

## News from P.I.T. (Pastor in Training)



I've encountered people, even in my own family, who would like to be spiritual, but not religious. If I had to name the reason for that statement, it would probably have to do with their disapproval of rules and statutes that are involved with being religious. At the foundation of who we are as humans is the realization that we were meant for communion and relationship. And what is religion, but people coming together in communion to prac-

tice rules and statutes? Hence, we were actually meant to be religious people, not separate from religion and only spiritual.

Our first reading reveals God calling on the Israelite people to observe His statutes and decrees, forming them as a people in the faith. In our second reading, St. James confirms that the people of God are called to be "doers of the word", and not only listen on the sidelines. Yet in our Gospel, it might seem that the Lord is telling us not to follow religious practices... So what are we to do?

Have you ever noticed a time when rules can actually be a good thing? I remember being trained in manners for a formal dinner. Knowing which fork to use, which glass is yours, etc... actually gives you the freedom to enter into conversation with the others at the table. If you are too worried about which bread plate is yours, you can't be free to enjoy the evening! In this case, rules give us freedom and open us to relationship. Our faith is likewise; if we live out the statutes of our faith, we actually enter into deeper relationships with God and neighbor.

What about rules in the confines of a sport? From baseball, football, lacrosse, and soccer to hockey, each sport has its own rules. Those who master the game, master their knowledge of all the rules involved in order to compete well. If the rules constantly change, the sport becomes irrelevant. Our faith is likewise. If we want to enter into the depth of our faith well, we will need to understand and live by the statutes that the Lord lays before us.

So what is Christ getting at in the Gospel? The rules and statutes that Jesus rebukes are those that removed the focus from God and others, and instead focused on the individual pride and ego. The Pharisees and scribes had been separating themselves from the people they were called to serve. They were giving the impression that they were following the rules God commanded, but their hearts were far from God. They kept piling up expectations upon the Jewish people, while ignoring the pride, evil, and greed growing within their hearts. This is a reminder to us that we must never forget to keep our focus on God, and how to grow closer to him as we dive deeper into the rules and statutes of our faith. We must always remember the "why" behind them.

Our faith does have rules, but they are ultimately there so we can enter deeply into our relationship with God and others, and have life to the full!

## Noticias del P.I.T. (Párroco en Formación)



He conocido a personas, incluso en mi propia familia, a quienes les gustaría ser espirituales, pero no religiosas. Si tuviera que nombrar la razón de esa afirmación, probablemente tendría que ver con su desaprobación de las reglas y estatutos que implica ser religioso. En la base de lo que somos como humanos está la comprensión de que fuimos creados para la comunión y la relación. ¿Y qué es la religión, sino personas que se reúnen en comunión para practicar reglas y estatutos? Por lo tanto, en realidad fuimos creados

para ser personas religiosas, no separadas de la religión y solo espirituales.

Nuestra primera lectura revela que Dios llama al pueblo israelita a observar Sus estatutos y decretos, formándolos como un pueblo en la fe. En nuestra segunda lectura, Santiago confirma que el pueblo de Dios está llamado a "poner en práctica la palabra", y no se limiten a escucharla. Sin embargo, en nuestro Evangelio, podría parecer que el Señor nos está diciendo que no sigamos prácticas religiosas... Entonces, ¿qué debemos hacer?

¿Alguna vez han notado un momento en el que las reglas pueden ser algo bueno? Recuerdo que me enseñaron a comportarme en una cena formal. Saber qué tenedor usar, qué vaso es el tuyo, etc., en realidad te da la libertad de entablar una conversación con los demás en la mesa. Si estás demasiado preocupado por cual plato de pan es el tuyo, ino puedes estar libre para disfrutar de la velada! En este caso, las reglas nos dan libertad y nos abren a la relación. Nuestra fe es similar; si vivimos los estatutos de nuestra fe, en realidad entramos en relaciones más profundas con Dios y el prójimo.

¿Qué pasa con las reglas en los confines de un deporte? Desde el béisbol, el fútbol americano, el lacrosse y el fútbol hasta el hockey, cada deporte tiene sus propias reglas. Aquellos que dominan el juego, dominan su conocimiento de todas las reglas involucradas para poder competir bien. Si las reglas cambian constantemente, el deporte se vuelve irrelevante. Nuestra fe es similar. Si queremos entrar bien en la profundidad de nuestra fe, necesitaremos comprender y vivir de acuerdo con los estatutos que el Señor pone ante nosotros.

Entonces, ¿qué está tratando de decir Cristo en el Evangelio? Las reglas y estatutos que Jesús reprende son aquellos que quitan el foco de atención de Dios y de los demás, y en su lugar se centran en el orgullo y el ego individual. Los fariseos y los escribas se habían estado separando de la gente a la que estaban llamados a servir. Daban la impresión de que estaban siguiendo las reglas que Dios ordenaba, pero sus corazones estaban lejos de Dios. Continuaban acumulando expectativas sobre el pueblo judío, mientras ignoraban el orgullo, la maldad y la avaricia que crecían dentro de sus corazones. Esto es un recordatorio para nosotros de que nunca debemos olvidar mantener nuestro enfoque en Dios y en cómo acercarnos más a él a medida que profundizamos en las reglas y estatutos de nuestra fe. Siempre debemos recordar el "por qué" detrás de ellos.

Nuestra fe tiene reglas, pero en última instancia están ahí para que podamos entrar profundamente en nuestra relación con Dios y los demás, jy tener vida en plenitud!

## Twenty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Dt 4:1-2, 6-8 | Jas 1:17-18, 21b-22, 27 | Mk 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

#### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Traditions are so important to us! They help define and preserve our heritage and our communities while also offering comfort and stability. They shape our human world as we see and live it. But in today's Gospel, Jesus scolds the Pharisees and scribes for allowing "the tradition of the elders" to drive them to hypocrisy: "In vain do they worship [the Lord], teaching as doctrines human precepts." He accuses them, saying "You disregard God's commandment but cling to human tradition." How could this be? Were the laws of ritual purity not important? They were, insofar as they were observed for the right reason: glorifying and honoring God, and being mindful of their covenantal relationship. We know, historically, that those who had questioned Jesus, leading to his response, were interested more in legalities, religious control, pride, and power. There was little "love for their neighbor" and a fair amount of "love for themselves." Therefore, Jesus is instructive when he tells them, "Nothing that enters one from the outside can defile that person; but the things that come out from within are what defile." In other words: Ritual actions don't make us pure; the purity or impurity of our heart is what matters.

#### GO EVANGELIZE

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

What does it mean to be pure or impure of heart? Intentions matter; motivations matter. Jesus, quoting Isaiah, tells the Pharisees and scribes that they are honoring him with their lips but not their hearts; in other words, they were paying him "lip-service." "Oh those Pharisees!" we might say. They are easy to criticize and pontificate upon, aren't they? But how about us? It is worth looking at ourselves and honestly asking whether there might be times when we, too, are simply offering lip service to God? Are we truly offering him our hearts when we engage in our traditions and our activities? Our goal, as Jesus' disciples, is to be "doers of the word and not hearers only," as James puts it so succinctly in his letter. We are to hear God's word and commandments and then act on them in love.

**ACT** "From within people ... come evil thoughts, unchastity, theft, murder, adultery, greed, malice...," Jesus says. Pray specifically this week for the grace to see where God may want to purify your heart. Meditate on Psalm 51:10: Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me.

#### TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Labor Day originated in 1882 in New York City under the aegis of the Knights of Labor. Congress made it a legal holiday in 1894. Observing it this week gives us a good opportunity to reflect on the Catholic Church's social teachings for the last century or so. On May 15, 1891, Pope Leo XIII issued the encyclical *Rerum Novarum* on the condition of the working classes and labor. In doing so, he initiated a century in which Catholic teaching became more and more involved in the social issues of the day.

Unfortunately relegated to the shadows while the bright lights of controversy shine on other issues, Catholic social teaching remains largely unknown to many Catholics. It is the Catholic Church that championed such notions as a fair day's pay for a fair day's work, and continues to uphold the dignity of the human person against attacks from governments and corporations. Nearly every pope since Leo XIII has issued teachings on the subject. Take some time this Labor Day to familiarize yourself with some aspect of the Church's social teachings. In doing so, you will be taking responsibility as a member of the Body of Christ to commit yourself to the care of your neighbor.


