

News from P.I.T. (Priest in Training)



At the first wedding I celebrated, I said to the couple, "Since this is my first time celebrating a wedding, I will probably make some mistakes, but since this is also your first time getting married, hopefully, you won't be able to tell the difference. But while I hope that I will witness many other marriages after this one, I hope this is your only wedding."

Over the last couple weeks, we have been working our way through Jesus' teaching on the Bread of Life, the Eucharist, and this weekend, we have reached the end of the chapter. In conjunction with the Second Reading, we discover a profound connection between the Eucharist and marriage.

In the Second Reading, in speaking of marriage, St. Paul writes, "This is a great mystery, but I speak in reference to Christ and the church." That word—mystery—was translated into Latin as *sacramentum*, from which we get our word "sacrament." The word *sacramentum* referred to an oath taken by a soldier. This captures an important aspect of the sacraments, that they are our oath of faithfulness to God's covenant.

A bride and groom seal their vows to each other by saying "I do," promising to be faithful "in good times and in bad." When we come forward to receive the Holy Eucharist, we respond "Amen." Amen means "I believe," but it also has that sense of sealing the covenant with God.

When Jesus tells the crowd to eat His flesh and drink His blood, many of the disciples return to their old way of life. As a result, Jesus turns to His apostles and says, "Do you also want to leave?" But when Jesus asks this, it is in a time of distress, and that's what makes Peter's response so much more impressive: "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life."

Whenever we encounter a moment of difficulty, when we feel God is far away, Jesus addresses that same question to us: "Do you also want to leave?" And we are called to that same fidelity to Christ in the moments of dryness as when we feel close to Him. In fact, our faith has the potential to grow even stronger in those moments because we are making the choice to love God for Himself rather than for the good feelings He gives us.

I've been a witness to many more weddings since then, and one thing I always like to remind the couple is that the wedding is just one day while a marriage is for life. The same is true of our faith. While we have those times of closeness to Jesus where it is easy to say "amen" to God, it is in the difficult moments that we truly live out our faithfulness. As we come forward to receive the Body of Christ at Mass, may we say "amen" to our relationship with Jesus, in that moment, but also in all the moments of our lives.

Noticias del P.I.T. (Sacerdote en formación)



En la primera boda que celebré, le dije a la pareja: "Como es la primera vez que celebro una boda, probablemente cometeré algunos errores, pero como también es la primera vez que se casan, espero que no puedan notar la diferencia. Pero, aunque espero ser testigo de muchos otros matrimonios después de este, espero que esta sea su única boda".

En las últimas semanas, hemos estado trabajando en la enseñanza de Jesús sobre el Pan de Vida, la

Eucaristía, y este fin de semana, hemos llegado al final del capítulo. Junto con la Segunda Lectura, descubrimos una profunda conexión entre la Eucaristía y el matrimonio.

En la Segunda Lectura, al hablar del matrimonio, San Pablo escribe: "Este es un gran misterio, pero hablo con referencia a Cristo y a la Iglesia". Esa palabra, misterio, fue traducida al Latín como *sacramentum*, de donde obtenemos nuestra palabra "sacramento". La palabra *sacramentum* se refería a un juramento hecho por un soldado. Esto capta un aspecto importante de los sacramentos, que son nuestro juramento de fidelidad a la alianza de Dios.

Una novia y un novio sellan sus votos el uno al otro diciendo "Sí, quiero", prometiendo ser fieles "en los buenos y en los malos tiempos". Cuando nos acercamos para recibir la Sagrada Eucaristía, respondemos "Amén". Amén significa "Creo", pero también tiene ese sentido de sellar la alianza con Dios.

Cuando Jesús le dice a la multitud que coma Su carne y beba Su sangre, muchos de los discípulos regresan a su antigua forma de vida. Como resultado, Jesús se vuelve a Sus apóstoles y dice: "¿También ustedes quieren irse?" Pero cuando Jesús pregunta esto, es en un momento de angustia, y eso es lo que hace que la respuesta de Pedro sea mucho más impresionante: "Maestro, ¿a quién iremos? Tú tienes palabras de vida eterna".

Siempre que nos encontramos en un momento de dificultad, cuando sentimos que Dios está lejos, Jesús nos dirige esa misma pregunta: "¿También ustedes quieren irse?" Y estamos llamados a esa misma fidelidad a Cristo en los momentos de sequedad como cuando nos sentimos cerca de Él. De hecho, nuestra fe tiene el potencial de crecer aún más fuerte en esos momentos porque estamos tomando la decisión de amar a Dios por Sí mismo en lugar de por los buenos sentimientos que Él nos da.

He sido testigo de muchas más bodas desde entonces, y una cosa que siempre me gusta recordar a la pareja es que la boda es solo un día mientras que el matrimonio es para toda la vida. Lo mismo es cierto con respecto a nuestra fe. Si bien tenemos esos momentos de cercanía a Jesús donde es fácil decir "amén" a Dios, es en los momentos difíciles que realmente vivimos nuestra fidelidad. Cuando nos acercamos para recibir el Cuerpo de Cristo en la Misa, digamos "amén" a nuestra relación con Jesús, en ese momento, pero también en todos los momentos de nuestras vidas.



GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"If it does not please you to serve the Lord, decide today whom you will serve." Not much nuance or wiggle room in that phrase, is there? This is what Joshua said to the people in today's first reading, when he gathered together all the tribes of Israel. Although these were God's chosen people, they still had to make a conscious choice - a decision to live with God and be obedient to him, or not. Jesus' followers and disciples faced the same test of resolve in today's Gospel, as he had just revealed himself as the bread of life. Some left and some stayed. We, too, must decide, today and every day. Too busy or distracted to attend to God? Then what? Do we have a plan? In this busy world, there is always something calling out for our attention. But there is nothing more important for our happiness in this life and the next than to stay focused on a life of service to Christ and his Church. For, as Peter says, "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life." The Twelve have made the choice as to whom they will serve: they will serve the Lord.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

We serve the Lord in building his kingdom, and we all have a role to play in that. First, we use the gifts and talents with which we have been blessed. Next, we ignore the world's charge to put ourselves first and, instead, turn to family, friends and even strangers, and take care of them. Loving people the way Jesus loves is not easy. Paul compares the love of Christ for his Church and the love between husband and wife: It is sacrificial, all-encompassing love that submits the whole of oneself to its flourishing. It is the love of Christ in the Eucharist which he offers to give us the clarity and strength to do the work we are called to do. We are called to serve the Lord, and may we do so with praise and thanksgiving.

SERVE "As for me and my household, we will serve the Lord." What a beautiful verse. How can you, as a family or individually, serve the Lord this week? Think of one or two specific aspects of your life and ask the Lord to show you how they may be used for his glory and in service to him.






Candidacy Mass






