was really a "miracle of sharing." But why would we want to turn what is clearly a miracle into something mundane?

On the spiritual level, it's because, as Michelle Benzinger says, we believe the lie that our God is a god of scarcity. But He is a God of abundance! The miracle of today's Gospel shows it. Yet often we still live in the lie of scarcity.

To some extent, it makes sense. The Gospel begins with five loaves and two fish to feed five thousand men. That clearly is not enough. But Jesus does not want us to remain in that place. So He takes the bread, gives thanks, and gives it to the five thousand, and there are twelve wicker baskets full of leftover fragments!

Maybe we wonder why Jesus doesn't feed everyone this way. In a way, what we're really saying is, "Why doesn't God do this for me?" But it's not about the food. It's about the fact that Jesus will provide us with more than enough.

We see this above all in the Eucharist. In the Eucharist, Jesus continues to feed us, not just with bodily food, but with His own Body and Blood. And even as we go to Mass every week, we might be tempted to give into the lie of scarcity. But God is giving us Himself; there is nothing more that He can give us.

The Gospel tells us that Jesus performs the miracle to test His disciples. They could have refused to follow Jesus' command, but they obey, and through their faith, a miracle takes place. At every Mass, a greater miracle than the feeding of the five thousand takes place. It's up to us to receive it.

When I was making the *arancini*, all I did was redistribute the rice that was already there, but God works true miracles of abundance in our lives. He will not abandon us because a situation is too difficult, though the way He come through might be in a way we might not expect, whether through five barley loaves and two fish or a little bit of bread and wine.

# Noticias del P.I.T. (Sacerdote en formación)



Todos los años para la fiesta de Santa Lucía, mi familia hace *arancini*, que son bolas de arroz mezcladas con queso y huevo que rellenamos con una salsa de carne, cubrimos con pan rallado y huevo, y freímos. Un año, resultó que estaba haciendo los *arancini* demasiado grandes y no tendríamos suficiente para todos. Giré rápidamente y empecé a tomar arroz de los *arancini* más grandes que ya había hecho e hice más pequeños. Mi tío estaba asombrado, y le contaba a la gente cómo parecía que yo hacía que aparecieran más *arancini* de la nada.

Claramente, lo que hice no fue un milagro. Y, desafortunadamente, algunas personas interpretan cuando Jesús alimenta a los cinco mil de una manera similar. Dicen que todas las personas de la multitud habían traído algo de comida con ellos y la habían compartido, por lo que era realmente un "milagro de compartir". Pero, ¿por qué querríamos convertir lo que es claramente un milagro en algo mundano?

A nivel espiritual, es porque, como dice Michelle Benzinger, creemos en la mentira de que nuestro Dios es un dios de la escasez. ¡Pero Él es un Dios de abundancia! El milagro del Evangelio de hoy lo demuestra. Sin embargo, a menudo todavía vivimos en la mentira de la escasez.

Hasta cierto punto, tiene sentido. El Evangelio comienza con cinco panes y dos peces para alimentar a cinco mil hombres. Claramente, eso no es suficiente. Pero Jesús no quiere que permanezcamos en ese lugar. Así que Él toma el pan, da gracias y se lo da a los cinco mil, jy hay doce cestas de mimbre llenas de pedazos sobrantes!

Tal vez nos preguntemos por qué Jesús no alimenta a todos de esta manera. En cierto modo, lo que realmente estamos diciendo es: "¿Por qué Dios no hace esto por mí?" Pero no se trata de la comida. Se trata del hecho de que Jesús nos proporcionará más que suficiente.

Lo vemos sobre todo en la Eucaristía. En la Eucaristía, Jesús continúa alimentándonos, no solo con comida corporal, sino con su propio cuerpo y sangre. E incluso cuando vamos a misa todas las semanas, podríamos tener la tentación de ceder a la mentira de la escasez. Pero Dios nos está dando a sí mismo; no hay nada más que Él pueda darnos.

El Evangelio nos dice que Jesús hace el milagro para poner a prueba a sus discípulos. Podrían haberse negado a seguir el mandamiento de Jesús, pero obedecen y, a través de su fe, se lleva a cabo un milagro. En cada misa, se lleva a cabo un milagro mayor que la alimentación de los cinco mil. Depende de nosotros recibirlo.

Cuando estaba haciendo los *arancini*, todo lo que hice fue redistribuir el arroz que ya estaba allí, pero Dios hace verdaderos milagros de abundancia en nuestras vidas. No nos abandonará porque una situación es demasiado difícil, aunque la forma en que viene podría ser de una manera que no esperamos, ya sea a través de cinco panes de cebada y dos peces o un poco de pan y vino.

2 Kings 4:42-44 | Eph 4:1-6 | Jn 6:1-15

# GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

If the multiplication of the loaves sounds oh so familiar ... it's because it is! It's the only miracle story found in all four Gospels, and for good reason. Jesus multiplies the meager offering of a boy with five barley loaves and two fish and feeds a large crowd with baskets left over. The story is symbolic of the food that is readily available through Jesus in the Eucharist. The crowd in the Gospel that had been following Jesus was tired, worn out, and hungry. Don't we all feel discouraged now and then? When we do, Jesus makes himself available to us in the Eucharist; he provides daily food that nourishes and sustains. When we eat this life-giving bread, we are strengthened and fortified, as was the crowd in the Gospel, as we heard: "They had more than they could eat."

#### GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Trusting in the bounty of God can be a challenging thing. Think about Philip in today's Gospel - looking out over the massive crowd gathered, he thought, "there's no way we'll be able to feed all of these people." And he was right! He couldn't, and we cannot. But the Lord can. And if we are to "live in a manner worthy of the call [we] have received," we must strive to live like the Apostles with complete trust in Jesus, and not rely on our own notions of what's possible and what's not. The miracle here was not that everybody was hiding fish and bread and they shared it. No, the Gospel is clear that Jesus takes what little we can offer and multiples it beyond our wildest imagination. That's the beauty of Gospel readings like this. Ordinary people are following Jesus, maybe curious about his message, maybe they know someone healed by him and want to see if he's for real. He teaches, they listen, and then something amazing happens. Let us always remember that no effort is too small for God - no kindness too ordinary. He magnifies the good we do. All we need to do is trust in his bounty, and freely give to him what we have.

**SERVE** Let's make an effort this week to try and emulate the boy in today's Gospel. Give what we have over to Jesus and say, "I trust you to make something out of this." Small acts of kindness, showing gratitude, or sharing our blessings can lead to bigger things than we think possible. We will never know the echoes of the good that we do, as it ripples out and touches other lives, but we can trust that in his love for us, God will use our good deeds for tremendous ends.






