

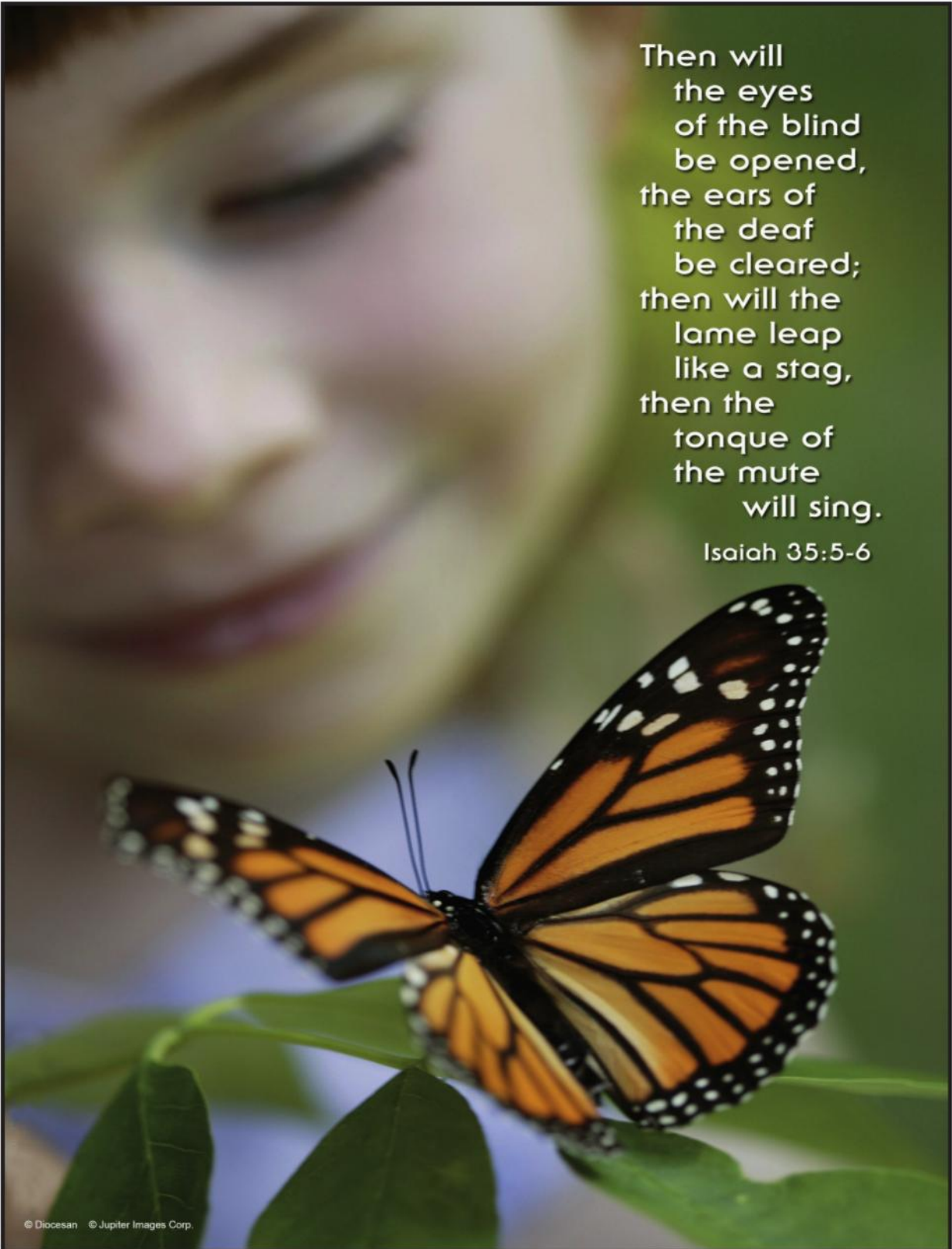

News from P.I.T. (Priest in Training)



As a third grader I took part in a weekly Bible Camp at a local church. One of the workbook activities asked, "Who first told you about Jesus?" In my case, it was my grandparents who had told me about the faith. As a child, I enjoyed looking at the many images of Jesus and Mary in their house, and my grandma explained to me who they were. As simple as it sounds, this encounter helped prepare for me

for my further encounters with Jesus. It helped prepare me as a seven-year-old not only to receive Jesus in the Eucharist, but also to begin thinking about the priesthood. And it helped prepare me as a seminarian to receive the powerful reminder that Jesus does speak to us in prayer. But it all went back to that initial encounter.

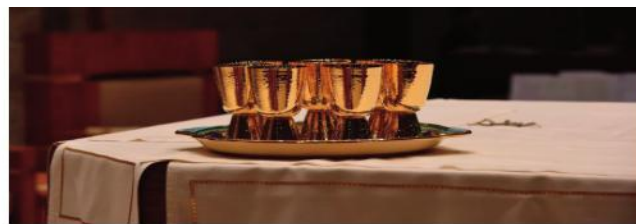
Today's Gospel of the healing of the deaf and mute man is commemorated during the sacrament of Baptism through the Ephphatha Rite. In this Rite, the minister touches the ears and the mouth of the infant and says, "May the Lord Jesus, who made the deaf to hear and the mute to speak, grant that you may soon receive his word with your ears and profess the faith with your lips, to the glory and praise of God the Father." Jesus' physical healing of the man in today's Gospel points to a deeper spiritual meaning, that Jesus opens our ears to receive His Word, and our lips to proclaim it.

In order to proclaim the faith, we first have to receive it with our ears. This is where it can be helpful to return to that moment when the faith was first proclaimed to us. This reminds us how God has been drawing us closer to Himself throughout our lives, but it also can reveal to us places where we need to grow. Even if we have already had a lifechanging encounter with Jesus, that encounter is only the beginning. We still need to ask Him to keep the ears of our hearts open to hear when He is speaking to us.

When we do this, we are allowing the Holy Spirit to equip us to proclaim that same Gospel to others. But the key word to remember here is the word of Jesus: "Ephphatha," which means "be opened." We need to be open to the action of the Holy Spirit, so that He can help us to know when it is the right time to share the Gospel with others, but also to realize that even though we are the ones proclaiming the Gospel, it is the Holy Spirit Who moves their hearts to encounter Him.

As we return to that moment when our ears and hearts were first opened to the love of Christ, we also ask Jesus to help us to continue to be open to Him. This openness to Christ can then allow us to be the one who first introduced another person to Jesus.

Noticias del P.I.T. (Sacerdote en formación)



Cuando estaba en tercer grado, participé en un campamento bíblico semanal en una iglesia local. Una de las actividades del libro de trabajo preguntaba: “¿Quién te habló por primera vez de Jesús?”. En mi caso, fueron mis abuelos quienes me hablaron de la fe. De niño, disfrutaba mirando las muchas imágenes de Jesús y María que había en su casa, y mi abuela me explicó quiénes eran. Por simple que suene, este encuentro me ayudó a prepararme para mis futuros encuentros con Jesús. Me ayudó a prepararme a los siete años no solo para recibir a Jesús en la Eucaristía, sino tam-

bién para comenzar a pensar en el sacerdocio. Y me ayudó a prepararme como seminarista para recibir el poderoso recordatorio de que Jesús nos habla en la oración. Pero todo se remonta a ese encuentro inicial.

El Evangelio de hoy de la curación del hombre sordomudo se conmemora durante el sacramento del Bautismo a través del Rito del Effetá. En este Rito, el ministro toca los oídos y la boca del infante y dice: “Que el Señor Jesús, que hizo oír a los sordos y hablar a los mudos, te conceda que pronto puedas recibir su palabra con tus oídos y profesar la fe con tus labios, para gloria y alabanza de Dios Padre”. La curación física que Jesús hace del hombre en el Evangelio de hoy apunta a un significado espiritual más profundo: Jesús abre nuestros oídos para recibir Su Palabra y nuestros labios para proclamarla.

Para proclamar la fe, primero tenemos que recibirla con nuestros oídos. Aquí es donde puede ser útil volver a ese momento en el que la fe nos fue proclamada por primera vez. Esto nos recuerda cómo Dios nos ha estado acercando a Él a lo largo de nuestras vidas, pero también puede revelarnos lugares en los que necesitamos crecer. Incluso si ya hemos tenido un encuentro con Jesús que nos cambió la vida, ese encuentro es solo el comienzo. Todavía tenemos que pedirle que mantenga abiertos los oídos de nuestro corazón para escuchar cuando Él nos habla.

Cuando hacemos esto, estamos permitiendo que el Espíritu Santo nos capacite para proclamar ese mismo Evangelio a los demás. Pero la palabra clave que debemos recordar aquí es la palabra de Jesús: “Effetá”, que significa “ábrete”. Necesitamos estar abiertos a la acción del Espíritu Santo, para que Él nos ayude a saber cuándo es el momento adecuado para compartir el Evangelio con los demás, pero también para darnos cuenta de que, aunque seamos nosotros quienes proclamamos el Evangelio, es el Espíritu Santo quien mueve sus corazones para encontrarlo a Él.

Al regresar a ese momento en el que nuestros oídos y corazones se abrieron por primera vez al amor de Cristo, también le pedimos a Jesús que nos ayude a seguir abiertos a Él. Esta apertura a Cristo puede permitirnos entonces ser nosotros quienes primero presentamos a otra persona a Jesús.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

My first thought upon reading today's Scriptures is that by healing the deaf man, Jesus is fulfilling what God had said he was going to do since the time of the prophet Isaiah: "making the eyes of the blind see and opening the ears of the deaf," as we heard in the first reading. And indeed this is what Jesus did. But when I re-read the Gospel I was intrigued by the line: "[Jesus] took him off by himself away from the crowd." Jesus had a reputation as a healer and a teacher, so it stands to reason that he healed people in front of the crowds often. Why, then, does Jesus remove the man from the crowd? In a commentary on this passage, Bishop Robert Barron suggests that Jesus removed the man from the crowd as a way of demonstrating that the loud and boisterous voices of the crowd could make it hard to hear when God is speaking to us. Even though this man was deaf and was not able to hear Jesus' words, the crowds were a distraction, and a barrier to intimacy and communion. Doesn't this same thing happen to us from time to time? The voices in our world that compete for our attention can make it difficult to hear God's word. But it can be done, and the rewards are great. God is present with us; let's make an effort this week to focus in on the things in our lives that point us toward God and ready ourselves to receive his grace.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Jesus put his fingers into the man's ears and looked up to heaven before healing the deaf man. By this action, Jesus is doing the will of the Father, which is to bring healing. Let's consider the question about competing voices in our lives and what we can do about it. For starters, we can carve out a time every day to quiet our hearts so we can hear the "still, small voice of God." Away from the crowd, we can put our whole being into truly hearing God's voice and asking for the help we need to be in right relationship with him. He longs to give us what we need but we must be open to receiving his gifts and his peace. If we are "tuned into" God, we can hear his Word clearly and speak that Word to others with conviction.

PRAY For me, there is no better way to spend quiet time with our Lord than Eucharistic adoration. Prayer and devotion in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament transforms and heals. Give it a try.



Dear Our Lady of Mercy Community,

In today's readings, the people brought to Jesus a deaf man who had a speech impediment and they begged him to lay his hand on the deaf man. Taking the man away, Jesus put his fingers in the man's ears and touched his tongue and said "Ephphatha!"— that is, "Be opened!" Like Jesus, we are called to open the eyes and ears and mouth of the most vulnerable in our population- the deaf, the mute, the blind and all those persons in our community who live with special needs and disabilities.

Today, I'm asking you to be the friends of the deaf and mute man who brought the man to Jesus. Let us not be blind to persons with special needs, but instead let us be opened to the possibilities that Jesus can do through these individuals. Let us give them a chance to receive the love and mercy of Jesus in their lives, just as the deaf and mute man in our Gospel did today.

At Our Lady of Mercy, we offer faith formation to students with special needs grades K-6, as well as sacramental preparation for those students with special needs who are over the age of 7. If you know of a student with special needs in our community whose eyes and ears need to be opened so that they may receive the love and mercy of Jesus in their lives, then please invite them to enroll in our programs! Or, if you or someone you know is interested in helping as a catechist or volunteer, then please contact me for more information!

May the Lord open our eyes to see those in need and may He open our mouths to invite the most vulnerable into an encounter with Jesus. God Bless!

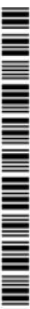

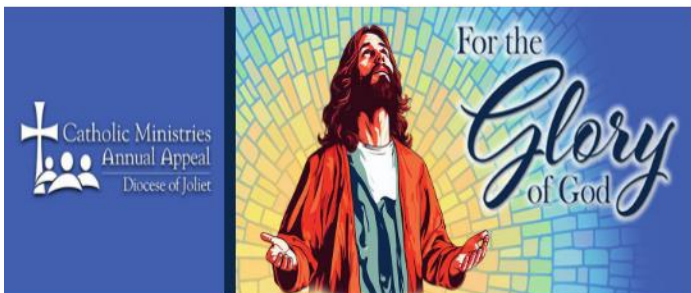
